International Organization for Standardization (ISO) in a nutshell

- ISO (International Organization for Standardization) is the world's largest developer and publisher of International Standards
 - More than 18000 standards published
 - More than 4000 standards under development
- 162 countries are ISO members
- The Central Secretariat in Geneva, Switzerland, coordinates the system
- The objective of documents published by ISO and IEC is to define clear and unambiguous provisions in order to facilitate international trade and communication









Standards development process

PROPOSAL STAGE

Following an identified need, a stakeholder proposes a new project

PREPARATORY AND COMMITTEE STAGE

A technical committee establishes the normative document

ENQUIRY AND APPROVAL STAGE

The normative document is validated through a public enquiry procedure

PUBLICATION STAGE

The validated standard is published

3 years of default duration

The three main principles of ISO standards development

ISO standards are developed according to the following principles

Consensus

The views of all interests are taken into account: manufacturers, vendors and users, consumer groups, testing laboratories, governments, engineering professions and research organizations

• Industry wide

Global solutions to satisfy industries and customers worldwide: an ISO standard must be applicable at the international level and by any type of organization

Voluntary

International standardization is market driven and therefore based on voluntary involvement of all interests in the market-place



ISO/IEC JTC1 scope and mission

- <u>Title</u>: Information Technology
- <u>Scope</u>: International standardization in the field of information technology
- JTC 1 is the standards development environment where experts come together to develop worldwide Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) standards for business and consumer applications
- Additionally, JTC 1 provides the standards approval environment for integrating diverse and complex ICT technologies
- The JTC1 mission is to develop, maintain, promote and facilitate IT standards required by global markets meeting business and user requirements

- Published ISO standards related to the TC and its SCs: 2426
- Published ISO standards under the direct responsibility of JTC 1: 341
- Standards and projects in progress: 667

ISO membership

LUXEMBOURG

- <u>Member bodies</u> (110 countries): A member body of ISO is the national body "most representative of standardization in its country". Only one such body for each country is accepted for membership of ISO. Member bodies are entitled to participate and exercise full voting rights on any technical committee and policy committee of ISO (one country = one vote).
- <u>Correspondent members</u> (42 countries): A correspondent member is usually an organization in a country which does not yet have a fully-developed national standards activity. Correspondent members do not take an active part in the technical and policy development work, but are entitled to be kept fully informed about the work of interest to them.
- <u>Subscriber members</u> (10 countries): Subscriber membership has been established for countries with very small economies. Subscriber members pay reduced membership fees that nevertheless allow them to maintain contact with international standardization.

Participation in the work of technical committees and subcommittees

• For each standardization technical committee (or subcommittee), a national member can be:

ISO/IEC JTC1 - LUXEMBOURG

- <u>Participating member (P-member)</u>: A P-member has an obligation to vote on all questions formally submitted for voting within technical committee or subcommittee, and to participate in meetings
- <u>Observing member (O-member)</u>: A O-member follows the work as an observer and therefore <u>receives committee</u> documents and has right to submit comments and to attend meetings
- A national body may choose to be neither P-member nor O-member of a given committee, in which case it will have neither the rights nor the obligations indicated above with regard to the work of that committee







The national mirror committees

• <u>Definition</u>: A national mirror comittee is the committee at the national level of an european or international committee (or subcommittee)

• Regarding ISO/IEC JTC1, 6 subcommittees and 1 working group are currently active at the national level:

• JTC1/WG7: Sensor networks

• JTC1/SC6: Telecommunications and information exchange between systems

JTC1/SC7: Software and systems engineering
 JTC1/SC17: Cards and personal identification

• JTC1/SC27: IT Security techniques

• JTC1/SC36: Information technology for learning, education and training

• JTC1/SC38: Distributed application platforms and services (DAPS)

• 31 delegates from Luxembourg are involved in ISO/IEC JTC1

ISO/IEC JTC1 National Forum

- A communication platform between IT standardization actors in Luxembourg has been set up by ILNAS through the concept of "ISO/IEC JTC1 National Forum"
 - Follow the different topics covered in the standardization committee ISO / IEC JTC1: votes, comments, feedbacks from the ISO/IEC JTC1 plenary meetings
 - Facilitate information exchange between ILNAS and the chairs of the national mirror committees related to ISO/IEC JTC1 subcommittees
 - Promote communication and exchanges between the chairs of the national mirror committees related to ISO/IEC JTC1 subcommittees
 - Prepare the annual ISO/IEC JTC1 national day and ISO/IEC JTC1 plenary meeting







ISO/IEC JTC1 National Day

- A national event aiming at informing the national market about current trends and developments of IT standardization and promoting IT standardization in Luxembourg
- The conference of this year:
 - takes place during the World Standards Day (14.10.11)
 - supports the slogan of this year: "International Standards Creating confidence globally"
 - focuses on Cloud Computing, that is a current hot IT standardization topic










ISO/IEC JTC1 National Chapters

• An ISO/IEC JTC1 National Chapter is established when a delegate (or group of delegates) in Luxembourg is (co-)editor of an ISO/IEC JTC1 standard and needs some input from an economic sector to develop its standard and to take into account the point of views of the stakeholders of Luxembourg

• A first chapter was already opened in 2009, in the frame of the ISO/IEC 27015 standard development (ISMS guidance for financial services), linking the representatives of the financial sector with the editor of the standard, member of the ISO/IEC JTC1/SC27 national mirror committee









Current development objectives for IT standardization in Luxembourg

- To develop communication and public awareness on IT standardization
- To have a delegate from Luxembourg in each active SC of ISO/IEC JTC1
- To follow and inform the stakeholders about new standardization activities having a potential impact on the economy in Luxembourg (e.g. Cloud Computing)
- To extend the scope to non-ISO/IEC standardization groups
