From our Principal Ms Merrilyn Rowley

Term 1 at Northlakes High School has been very successful. The school's focus on improvement in all areas is reflected in a wide range of programs. We have commenced Positive Behaviour for Learning, which emphasises the core values of Respect, Responsibility and Personal Best in all areas. The 'Gotcha' recognition system is very effective, and students, staff and parents have commented on its impact. It is just the beginning! In Term 2, this program will develop further, with explicit teaching of the values and how they 'look' in all aspects of life.

Our students are also very familiar with the school's expectations as far as wearing correct uniform, including black leather shoes, being equipped for class, being on time, both to school in the morning, and to class, and only using mobile phones in recess breaks. All of these actions support maximising the effectiveness of class time.

All students have had the opportunity to be involved in a wide range of extra curricula activities. These include excursions and sport teams, welfare days, mentoring, Board of Studies presentations, work experience and work placement, agriculture activities, student representative council events, swimming and athletics carnivals and programs for Aboriginal students. ΑII this reflects professionalism and hard work of staff, who organise these events on top of their teaching responsibilities.

We were blessed with perfect weather for both the swimming and athletics carnivals. Mr Mansfield and Mr Hextell, PE staff and senior student helpers organised two very well run events. It was delightful to see so many students participate and enjoy these experiences.

Our <u>Student Representative Council</u> is growing from strength to strength. <u>Mr Van Drempt</u> organised the election of students, and our annual <u>Environment</u>

<u>Day</u>, where the focus is both on having fun, and on understanding our school's place in the natural world; and our responsibility in the way we use it. All SRC leaders were presented with their badges in front of a full school assembly.

Ms Norris has also led the organisation of our <u>Junior and Senior Aboriginal Education Consultative Group</u> (AECG). Students were selected by their Aboriginal peers and have a lot of ideas! Our <u>Aboriginal Education Team</u>, led by Ms Byrnes, oversees a wide range of programs designed to support our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to achieve their best, and to ensure our school is fully inclusive.

In Term 2 Ms Vivien Leek will be leaving us to take up a position at Tuggerah Lakes Secondary College, The Entrance Campus. She has been a great asset to Northlakes High School in her 17 years here; a very strong mathematics teacher, highly professional colleague, and in recent times, relieving Head Teacher. We value her input on the Mathematics faculty and the school. We wish you well in your new school.

We welcome to our Mathematics faculty Ms Jo Knight, who will be an asset to our school.

Also in Term 2, Mr Roy Goodenough will take up the role of Head Teacher Special Education. He has had a wide range of experience in other Special Education facilities, including Stewart House.

I would like to pay special attention to the role Mr Jon Glasson has played in 2012 and 2013 as relieving Head Teacher of our Support Unit. He has shown strong leadership, consistently supporting staff, students and parents, evaluating programs and systems and negotiating effective improvement, and at all times maintaining his professionalism and equanimity. In Term 2 he will continue to lead the Positive Behaviour for Learning program and take up the Year 7 Adviser role.

Our executive held an Extended Executive Meeting recently, where we evaluated our 2012 programs and data, including HSC results. The school in 2013 has a strong emphasis on improving students' ability to write more effectively, particularly extended response questions in examinations. In Term 2 all students will be involved in a motivation and engagement program called ELEVATE, which will be part of our whole school aim to improve academic outcomes. There will be invitations for parent involvement.

Our <u>Staff Development Days in Term 2</u> are Monday April 29 and Tuesday April 30. Due to the implementation of the National Curriculum in four faculty areas in 2014, all schools will have an extra staff development day, to enable staff to work both within their school and with other schools, in the development of programs. All students return to school on Wednesday, May 1st.

Thank you to all those parents who have already paid <u>school fees</u>. These can be paid either all at once or in weekly, fortnightly or term amounts. All subject areas have fees, which are entirely for resources students directly use. Your support means subjects can continue to offer activities which engage students. Term 1 fees are due.

Languages Report

Creative and Performing Arts Report

We are proud to announce that Northlakes High School has four featured performers and thirty two dancers selected for Starstruck – a major Regional Arts production for the Department of Education and Communities. Our featured music performers include Jacob Thomas from Year 11- vocals, Corey Jones-Guitar , Ben Saggas-keyboards and Brandan Rondan – drums from Year 10, all students of Mrs Brimbecom. The Dancers are from the electives courses from Years 9-12.

Our Dance teacher Miss Koteczky has been asked to be the Creative Director of the Central Coast Dance Festival, which involves DEC schools from the Central Coast. These performances will be presented over three days at the Laycock Street Theatre at Gosford, around June this year. Northlakes High will also be represented at the Gosford Arts Festival alongside private schools from the Central Coast. Our involvement in this festival further supports the schools' view of being a centre of excellence in the Creative and Performing Arts on the Central Coast. One of our senior Dance students, Ashleigh Donaldson, will be performing as part of the Regional Dance ensemble, further demonstrating our commitment to excellence in the field of the Arts.

