### Venerable Master



Greetings Brothers and Welcome to February!

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to serve as Venerable Master this year! I didn't get a chance to say much being that I had lost my voice, but I am really excited about this year. Having our installation at the DeMolay Center in the big lodge room had a lot of meaning to me, as some of you know that room is where my Masonic journey began. My grandfather, Ill. George Proper 33°, was not only one of the best men I have ever known he was extremely involved in many branches of Masonry. He was my

first glimpse into this fraternity that is so dear to us all. Some of my earliest memories include events held at my grandfather's Lodge. I vividly remember being a small child and sitting on Santa's lap when we attended Azure (Consolidated into Anaheim 207) Lodge's annual holiday party which always took place right in that room, my grandparents names are on two of the chairs there. These fond memories are what drew me back to masonry as an adult and will be part of the inspiration that I will look to throughout my year as Venerable Master.

Orange County Scottish Rite can only be as good as we the members make it. We have a lot of cool things going on this year especially the Orient Reunion Class taking place in Oakland the weekend of June 29th. At this Reunion class valleys from all over California will come together to put on all 29 degrees in one weekend. Please consider joining us. Now for this month's Masonic tidbits; February 9, 1909, Harry S. Truman received his 1st degree in Belton Lodge #450 Missouri 36 years prior to becoming our 33rd president. On February 18, 1909, our 27th president, William Howard Taft, received his 1st degree in Kilwinning Lodge #356 Cincinnati, OH. On February 23, 1887 Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, the creator of Sherlock Holmes, received his 2nd degree. And finally, on February 11, 1988 the Grand Master of Washington D.C. met with then President Ronald Regan and presented him with a "Certificate of Honor" which said that his life was a testament to his firm belief in the three principal tenants of freemasonry, brotherly love, relief and truth. This certificate also stated that his service to the public has broadened the applications of temperance, fortitude, prudence,

and justice to the benefit of all mankind. This "Certificate of Honor" was given to him as an acknowledgement of his life's work, but obviously did not make the President a Mason. However, due to this and similar certificates presented to him







# **Masonic Enlightenment**

# The Journey of the Stones

"Him that overcometh will I make a pillar in the temple of my God, and he shall go no more out: and I will write upon him the name of my God, and the name of the city of my God, which is new Jerusalem, which cometh down out of heaven from my God: and I will write upon him my new name."

Rev 3: 12

There are many references to stones in the lexicon of Freemasonry. The first tools given an Entered Apprentice are the twenty-four-inch gauge and common gavel. We are told the gauge is an instrument of time. We are instructed the gavel is used to hone rough stones into a state that can be made usable in building. The interpretation we are to draw from these tools is that there must be a relationship between time and building. In the attending historical lecture, we find that the stones prepared for Solomon's Temple were hewn, squared, and numbered in such a way that, when fitted, each part joined together so precisely that they had the appearance of being the handiwork of God rather than man. Again, there is an implication that creating anything of beauty and stability requires an investment in time.

We are then admonished the movable jewels of the lodge are the rough ashlar, the perfect ashlar, and the trestle board. Once more, the teaching is that a thing of extraordinary beauty and excellence often begins in a rude and imperfect state and comes to perfection only after designs have been tested and laid down, using time honored techniques employed by master craftsmen.

In the subsequent degrees of Masonry, we encounter a variety of stones—the unhewn stone, the cornerstone, cubic stone, the pyramid, the stone of foundation, keystone, capstone, the stone that was rejected, the cube of agate. And just as each of these stones has a special meaning in actual building, or as metaphors for construction— each also contains a secret; and all are tied to time. Collectively, they represent the craftsman's journey of life.

Perhaps this is why Freemasonry's origins are often traced to the Medieval stone-guilds. The guilds were a stone working industry with built in quality control mechanisms that ensured all craftsmanship would be an earned right, rather than a bequeathed benefit. Craftsmanship was both an art and a science born from the labor of time.

Although the power of our operative ancestors eventually waned, and Freemasonry became an institution more concerned with moral development than physical building, the methods of mentorship, secret instruction, study, and fraternal bonding bequeathed by our operative forefathers delivered a model for a different kind of learning, focus, and stewardship. We became a club for personal and spiritual development which uses stone working as a metaphor for life. Our peculiar group of men are to see their life as a stone to be carved and shaped into something deeply meaningful and beautiful, just as a sculptor finds an angel in a block of stone.

We start with the one "stone" in the quarry that we actually do have control of; we shape it and mold it and smooth it by the thoughts, actions and deeds of our life. Over time, we become better enabled to be the right exemplars of how men should think and act and live. We build a better world by first improving ourselves as individuals. Albert Pike said; "It is to single men that all the great works of man are owing." What he meant was that the greatest achievements of history are often the result of the creative genius of single men from whose example the world desires to emulate, with deeds and progress.

This image of the ashlar is powerfully seen in many jurisdictions by the placement of a rough ashlar and a perfect ashlar in a visible place in every lodge. It is a reminder to each brother that he is a stone taken from the quarry of his own beginnings, and is fully capable of forming and improving himself in such a way that he becomes a part of, and an accomplished fit with a larger society that is itself improved by his example. This is how societal improvement comes to be. This is the aim of our society of men. Te rough ashlar reminds us of who and where we are in life; the perfect ashlar shows us the refinement we are supposed to achieve with our life. The two together teach us that we have a job to do on ourselves; and that work can have enormous impact on our society and on building a more tolerant and loving world.

You see, terrorists, murderers, rapist, hate groups, and others who choose to commit inhumane acts against their humankind are not consciously shaping the building stones of their life, or their society. Rather, they are tearing down, stone by stone, life by life, doctrine by doctrine. Every day, such cruel and brutal examples of men engage in a battle of fear, ignorance, and intolerance within themselves and against others.

Masonry teaches that one does not erect a good life by choosing to always be a rough ashlar, to do nothing about ourselves and the human condition. Rather, we are to live an example that others will want to emulate; always taking con-

concern for the one stone in the quarry that we can actually control and shape, slowly knocking off the corners with the common gavel as we shape our perfect ashlar, while allowing each to shape his own ashlar at his own pace.

This is the venue for toleration. It is not through might, but through education, instruction, contemplation and enlightenment that we can make fanaticism and intolerance powerless.

We are engaged in the work of life. Our life is supposed to be a profession of our Masonry. If we make it so, we will earn the good will of mankind—and our reward will be perpetually good.

This is how Masonry contributes to the world. When each Mason sees himself as a living stone in building an edifice whereby God and humanity can encounter each other; when each Mason does his share to genuinely improve himself as a more enlightened human being; then our united eff orts can change everything for the good.

It all begins with our own conscious awareness that we are building a temple of improvement within ourselves. It is a temple erected to God. Thus, it is worth our time to make sure we are shaping it well. It is the real purpose of our life.

As Masons, we are intended to be spiritual temples that will mirror the divine, eternal purpose of Solomon's temple. You see, the construction of our own temple, like the construction of King Solomon's temple, is a way of life. In fact, it is life itself.

And we are the living stones.




