The Stingray as tested (\$70,770) costs less than half the Porsche (\$151,260) and almost six times less than the Ferrari (\$434,144)! But in all the specs, and performance trials listed, Corvette matched or beat one or both of the others. Not to mention that the Stingray's fuel economy was superior as well.

You can see the comparison chart on page 30.

Alas, at this stage in life, unless some kind patron among the CMCS members should bequeath to me a generous stipend out of admiration or just plain kindheartedness—maybe even just because he pities me—I fear I will never own a C7 Stingray. But who knows? Miracles do happen.

And speaking of contributions: thanks to all who have contributed to On *Your Marque* since I took over. The articles and information are a vital part of informing and entertaining our readers.


As I mentioned before, Jean and I are looking to move once we get our house sold. So far we've had a couple of nibbles, but nothing concrete.


Saturday Socials at the Plum



Laps From The Past, or Marque-In-Time

50 Laps Ago: November '63 Dick Stanley called the monthly meeting to order in the Alan Green Chevrolets' showroom. Dick made the announcement that the Club has been officially chartered by the state of Washington as of 7 November 1963. He also noted that the Board of Trustees would submit their slate of prospective officers at the February meeting, and at that time would entertain other nominations for Club officers from the floor; balloting would then take place by ballots through the mail. The subject of club jackets and car emblems were gone over with several



submissions concerning different art designs, colors, sizes, shapes and prices. Ken Knowles was asked to combine several of the items and come up with proposals in the near future for the membership to vote upon. Discussions moved on to the "point system" used for awards as a basis to determine the recipient of the General Motors yearly award, or any other such award sponsored by the Club. Bill Fowler made a motion with Dick Stanley seconding, and the proposal passed. With this meeting being the last opportunity to become a "charter member" of the Club, the merits were pointed out by Dick Stanley, giving all present a last chance in becoming part of this select few. George Green showed samples of the jacket mentioned at the last meeting. Several members tried them on while Ed Baker motioned that we accept them as the official Club jacket, was seconded by Bill Trippet, and was carried by a majority votes. An order was then placed for a number of the jackets. Activities for the month noted a rally took place starting at the Union 76 station on Mercer Island. A letter from Mr. Pike, assistant merchandising manager of Corvette News, expressing acknowledgment of our new club in their magazine. A vote was taken on the submitted designs for the club emblem, and was accepted. George Green of Green Chevrolet mentioned that a new car called the Cheeta was in the works of production, with a short discussion following. Slides were then shown of the trip to California. Following the meeting, Dick, the manager of Alen Green, conducted a tour of their parts department.

40 Laps Ago: November '73 President Ernie Kahler gets the monthly meeting started at the Meat Market Restaurant, and introduced guest speaker Bill Philley from the Northwest Rallye Club who gave a talk on the subject of rallying, while demonstrating with slides. Finance reported WWSCC received

a refund from their insurance coverage, while we, CMCS, owe the MGCC club funds for timing. CMCS dues are due in January, and, one person per club can have a vote at the autocross meeting. A vote was taken in favor of having the usual sit down dinner for the Annual Awards Banquet. The Club also agreed to host the Sports Car Spectacular for the Juvenile Parole Services next year. A motion was made & seconded to have Track in Tacoma become an associate member instead of them dropping out. Ernie asked if anyone was interested in taking over the WWSCC rep. duties due to Sharon's full schedule. Tom Marzullo reported on the Awards Banquet in Salem Oregon for NWACC, and noted the new officers for the coming year. WSCC is continuing with plans of regionalization; we could join them next year. Jim Hobbs read some possible rule changes of NWACC autocrossing for next year. Club activities noted a Casino Night in Redmond. There was a Practice Session at SIR in the middle of the month. Bob & Valerie Johansen, and, Ron & Mary Anderman were voted into full membership. Jim Hobbs gave out trophies from the Labor of Love Autocross. Kevin noted he can obtain trophies cheaper from the Philippines. Ernie encouraged everyone to begin thinking about elections for next year's officers.