Further to this, major regional Visual Arts programs have been approved to be organised and run by Visual Arts staff at Northlakes High School. These programs include Sculpture by the Bay organised with the assistance of the Regional Gallery at Gosford and an Artist Study Day, also run with the assistance and co-operation of the Regional Gallery at Gosford. Selected Year 10 students will be producing sculptures for this years' Sculpture by the Bay project. Students will be also auditioning for the annual Performing Arts show, Youth in the Performing Arts at Laycock Street theatre. This show includes all the outstanding youth performances from the Central Coast.

Excursions have also played a major part of the teaching and learning programs for term one. Senior Visual Arts students have seen ArtExpress at the Art Gallery of New South Wales. ArtExpress is the selection from the Band 6 works from the 2012 Visual Arts HSC examination. Music students attended a free concert at the Australian Institute of Music that featured student performers and a guest performer Glenn Shorrock. A rare musical treat indeed. Drama students were also entertained in a free performance at the Belvoir Street Theatre of Cat on a Hot Tin Roof by Tennessee Williams. Actors included the Australian Oscar nominee Jackie Weaver and other well-known Australian actors. Welfare Report

Term 1 has been a huge one for the Northlakes High School Welfare team with each year participating in successful Welfare Days, complete with visits from Healthy Harold, GP's in schools, RYSS youth San Remo Neighbourhood Centre, Lovebites and sessions run by our Police Liaison Officer, Constable Rachael Garland and our wonderful Year Advisors. Many welfare messages were delivered to our students over these days with most important centrina CYBERBULLYING and students' understanding of this. Cyberbullying is an increasing problem in our society and schools. A large percentage of our discipline problems arise due to facebook, mobile phones and other social media. Please read the attached flyers in an effort to protect our youth from the dangers of cyberbullying.

Year Ten Love Bites Program

LOVE BiTES is a school-based program founded on evidence which shows that school-based strategies can lessen perpetration and victimisation of relationship violence. Year 10 completed the one day course at the end of February 2013. Schools are a positive site from which to run prevention education as they increase the accessibility of programs allowing the material to be integrated within the curriculum and the systems of the school. These programs also lend support to existing violence prevention initiatives that are operating in classrooms. It is also of benefit that schools run departments which combine primary, welfare secondary and tertiary prevention activities therefore providing holistic support to young people.

NAPCAN advocates for a whole-of-school approach to the prevention of relationship violence and has included in the LOVE BiTES package lesson plans on gender deconstruction, sexual harassment and bystander strategies that can complement the Personal Development, Health and Physical Education curriculum.

2013 Immunisation program

Human papillomavirus (HPV) is a highly contagious virus which is transmitted via sexual contact. Most people become infected upon becoming sexually active. Around 80% of people are infected with at least one genital type of HPV at some stage in their life. HPV can cause genital warts and certain cancers (and their precursors) in both women and men.

Beginning in 2013 both male and female students will receive the HPV vaccination during the schools immunisation program. For further information please contact NLHS immunisation coordinator, Ms Bissaker.

Anti-bullying Report

Students should tell a responsible person, parent, teacher or church member as without knowing about the situation we cannot help.

Year 10 Report

It has been an interesting start to the new school year. Congratulations to all of the Year 10 students who have excelled at both the swimming and athletics carnivals, as well as the zone swimming carnival. Several of our musical students have tried out for the Starstruck band, fingers crossed for these talented young people. Whilst on the topic of talented musicians and singers we at the school are honoured to see these young people perform on a regular basis at either formal assemblies or in fund raising concerts, such as the Green Day concert which occurred recently. The aim of Green Day is to make students aware of some of the environmental issues that occur in both their school environment, the local environment and also in the global environment.

A new term has crept into the Northlakes High language recently, this being the term 'Gotcha'. Attention Parents and Guardians!

Below is a copy of the notification that students receive when they are late to school without any form of parent/ guardian approval. Everyone should be aware of this new procedure.

Dear Parent/Guardian

- All students at Northlakes High School are to be at school by 8.00am. They are to come straight into the school when they arrive, whether by bus, car, bicycle or walking.
- Students are **NOT** to go to Coles before school, unless they have a note from a parent or guardian.
- Roll call is at 8.12am and usually is part of a morning assembly. All students should attend, as changes to routine, new timetables, special events, etc are presented.

Students who persistently and frequently arrive late to school with no good reason, will be issued with a notice to attend a **ONE HOUR DETENTION** on the next **TUESDAY, AFTER SCHOOL FROM 2.30PM** - **3.30PM**. Detentions will be held in D1.

Failure to attend will result in the student being required to attend detentions at school and will be monitored on an attendance card.

All actions will be recorded as a negative incident on the student's record.

I have unfortunately had to take strong action due to the number of students who regularly arrive late to school.

NAPLAN 2013

National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy

In May 2013 the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) will be completed by all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 in all government and non-government schools. NAPLAN has the support of all State and Territory Education Ministers and will assess the literacy and numeracy learning of students in all Australian schools.

