Covenant Group Registration is NOW

One of the highlights of summer's ending is gathering with our friends (both old and new) to share tales of our adventures and to deepen friendships. Our Covenant groups will be reconvening in September, and it's time for you to register, **even if you plan to continue with the same group you were in previously and ESPECIALLY if you would like to try a different group to make some new friends.**

Covenant groups are a key component of the ministry of High Plains Church. For those of you who may not be familiar with our covenant groups, they consist of 6 to 10



people, including a facilitator, who agree to meet monthly to discuss a topic (usually the monthly worship theme for the church) that is intended to prompt personal reflection and sharing on spiritual issues. Covenant groups are a wonderful way to connect with others in an informal setting that leads to deeper friendships than can be made at our brief and sometimes hectic coffee hour after the Sunday service. We currently have eight active groups and will add new ones as needed.

August Services - Examining Our Six Sources of Unitarian Universalism

Aug 6: Second Source - "Love and Justice: How Beloved Community Helps Us Work against White Supremacy" with Amanda Udis-Kessler. For those of us who are white, working to end racism and white supremacy involves dealing with often difficult responses and emotions - from resistance and defensiveness to immobilized guilt to anger, and many more. Working together, we can become better able to reach an emotional point of acceptance about both the way society is and our possible roles in changing it.

Aug 13: Fifth Source - "Are You a Humanist?" with Rev. Dana Lightsey. About 48% of Unitarian Universalists consider themselves humanists. The fifth source (of our Six Sources of UUism) explains how humanist teachings inform our faith: "Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit." This service will explore humanist history and perspective and how it relates to our lives today.

Aug 20: First and Third Sources - "Dances of Universal Peace" with Guest Musician and Dance Leader, Gayan Gregory Long. It is an honor to share with you one of my personal spiritual practices - the Dances of Universal Peace. With the help of Internationally renowned dance leader, Gayan Long, we will explore the "Direct experience of mystery and wonder" mentioned in our first source. The Dances of Universal Peace offers with sacred music and dance from traditions all over the world. Our third source is wisdom from the world's religions. This is an interactive service with very easy, kid-friendly dances. Feel free to participate or just sit and enjoy! Gayan and I will be playing with the HPCUU Band to provide music. BIO: Gayan is a Sheik (master teacher) in the International Sufi Ruhaniat Order and is influenced by many spiritual traditions. He was a long-time student of Choyam Trungpa Rinpoche and Pema Chodron, and is currently a senior student, and associate to the head of the International Sufi Ruhaniat Order, Pir Shabda Kahn. He tours all over the world as a Dances of Universal Peace leader, kirtan (Hindu devotional singing) leader, premier drummer, singer/songwriter, and spiritual teacher. He is fluent in all languages of the heart: Afro-Cuban-Brazilian drumming and singing, sacred chants and dances with Indian and Middle Eastern styles, community celebration and ritual, group leadership and inclusion and personal empowerment.

Aug 27: Fourth Source - "Heretics and Radicals: Perched on the Edge of Christianity " with UU Minister, Rev. Linda Bunyard. William Ellery Channing did not set out to start a new religion in Boston. He only wanted to reform Christianity. Maybe today's Unitarian Universalist movement is the best example of that reformation. BIO: Linda Bunyard found All Souls Unitarian Church here in Colorado Springs in 1983 when a new friend invited her to attend a service on Women's History. By 1986 she was applying to Starr King School for the Ministry, and in 1987 left on a 27 year journey around the country that included one settled ministry, one long contract ministry and ten interim ministries. She became an Accredited Interim Minister to help congregations understand their own family systems and to prepare them to have long and successful relations with their next ministers. When she left All Souls she told her friends that she wanted to be a Minister of Music and she did build music programs in all the congregations she served. But in retirement she has retrained and been certified for therapeutic music in hospitals, nursing care and hospice. She is back at home in Pueblo after over 40 years of wandering.

