The Cantor's Corner

"The transformative power of music." This is a statement I heard repeatedly at the 72^{nd} Annual Cantors



Assembly Convention held recently in Louisville. I am not a regular attendee at these conventions, but because there was to be a tribute concert honoring the legacy of our Cantor Emeritus, Jerome B. Kopmar, and the

amazing youth chorales both here at Beth Abraham and Beth El in Akron, I felt compelled to go. Not only would we hear the music, every piece commissioned specifically for these youth chorales, but much of the choir featured at the concert was made up of alumni of these incredible groups, including 15 singers from the Beth Abraham Youth Chorale.

Although I was offered the opportunity to sing with the group as a "Friend of the Chorale," I chose to sit in the audience and listen. And I am so glad that I did. I have heard several of the original recordings of the Chorale and was anxious to hear these pieces performed live. The choir, composed of 25 alumni and several cantorial colleagues including Hazzan Jenna Greenberg, was conducted by Hazzan David Tilman of Elkins Park, PA. The group gathered for its one and only rehearsal just hours before the performance. It was as much of an experience to watch the singers as it was to listen. The professionally trained hazzanim, all of them proficient sight singers, sang precisely and beautifully, lending their mature voices to the ensemble. But it was the former Chorale members that captivated the audience. The sheer joy on their faces as they opened their mouths to sing as a group once again was priceless. As children, they had memorized each note and word of these songs that essentially became ingrained in them. They sang with love and respect, not only for the music, but for their beloved Cantor.

Towards the end of the program, Cantor Kopmar was the featured soloist for the piece "Halleluyah." Honestly, I am not sure how he held it together to do that, but he did not disappoint. After that he spoke to the audience, relating how daunting it was at the start of each season when he received a newly written piece, sometimes 250 pages of music, that he would then need to teach to his young singers. But what he made very clear was that this wasn't just about learning to sing a piece of music. This was Jewish education at its finest. Or as Cantor Kopmar likes to say, "education through the back door." These compositions were based on Biblical books and themes like Proverbs and Ruth. In the process of learning the piece, the children not only learned the words of the texts, but came to understand and appreciate that the notes and melodies chosen by the composer were very intentional and brought meaning to the composition. Another favorite Kopmarism is, "the music should serve the words," not the other way around. The Chorale alumni concluded the concert (without the additional singers) singing "May the Words," done a capella, under the direction of Cantor Kopmar. This was the most touching piece that brought tears to the eyes of many, including myself.

I believe that this honor bestowed on Cantor Kopmar achieved its intent. That was precisely to allow him to witness how impactful the experience of the Chorale had on so many Jewish children. For many, it was life changing. As an educator I know what it is like to wonder if what you do makes a difference. For the most part, once a student moves on you don't know if the seeds you attempted to plant ever took root. But these now grown Chorale members, 50+ years later, are the fruits of those seeds.

I am so glad that this event took place in the midst of Beth Abraham's 125th anniversary year and the 50th anniversary of Cantor Kopmar's arrival to Dayton. As if we did not have enough to be proud of already, this gives us one more reason to celebrate. I do hope many of you will join us for the next Decade Shabbat scheduled for July 13, at which Cantor and his dear wife Goldye will be with us. Cantor Kopmar will lead our Musaf service and speak afterwards at the Kiddush lunch. I look forward to sharing in this with all of you.

A 50th Anniversary of an All-Time Festival

Alan Cooper was my first Rabbinical School teacher of *Mikra' ot Gedolot* – "The Great Rabbinic Bible" – an edition of the Torah with the commentaries of



leading medieval rabbinic scholars. Little did I know, this distinguished professor of Hebrew Bible was once on the stage of Woodstock as the lead singer of the doo-wop band, Sha Na Na.

Sha Na Na, formed at Columbia University, was Woodstock's penultimate performance, warming up the audience for Jimi

Hendrix. Their act was captured in the epic 1970 documentary

"Woodstock." You can see all 12 original members, bouncing and

shaking and gyrating in their gold costumes for 52 glorious and immortalizing seconds, with thousands of longhaired young men and women singing along. And there's Cooper, on the lead vocals, belting out the lyrics to "At the Hop," wearing a yellow vest with no shirt underneath, dark sunglasses, and a leather cabbie hat, snapping his fingers and tapping his feet.

Alan Cooper would remain with Sha Na Na until 1971, a time span that put him on both The Tonight Show and The Merv Griffin Show — no small feat. He left the band (Jon 'Bowzer' Bauman replaced him) and eventually earned a doctorate in Biblical Studies from Yale University.

I thought of my former professor, Alan Cooper, because this summer marks the 50th anniversary of the historic Woodstock Music Festival, which attracted perhaps as many as a half-million, mostly young, concertgoers to Bethel, New York. The peaceful behavior of festival-goers gave, and still gives, Woodstock the aura of being the tangible affirmation of the "peace and love" ethos of the 60s hippie "counterculture." The "good vibes" given off by those like Alan Cooper were fortunately preserved for posterity by "Woodstock," one of the best concert documentaries ever made.

