Pete was a WWII Navy veteran. He was a member of Kappa Alpha Order at University of Maryland, where he earned a degree in business. He was publisher of Boating Almanac until his retirement in 1994.


Pete was a lifelong resident of Severna Park who continued to live at "Hoptoad House" designed by his mother and built in the 1930's. As a small child he enjoyed crabbing and sailing in Cypress Creek, later becoming a proficient racer competing in Penguins, National OD (2nd place worlds 1951), Annapolis to Newport races, Block Island Race Weeks, a Marblehead-Halifax race, and 17 Newport to Bermuda races, including winning his class in 1988 in the boat he built designed by Karl Kirkman. Later in life he enjoyed cruising with Kathy on their Whitby 42 Anthem.

Pete was a master craftsman with any wood project on land or sea. He built several homes as well as a barn in which he persevered through four years building his first and last fiberglass boat. A reservoir of creative knowledge, he was always generous with his tools and guidance.

Pete was involved with CBYRA (past president), a 50 year life member of the Sailing Club of the Chesapeake and the Annapolis Yacht Club. He was also a member of Storm Trysail Club and an active member of Severn River Lions Club.

Past International President Honorary Committee Meeting called by International President Naresh Aggarwal was held on January 3-4, 2018 with the following objectives: Discuss status of major associations' strategic initiatives. Provide open forum for PIP's to discuss topics of their choosing with the Executive Officers.

Outcomes of the Objectives: Agreed input by all 24 Past Presidents to align our organization within LCI Forward to achieve the goal of serving 200 million people annually. Return our organization to the basics of recruiting and retaining members. Engage committees of the LCI Board of Directors and Ad hoc Committees for the purpose of Developing future programs etc.

Also included in the agenda: service project packaging 1000 meals to feed the needy.

The photo of the the Past Presidents includes all executive officers of LCI. Also note a poster (Pledge) signed by all present supporting the next LCIF Campaign to raise \$300 million starting with the launch during the LCI Convention in Las Vegas, concluding in 2021.