30 Laps Ago: November '83 President Bob Johansen presides over the monthly meeting held at his home. Joe Oaks was elected President of NWACC for the coming year; their next scheduled meeting is slated for Feb. 11th at the Puyallup Fairgrounds, along with their Swap Meet on the 12th. Barry Long was voted into full membership, bringing the total to 141 members. Val discussed that she has been doing all the writing and assembly of the monthly newsletters, and asks for assistance. Club activities included an outing to Moonlite Bowling. Len Hodges reported on Practice Sessions at SIR, and advised that Jim Rockstad was very good to deal with & we should firm up our schedule for the coming year. At the Autorama both Mike Shelly and Ken Martin placed first in their category. Ken & Neil Millen are putting together a display for a February car show. A motion was passed to purchase decals to sell to Club members. Candidates for officers need to be considered. A discussion followed the meeting regarding distribution & use of treasury profits. Jeff Schmidt presented a revised version of the Drag Race video tape.

20 Laps Ago: November '93 President Dee Esping gathers the members together for the monthly meeting, following a pot luck Thanksgiving dinner at the home of Bob & Val Johansen, seeing 29 members attending. The Treasurer's report noted the ever present "\$50 petty cash" has been missing all year. John Paul Nelson III reported for Cece of the following new members being voted into full membership; Joe & Marie Cowan, Michael & Stephanie Hagestad, and, Dave & Teddy Olufson, bringing the total to 111. There is no scheduled Board meeting in December, but the annual party will be held at the Select Grill.

200-mph Corvette 'wagon' slated for production

Callaway AeroWagon brings Corvette shooting brake concept to the real world. Gentlemen, start your grocery lists.

O YOU LIKE the new Chevrolet C o r v e t t e Stingray, but wish it had just a touch more cargo room? Do you find the Ferrari FF to be both too expensive and too subtle?

Connecticut-based Callaway Cars, high priests of make-things-go-fast, are known for takingChevrolette cars and even some trucks to intense performance levels, whether in the form of its 540-horsepower Silverado 1500-based SportTruck, its nearly 600-horsepower Camaro, or its famous modified Corvettes.

Along the way, Callaway has continually redefined its ultimate expression of the performance sports car, currently offering customers the 650-horsepower C16. As the seventh-generation Corvette Stingray is being released, Callaway is once again taking it in a new direction by announcing a production run of its AeroWagon shooting brake concept. (Originally conceived as a vehicle to carry hunters, guns and game, a *shooting brake* is loosely defined as 3-door vehicle that is a cross between a coupe and a wagon.)

Initially revealed back in March of this year, the AeroWagon concept set off intense discussion all over the Internet. Debates ranged from whether the proposed "extended hatch" version of the new Stingray looked better or worse than Chevrolet's production version, to whether or not it would ever actually be made.

The AeroWagon will go on sale in January, Callaway's Mike Vendetto told us.


In what is perhaps the AeroWagon's design masterstroke, it manages to keep the Stingray's targa top intact, taking it to a whole new level of cool. That cool won't come cheaply, however. The full carbon bodywork runs \$15,000, which is on top of the cost of buying the base Chevrolet, of course.

For another \$22,995 Callaway will boost the V8 engine to 610 horsepower and add the company's other performance modifications (as well as a 3-year/36,000-mile warranty) that will be featured on its upcoming 2014 Callaway Corvette. With the performance package, the AeroWagon's slippery design and light materials should ensure that it will be close to or even faster than the standard Callaway Corvette.

Just how fast could the AeroWagon be? Callaway claims both its Corvette and AeroWagon will be capable of hitting 200 mph. Now for the most important aspects: Callaway hasn't released figures yet, but says the increase in cargo area volume will be "significant," and that its package won't change the front fascia or interior of the Stingray.

As for whether designer Paul Deutschman was influenced by the Ferrari FF, Vendetta isn't too sure — but shooting brake bodies like the Mercedes-Benz CLS Estate and Jaguar XF Sportbrake are officially back in style.

"The timing was strange," Vendetto said. "As he was sharing the AeroWagon with us, we started to see drawings of the FF."



It is easy for some to dismiss the AeroWagon as gimmicky, silly — gauche, even. But for some, this unique take on the quintessential American sports car is not only welcome, but an improvement on an already well-received design. If automobiles can be considered art (and at this point, who doesn't allow for the possibility?), then we might advise those clutching their pearls that at its best, art is as much blasphemy as it is rapture. Nothing screams "right kind of wrong" to us like a 600-horsepower, 200-mph, targa-top shooting brake. We can't wait to see it in action — just don't forget the milk.

TOUR TIPS

NE OF THE things CMCS members love to do is go on tours. These can be day tours or "overnighters" like the Wine Tour and Wet Weekend. We are fortunate enough to have a good number of new members, and some may like to know



what to do and look for in a tour.

This is not meant to be a "RULES OF THE ROAD" item, but rather just some thoughts on how to make tours more enjoyable and less stressful for all.