What I didn't realize is the significant role American Jews played in this seminal cultural event –that there

were Jews aplenty involved in every aspect of the festival. Michael Lang and Artie Kornfeld developed the concept for a major festival event to celebrate the 60s social movements. It eventually became the Woodstock Musical Festival with the help of two other Jews – John Roberts and Joel Rosenman.

There were several Jewish musical front-liners as well: Jorma Kaukonen (son of a Jewish mother) and Marty Balin (whose father was Jewish) of Jefferson Airplane; Arlo Guthrie (his mother was Jewish); Country Joe and the Fish's Joe McDonald (son of a Jewish mother) and Barry Melton; and Blood, Sweat & Tears' Jerry Hyman, Steve Katz, Fred Lipsius and Lew Soloff. There were the Grateful Dead's Mickey Hart and Bert Sommer and many in Sha Na Na, including Henry

Gross, Elliot Cahn and of course Alan Cooper.

Even the local Monticello Jewish Community Center played a part when it generously donated thousands of sandwiches to hungry festivalgoers, tens-of-thousands of whom were Jewish.

None of this would have happened without Max Yasgur, the New York state dairy farmer who defied his neighbors when he agreed to host the 1969 Woodstock Music and Arts Festival on his land. Max was the son of Samuel Yasgur, a Jewish immigrant born in Minsk.

Max Yasgur was no country yokel. He ran one of the biggest dairies in the county and had studied real estate law at New York University. He was also no radical; he was a registered Republican who supported the war in Vietnam. But he was a fierce opponent of intolerance and bias. In fact, notes journalist Nate Bloom, when it looked like the town zoning board might stop the festival, he confronted its members and told them that Americans in uniform fought and died to give us all freedom – and that freedom extended to those they viewed as draft-dodging, long-haired, anti-war hippies. Yasgur added that he didn't agree with hippies' views on the government, drug use, or "free love." Still, they had a right to be in the town.

Max Yasgur would surprise everyone when he decided to address the audience on day three of the festival, shortly before Joe Cocker took the stage to sing,

"with a little help from my friends."

"The important thing that you've proven to the world," he declared, "is that a half a million kids – and I call you kids because I have children that are older than you - can get together and have three days of fun and music and have nothing but fun and music, and God Bless You for it!"

Yasgur's appearance on the stage at Woodstock, judging from the crowd's response in the documentary, was as warmly received as Jimi Hendrix's version of the "Star-Spangled Banner."

On an interesting side note, in case you're thinking that Max Yasgur being a Jewish dairy farmer was an oddity, you'd be

mistaken. Nate Bloom notes that before the hippies, some Jews began their own "back to the land" movement in the early 20th century. In Sullivan County, the county where the Woodstock Festival was held, a Jewish

farming population developed as Jews, one by one, decided to settle there and farm. They were drawn by the beauty of the Catskill Mountains and a train line that took their milk to New York City. By 1910, somewhere between 500 to 1,500 Jewish farmers were in the county, constituting 30% of all American Jewish farmers. To help make ends meet, a number of these farmers started to take in boarders. This included the families who ended up founding the famous Grossinger's, Kutsher's, and Tamarack Lodge resorts.

I am proud that Jews played a critical role in this watershed event. What I am most proud of is the way we modeled how those on opposite sides of the political spectrum found a way to support and embrace one another. 1969 was a time of angry antiwar demonstrations and the Chicago Eight arrests. Yet, Woodstock was anything but angry or violent.

In my opinion, there was something vaguely Jewish about Woodstock. The festival celebrated ideals easy to label as *chesed* (loving-kindness), *tzedek* (justice) and *tikkun olam* (repair of the world), but were paraded under the banners of "sharing and caring," "we shall overcome" and pursuit of peace. What could be more Jewish than peace?

On this 50th anniversary of this watershed event, may each of us continue to *ohev shalom v'rodef shalom* – to love peace and to pursue it. Maybe, as Joni Mitchell envisions in her celebratory anthem to the festival, "we [will get] ourselves back to the garden."



As part of our year-long 125th year anniversary celebration, members of the Interview Subcommittee are talking with congregants, asking them to share synagogue memories. Clara Hochstein's interview beautifully captures what we are all about here at Beth Abraham – We are a community.

Clara remembers her younger years at K.K. House of Abraham at the Wayne Avenue Shul. She relates that, whenever there was a Jewish family celebration at the Shul, such as a *pidyon haben* (celebrating the first born male), practically every congregant attended and engaged. They shared the family's joy. They enjoyed delicious food prepared by the congregants themselves. Together, they created a kvelling community. All of them. Not just a few. All of them.

Clara's memory reminds us that a "community" is not just a synagogue building. It is not just a bunch of services and programs that bring us all together. It

is not just names of members on our roster.