The results of the tests will provide important information to schools about what each student can do, and will be used to support teaching and learning programs. Parents will receive a report indicating their child's level of achievement. Each student's level of achievement will be reported against the national minimum standard.

Background information (student name, gender, date of birth, language background and Aboriginality) will be collected as part of the National Assessment Program. This information is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that every student's right to privacy is maintained.

The tests will be conducted across Australia for all students from 14–16 May 2013.

In the Numeracy tests students do not require any measuring tools such as rulers or protractors. In Years 7 and 9 there will be two Numeracy tests: one where a calculator is allowed and one where calculators are not to be used. For the calculator test, the student should use the calculator that they currently use at school.

Friday 17 May – A 'catch-up' day is scheduled for students who missed a test or were absent on a test day.

Students may be considered for exemption from the tests if:

- they are newly arrived in Australia (less than one year before the test) and with a language background other than English, or
- they have significant intellectual disability and/or significant co-existing conditions that severely limit their capacity to participate in the tests.

All other students are expected to participate in the tests. Disability adjustments that reflect the student's normal level of support in the classroom may be provided. Large print, braille and black and white versions of the tests are available for students with vision impairment.

Access to disability adjustments or exemption from the tests must be discussed with the school principal, and a parent or carer consent form must be signed. Students may be withdrawn from NAPLAN by their parent or carer. This is a matter for consideration by parents and carers in consultation with the principal. If you wish to withdraw your child from the tests, you must sign a parent/carer consent form. Consent forms are available at your child's school.

Cyber Bullying

What is cyber bullying, and its effects on our youth?

If you're like most teenagers, you spend a lot of time on a mobile phone or text messenger chatting with friends and uploading photos, videos, and music to websites. You may have online friends whom you've never met in person, with whom you play games and exchange messages. Teens' lives exist in a variety of places such as school hallways, part-time jobs, and friends' houses. Now many teens also have lives on the Internet.

... and bullying has followed teens online.



Online bullying, called cyber bullying, happens when teens use the Internet, mobile phones, or other devices to send or post text or images intended to hurt or embarrass another person.

Cyber bullying is a problem affecting almost half of all Australian teens. Whether you've been a victim of cyber bullying,

know someone who has been cyber-bullied, or have even cyberbullied yourself, there are steps you and your friends can take to stop cyber bullying and stay cyber-safe.

Being a victim of cyberbullying can be a common and painful experience. Some youth who cyberbully:

- Pretend they are other people online to trick others
- Spread lies and rumors about victims
- Trick people into revealing personal information
- Send or forward mean text messages
- Post pictures of victims without their consent

Cyber Bullying What Can I Do?

Helpful Strategies and Support for Students...

HOW CAN I PREVENT CYBER BULLYING?



Teens have figured out ways to prevent cyber bullying. Follow in the footsteps of other quick-thinking teens and:

- Refuse to pass along cyber bullying messages
- Tell friends to stop cyber bullying
- Block communication with cyber-bullies
- Report cyber bullying to a trusted adult

You can also help prevent cyber bullying by:

- Speaking with other students, as well as teachers and school administrators, to develop rules against cyber bullying
- Raising awareness of the cyber bullying problem in your community by holding an assembly and creating fliers to give to younger kids or parents

Don't forget that even though you can't see a cyberbully or the bully's victim, cyberbullying causes real problems.

If you wouldn't say it in person, don't say it online.

Delete cyberbullying.

Don't write it. Don't forward it.



WHAT ELSE CAN I DO?

Remember that the Internet is accessed by millions of people all over the world, not just your friends and family. While many Internet users are friendly, some may want to hurt you. Below are some ways to stay cybersafe:

- Never post or share your personal information online (this includes your full name, address, telephone number, school name, parents' names, credit card number, or social security number) or your friends' personal information.
- Never share your internet passwords with anyone, except your parents.
- Never meet anyone face-to-face whom you only know online.
- Talk to your parents about what you do online.

When teens were asked why they think others cyber bully, 81% said that cyber-bullies think it's funny. Other teens believe that youth who cyber bully:

- Don't think it's a big deal
- Don't think about the consequences
- Are encouraged by friends
- Think everybody cyber bullies
- Think they won't get caught

Contrary to what cyber-bullies may believe, cyber bullying is a big deal, and can cause a variety of reactions in teens. Some teens have reacted in positive ways to try to prevent cyber bullying by:

- Blocking communication with the cyber bully
- Deleting messages without reading them
- Talking to a friend about the bullying
- Reporting the problem to an Internet service provider or website moderator

Many youth experience a variety of emotions when they are cyberbullied. Youth who are cyberbullied report feeling angry, hurt, embarrassed, or scared. These emotions can cause victims to react in ways such as:

- Seeking revenge on the bully
- Avoiding friends and activities
- Cyberbullying back

Some teens feel threatened because they may not know who is cyberbullying them. Although cyberbullies may think they are anonymous, they can be found.

If you are cyber-bullied or harassed and need help, save all communication with the cyber bully and talk to a parent, teacher, police officer, or other adult you trust.
