


Accommodation

International summer schools

Everybody in the School has the chance to take part in our International Summer School Scheme and get a taste of Law from a European perspective.

Each of these week-long courses has a different legal focus and whether you want to explore Criminal Justice in Berlin, Human Rights in Strasbourg or Commercial Law in Tallinn, there is something for every area of interest. Many of our trips will also complement the topics studied on the Masters courses.

Along with a series of inspiring legal lectures, each summer school includes a range of trips, social activities with students from our partner universities and time to explore the cities you visit. Here's an overview of the summer schools currently available:

Strasbourg

The Strasbourg Summer School will introduce you to Human Rights and EU Law. During the week you will visit the European Parliament, the European Court of Human Rights and the Council of Europe. Representatives from these institutions will also give talks complementing the lectures by staff from Nottingham Law School. There is also time for a varied social programme, including a popular picnic and boat trip.

Tallinn

The Tallinn programme focuses on International Commercial Law and is run in conjunction with Tallinn Technical University. Along with a visit to the Estonian Parliament and Cabinet Office, there is a visit to the Estonian Supreme Court in Tartu and a walking tour of the Old Town. You can also take part in optional excursions to Õllesummer (a major beer and music festival) and a day trip to Finland.



Berlin

The focus for the Berlin programme is International Criminal Justice. You will learn about war crimes, crimes against humanity, genocide, crimes of aggression, and victims and reparation. The summer school includes a boat trip and visits to Checkpoint Charlie and Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp.

Geneva

In Geneva the focus is on International Humanitarian Law. You will gain an awareness of the work of the United Nations, Red Cross and the World Health Organisation. Topics of study include international arbitration, health and patient safety in the developing world and religious liberty. Social and cultural activities are an important part of the visit too and the whole experience will provide you with a valuable insight into International Law and World Affairs.

Nijmegen

This new summer school is run in partnership with Radboud University in the Netherlands and will explore International State Security Law. Topics include the work of the North Atlantic Treaty Organisation (NATO), international tribunals and a case study of the Kosovo Crisis. There will be guided tours of the International Criminal Court, war museums and an Amsterdam boat trip.



Our LLM

Nottingham Law School's suite of academic Masters in Laws (LLM) courses offers varied and exciting opportunities for you to enhance your knowledge and skills across a range of compelling subject areas.

The courses have been designed to develop high-level, critical understanding of significant areas of Law and to enhance your career prospects, whether as a practising lawyer or as a professional working in a related field.

The courses are not only for those with legal qualifications. We provide LLMs for those who have an interest in a particular sector or industry, even if they do not have a Law degree. Many of our graduates and our existing students come from backgrounds other than Law, but wish to develop their knowledge and skills in relation to their professional interests.

Of course, they also offer students of Law – from new graduates through to experienced practitioners - the chance to enhance their knowledge and understanding of key areas, augmenting their professional skills and advancing career prospects.

A flexible approach

Our courses are flexible and available on a full-time or part-time basis. We also offer a number of subjects through distance learning, allowing you to study around existing commitments or join us from anywhere in the world.

Teaching and learning

The academic year for the LLM courses is split into three parts: two ten-week terms (Term One runs from the beginning of the academic year until the Christmas vacation, Term Two between Christmas and Easter) and the summer period.

Full-time students – who complete the course over one academic year – study three modules in each term and complete the dissertation over the summer.

Part-time and distance learning students – who complete the course over two academic years – study three modules across Terms One and Two in each year (six in total), beginning work on researching their dissertation during the first summer period and completing it during the second.

Full- and part-time modules are taught through weekly two-hour seminars in small groups. Seminars are led by academics but will usually require you to carry out extensive guided preparatory work and will often involve short presentations or other contributions.

Distance-learning modules are structured, directed learning activities, delivered through NTU's Online Workspace – NOW. Distance learners will also have the opportunity to participate in virtual discussions with other students and academic staff, and will be asked to complete additional tasks – such as preparing essay plans or presentations – over the course of each module.

In each case modules are assessed through one piece of coursework. This usually takes the form of a problem- or essay-style question, but will vary by module. You can submit and receive feedback on assessments over the course of each module.

The dissertation is 18,000 to 20,000 words and is researched and written independently under the guidance of an expert academic. You select your own topic for the dissertation, subject to the availability of appropriate supervision.

Academic expertise

Our courses are taught by academics with significant subject expertise. The School's vocational focus and strong links with the legal profession mean that many of our academic staff members have extensive practical experience.

The courses also have a strong research base. Academic staff actively research and publish and many are recognised as being amongst the foremost scholars in their fields.

What will I study?

Staff profile

Professor David Burdette

Professor Burdette joined Nottingham Law School in 2007 after lecturing at the University of Pretoria and working for the Master of the High Court in South Africa.

He is extremely active in the field of insolvency law, both nationally and internationally, and is currently the Director of Nottingham Law School's Centre for Business and Insolvency Law. The Centre is one of several specialist research clusters at the Law School, contributing to national and international debates and engaging in top-quality, internationally relevant research. The Centre has also hosted or cohosted a number of national and international insolvency conferences.

Professor Burdette has strong links with INSOL International (the International Association of Restructuring, Insolvency and Bankruptcy Professionals) and has also been appointed by the World Bank as a senior consultant for the Debt Resolution and Business Exit Team where he has contributed to projects in Malawi, Kenya, Mauritius, Poland, Seychelles, South Africa and Zambia. His research interests include corporate liquidation, corporate rescue and insolvency law reform in emerging markets.

IIM Health Law and Fthics

This course addresses the growing interest in the interface of Medicine, Law and Ethics. With the increasing pressure on resource allocation within the National Health Service and current debates on an individual's capacity to consent or refuse medical treatment, there is a growing need for qualified legal professionals with an understanding of Health Law.

What will I study?

You will examine general principles such as consent to treatment and medical ethics, together with more specialist areas such as the law relating to organ transplants, reproduction and the law, mental health law, medicines and pharmacy law, and employment and health.

The course gives you an insight into the impact of the Human Rights Act 1998 on healthcare and the law, as well as exploring the link between ill health and poverty and the implications of this. As with other LLM subject areas, modules will be taught in comparison with and against a European context as a backdrop.





He has also organised and delivered a training workshop for the Ugandan parliament in advance of their scrutiny of two government-sponsored Bills for the regulation of the fledgling Ugandan petroleum industry.

He is particularly interested in the offshore industry and developing / transitional economies. He has also contributed to numerous publications relating to the regulation and environmental implications of the oil and gas industry.

Entry requirements

Law graduates

You will need a good degree in Law (2.2 or above) or an honours degree in another discipline, plus either the CPE (Common Professional Examination) or GDL (Graduate Diploma in Law) conversion qualification.

Non-Law graduates

Applicants from other disciplines will be welcomed in appropriate circumstances, particularly if they have experience in the area, even if not as lawyers.

English language requirements

International students need to demonstrate they have sufficient knowledge of written and spoken English before starting the course. We usually require one of the following:

- IELTS 6.5 with a minimum of 5.5 in each skill;
- TOEFL iBT 83 with at least 18 in reading, 17 in listening, 20 in speaking and 17 in writing; or
- an equivalent English language qualification.