No, it is about far more than that. It is about relationships. It is about coming together to care about each other. It is about making the most of every moment being with and being concerned about our synagogue friends. It is about working together – using our talent and our treasure - to ensure that Beth Abraham will continue to provide this communal setting, now and for decades to come.

It is Clara's memory that has become part of the thematic web of our anniversary year. It is reflected in all that we are doing this year to **recall** our beginnings, to **rejoice** in our successes and to **renew** ourselves to ensure a vibrant future.

This theme is also reflected in our anniversary fundraising activities. We created The 125 Fund to raise money not only to pay for our anniversary festivities (a replacement for funds we normally raise through the Women of Valor and Donor Events); we also

created this Fund to better ensure our future; and, more importantly, reflecting our community theme, we also created this fund to encourage **every congregant** to contribute.

For this reason, we seek 100% participation. So we ask each member to make a contribution to The 125 Fund. We ask each member to make a contribution that is comfortable – whether it is \$25.00 or \$25,000. Every gift is appreciated, regardless of amount.

The response thus far has been simply remarkable. So many of your fellow members have already stepped forward to participate and we are well on our way to reaching our 100% goal.

If you have not yet made a commitment, please do so as soon as possible. There is a list of current donors posted outside the sanctuary door. We update this list each week. We do this to track our goal of 100% participation. We hope to see the names of all congregants on this list.

CEMETERY TOUR AND TOAST WAS A HIT

"Oh my gosh!" "Fascinating!" "I didn't know that!" "Wow, Marshall Weiss is awesome!"

This is just a sampling of the comments from those who attended the May 5th cemetery tour and celebratory toast (Spirits of our Past: In our Hearts Forever) as part of our 125th year anniversary celebration.

We started our celebration at our cemetery. We gathered at the "Old Section"- the 1/8 acre portion that our Founders purchased in 1894. (Other sections were acquired in later years as the congregation grew in number.)

Marshall Weiss, nationally-recognized publisher of the *Dayton Jewish Observer*, director of the Federation-based Dayton Genealogy Society and Beth Abraham member, moved us from tombstone to tombstone to bring our synagogue history to life. He reminded us that our Founders were largely Lithuanians from Greater Russia. He pointed out that many of the early synagogue leaders were just in their twenties and most started out as peddlers. He showed us the location in the Old Section where the nine Torahs destroyed in the 1913 Flood were buried. We were absolutely fascinated with all that we learned.

After this cemetery tour, we reconvened at the Dublin Pub at the corner of Fifth and Wayne, the site of an early House of Abraham location. Once assembled, Michael Freed, our President, led us in a celebratory toast. We then enjoyed being together and sharing memories, savoring the beverage of our choice and a nosh.

A hearty mazel tov to the event co-chairs, Norm Lewis and Dena

Briskin, and their committee members. And a thank-you to Maryann and Jack Bernstein, the event sponsor.

We now look forward to the remaining anniversary events. As the enthusiasm mounts, you will want to be part of the celebration. See you there!

Board Transitions Well

At our Annual Meeting held in May, the congregation formally accepted the recommendation of our Nominating



Committee approving a new slate of officers and directors for the coming years.

Marcia, Mark & Norm will all be continuing their service on the Board while Lois and Howard, both long time members of Beth Abraham, are new to their roles on the Board of Directors. As

it has been my recent tradition, I'd like to take this opportunity to formally introduce both of them to the congregation.

Lois Gross moved to Dayton over 50 years ago from northern New Jersey and began a career as a teacher of both Spanish and French in a number of local schools. After her retirement as a classroom teacher, Lois has remained active professionally teaching English skills to Spanish speaking players of the Dayton Dragons baseball team, a role she has filled for nearly 20 years. Along the way she has raised three children, and has seen two of her grandchildren celebrate their B'nai Mitzvah at Beth Abraham with a third soon to follow. Interestingly, Lois celebrated her own Bat Mitzah at Beth Abraham as one of a group of 17 adult women who participated in a special ceremony in 1985. Over the years, Lois has been active with the Beth Abraham Sisterhood in a variety of roles including serving a term as Co-President. She is currently on the Kaleidoscope of Us Committee for our 125th Anniversary.

Howard Ducker is a lifelong Beth Abraham member whose family history with the congregation traces back to 1913 through his grandfather, Philip Froikin. Howard grew up in Beth Abraham on Salem Avenue and was active in USY during his high school years. After leaving the Dayton area for college and graduate school studies, Howard and his wife Sue returned to Dayton where they raised two children, a son and a daughter. Howard found himself returning to a more

active engagement with Beth Abraham when the congregation moved to Sugar Camp, and has become a regular presence at the synagogue over these past years.

In speaking to both Lois and Howard in preparation for my article, they both commented about their desire to build on the momentum of our 125th Anniversary Year celebration. They hope to see the continued active engagement and participation of the entire congregation as we conclude our 125th Anniversary Year and move into the future.
