

GRADUATE COUNCIL MINUTES March 26, 2018

The Graduate Council met on Monday, March 26, 2018 at 2:00 P.M. in Room 311 of the Byrnes Building.

- 3. **Report of the Chair** (Dirk den Ouden)

Dr. den Ouden reminded the members of the Graduate Council that next week is Graduate Student Appreciation Week.

4. Report of the Dean of Graduate School (Cheryl Addy)

Dr. Addy reported that the Graduate School Blueprint has been submitted as requested. Work is now under way on the Blueprint document for the Office of the Provost which is proving to be a bit of a challenge. Work on the College Blueprint documents begins this week and will take up a great deal of attention for the rest of this week.

Graduate Council has had ongoing discussion about graduate student access to campus health services-mental health services-in particular. April Scott, Associate Director of Campus Mental Health Initiatives, will attend the April Graduate Council meeting to discuss what is available and answer any questions. Dr. Addy will try to have someone from HR to attend the meeting to field questions about the well-being of our graduate students and graduate assistants who work up to 20 hours per week.

On a more positive note, a proposal to increase the health insurance subsidy for our graduate assistants has been made. It has not yet been approved. We will keep you informed of progress and when it is appropriate to notify graduate students regarding this important support.

Please encourage your graduate students to come out for the Graduate Student Appreciation week next week. There will be some social events, some professional development activities, and more.

The Graduate School will be moving to the Close-Hipp Building (old College of Business building) around the end of April or the first of May. Pay close attention to the email that you receive about the Graduate Council meeting in April as it may not take place in the Byrnes Building. The space will be an improvement for the Graduate School, but the challenge is the short notice while trying to keep up with all demands.

5. Report of the Secretary of the Graduate Council (Murray Mitchell)

The Society for the Advancement of Material and Process Engineering (SAMPE) has awarded two university leadership experience awards to two UofSC students: Our GSA President Clint Saidy and to Yeasin Bhuiyan (both students are from the Aerospace Program). These competitive awards are from a nationwide competition resulting in eleven awardees. The SAMPE conference will take place in May in Long Beach, CA.

The "End of Program" issues meeting that was talked about last month will take place on April 10th at 3:00 p.m. Some items to be discussed include:

- Differentiation between attending commencement and receiving a diploma

Responses have been received from 59 people (graduate directors, admins, and other decision makers) who are interested in coming. A venue will be announced as soon as possible, now that we have a sense of numbers. We tried to announce in advance what will be discussed so that this meeting will not be a waste of time for anyone.

There are a few policy-related things that are appearing to require some of our attention--one being

the issue surrounding registration in the semester of graduation.

Access to non-USC documents as a policy is an issue that we are working to be consistent across the University. The Registrar has one policy for what they will supply. The Graduate School needs to be in line institutionally with what would be an appropriate response to such requests. There are FERPA and Freedom of Information implications for developing any of those kinds of policies. The Graduate School needs to be attentive to what kinds of documents we are willing and able to supply.

The Graduate School is also dealing with a retention of official documents issue. There is an inquiry from a former student, last enrolled in 2003, to determine the program in which she received a degree. Verifying actual accomplishments has become more problematic as the university has transitioned to a new system of archiving student documents.

Another issue that the Graduate School is dealing with is signatory authority. Several pieces of paperwork are coming forward that are signed off on each line by only one person when the document should have been signed by at least three or four different people. Signature stamp issues have also cropped up. He asks that if someone uses your signature stamp, that you have them initial it; so, we know who to go back to with questions when there is a problem.

7. Report of the Graduate Student Association Representative (Matthew Owens)

For the past couple of weeks, GSA has been gearing up for graduate student elections that will take place this Thursday and Friday. Emails have gone out to advertise and to encourage students to vote, as well as, an email with a link to let students know when, where, and how to vote.

GSA has been working with April Scott, Associate Director of Campus Mental Health Initiatives, in trying to expand some of the services that the University offers in terms of health and mental health. They have been talking about ways to collaborate with local working professionals to come on-campus at least once or twice a month to treat students with chronic diseases. If they are successful, this collaboration with eliminate the need for students to be referred off-campus to seek treatment which increases the prices of co-pays. If the local professionals can't come on campus, at least treating these students at the same rates they would pay on campus at Student Health Services would be a big help.

They are working as a group to prepare an end of the year report for the budget for the social events that they have spent money on.

GSA has scheduled a Bowl and Mingle event for graduate students from across campus that will take place on Friday, April 6th at AMF Bowling, Park Lanes, in Cayce.

Some discussion followed where Council members expressed concerns with wait time and quality of support for emotional / mental health issues. A request was made for more information, perhaps in some sort of survey, to discover how significant are issues surrounding these services, from the perspective of graduate students.