It's not the end of the world if a non-Corvette gets into our caravan lane.

Too often, it is easy to tailgate, speed up, slow down or perform some other less-than-safe maneuver in order to make sure that a steel car doesn't get in line. It just doesn't matter! In fact, it may be the biggest thrill the steel car driver will have all day by being in line with all those beautiful Corvettes! Sooner or later (usually sooner) the steel car will change lanes, turn off, or just vaporize, and we'll all be back together.

Learn to pass correctly in a caravan, on the freeway or otherwise.

On a freeway, it is very dangerous to try to pass someone and then squeeze back in line too soon with the other Corvettes. When you are passing and try to get back in line or get "hung out," or a turn-off or exit is coming up, learn to leap-frog ahead of the Corvette just ahead of the passed vehicle. If the Corvette you want to get behind has slowed down (this happens all too often after passing; don't be guilty of doing this!) keep going past the next Corvette(s) until to you can safely merge back into line. It is very important that we all learn this and pay attention with what's happening behind us. If we see another Corvette that wants to get back in line, safely allow a space for them AHEAD of you so they can get back in line easily. This leap-frog maneuver will take all the stress and most of the danger out of passing, and is a great example of teamwork.

If you don't have a radio that works with the club's frequencies...GET ONE!

The radio allows you to relax and enjoy the drive because you are in touch with the tour leaders and others on the tour. Therefore you stand a significantly less chance of getting lost (a thoroughly not-fun experience on a tour) because you know what's coming next and what may have changed. It is also really nice to have something pointed out that might have been missed, such as bicyclists, wildlife, landmarks, Mustangs broken down on the side of the road and other items of interest. In addition, there are some pretty clever people out there who can provide some entertaining comments over the radio, too.

We all need to know that use of the radio implies taking on some responsibility. We have to be sure to use them as if our kids were listening (or even worse, our parents!) and not use profanity, off-color jokes/comments, blaring music from your Corvette's speakers, endless monologues or anything else that would be inappropriate to other members.

Remember, you bought your radio to help make the use of your Corvette more pleasant, so use your radio and have fun with it!

Make sure the Corvette behind you knows where to turn.

If you make a scheduled turn and the Corvette behind you is too far back to see you make that turn, they may miss it. The best way to make sure no one gets lost is to take a turn and wait until the Corvette behind you sees you before you proceed. If everyone did this, no one would get lost because you would be "watching out" for the Corvette behind you and the Corvette ahead would be 'watching out" for you!

I hope this has been informative, and remember: have fun on those tours! That's why you bought that beautiful Corvette! ❖

CMCS Radio Tips

OW THAT WE are in the cruising/parade/tour season, we offer the following tips for the use of club radios. Most of us have them and we all realize what a great tool they are to help make club events and activities more fun and less stressful. So we thought the following would help.

First, hold the radio the right distance from your mouth. There is a natural tendency to hold the radio close to our mouths because we think it will help others hear us better. Actually, holding the radio too close is the main reason a lot of us are not understood. The recommended distance is three inches from mouth to radio, but that

should be treated as a minimum. A distance of four inches makes it much easier to be understood.

Second, be careful using the transmit button. A lot of us start talking before the button is fully depressed and the first part of what we say is lost. The best way to handle this is to press the transmit button, wait a second, and <u>then</u> start talking. The same is true when finishing our transmittal. We need to finish what we have to say and then wait a second to release to button. If we all follow this procedure we will not have any part of our "pearls of wisdom" fail to be transmitted.

Third, we must be aware of how loudly we are talking when we transmit. It is natural to speak in a louder voice than normal to make sure we are heard, but the radios we have—be they old or new—are very efficient. Loud talking or yelling is just not needed. Believe me, if we are not talking loud enough to be heard, someone will tell us!

Fourth, let's all try to be "tuned in" to radio usage. If we hear someone who is hard to understand, we should let them know (in a nice way) so we can get used to correct usage.

Fifth, use your radio to alert others to such things as bicyclists on the road, potholes, road hazards, police presence, errors in directions, etc.

Last, use your radio to make your club activities more enjoyable for yourself and others. While the radio's main purpose is to be used for safety and convenience, feel free to use it for those things which may make the tour or event more enjoyable for others. Such things might be to alert others to see certain landmarks, animal life, views etc. While dominating all radio usage is not a good way to go, the radio is your property. So, using common sense as your guide, have fun with your radio! •