Unitarian Universalism (UU) draws from many sources:

- * Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and an openness to the forces which create and uphold life;
- * Words and deeds of prophetic women and men which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love;
- * Wisdom from the world's religions which inspires us in our ethical and spiritual life;
- * Jewish and Christian teachings which call us to respond to God's love by loving our neighbors as ourselves;
- * Humanist teachings which counsel us to heed the guidance of reason and the results of science, and warn us against idolatries of the mind and spirit.
- * Spiritual teachings of earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature.



Minister's Musings and President's Post

As we considered writing our minister's and president's post this month, Glenn and I (Dana) both realized that we planned to write about the same thing - the transition of HPCUU as we plan to move from one home to another. So we decided to write this article together. Some questions arise: Who are we when we are not in this building? What has been the role of this facility in the development of HPCUU? What do we want our future to look like?

Moving into this building for those who pioneered High Plains Church on Dominion Way was a momentous occasion. As Julie Feuerbach accounts, 100 percent of the congregants voted to move into a shiny blue-roofed building with... a GOLF COURSE. Much of our identity as a congregation has included memories forged while holding services, taking courses, being in fellowship on Dominion Way. There have also been challenges in the church's history that has solidified the bonds of this community. Those many beautiful people who have helped to make High Plains a welcoming community should be thanked and commended for providing so many significant and meaningful memories. We are our stories, our memories, and this church's heart and soul is comprised of the people who created these memories.

Now, we have to move; there's no way around it. Our home in Dominion Way has served us well over time, but we can no longer afford to stay here. If we were to stay here, we would need to close our doors. Moving to Vista Grande Community Church (UCC) has brought on anxiety, which is normal and expected. We are in transition and with change come uncertainty, which is unsettling, to say the

least! So, how do we move forward when our building is not yet sold and we are uncertain when a move can happen? Our next steps in our transition need to include building stronger relationships among ourselves and with the people at Vista Grande. It's like dating in our forties; we haven't dated them enough to be ready to move in together. Making plans without developing relationships is like arranging a marriage without dating.

In addition, as we consider our move, we need to spend good quality time together with ourselves, getting to know each other better. Having strong relationships among ourselves helps to establish a strong sense of identity that is not bound to this building. Our identity will come with us when we move and now is the time to strengthen that, for as Joe Uveges says in his song, "We are all in this together"!

Now is the time to celebrate all of the people and the stories that have built this church, moment by moment over the years. Let's take some time to tell our stories and reminisce about the past, enjoy the present together, and plan for our future. We will have activities to help us do this over the next many months. For, as Unitarian minister, Ralph Waldo Emerson reminds us, "What lies behind us and what lies before us are tiny matters compared to what lies within us." No matter what our future holds, let's take some time to remember what lies within us and let's be there for one another now.

Reflections on QUUest and Spirit QUUest Camps

After check in, we played a game called "human bingo" that helped us learn more about each other. It blew my mind to see how much diversity we had in this community.

The next day, we did an activity called "caucusing" involving identity. The first was about the LGBTQ community and how people might not always be open-minded toward those that identify as queer. We talked about the acceptance, and more importantly, how this was a safe space. The second was about race and ethnicity. We talked about the black lives matter organization, and why it is important to the issue of white supremacy. Then we talked about gender role stereotypes and how much they affect society. It was a lot to take in but they were very important topics and it helped me understand how these issues affect society, and what I can do to help.

The next day was fun and laidback which I appreciated after the deepness of the day before. We completed obstacles and missions dressed up as Disney characters. That night we had worship by the campfire, led by Spirit QUUest, and then we sang and told scary stories. It was an awesome day. The last night, we went to the chapel for worship. We talked more about identity and were

splashed with water to represent "cleansing to do the work of justice." That night, we sang and then formed a human line to say goodbye. I realized I had formed bonds with the community, considering everyone as friends.

All in all, the week at QUUest was incredible. I met new people of all different kinds, and learned to better understand some of the problems in society. A friend who is transgender told me: "This is the most loving community I have ever come across." QUUest is an amazing camp, and my experience there changed my life.

What we did ranged from extremely active fun activities to very deep spiritual practices. The Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans (CUUPS) is an organization dedicated to networking Pagan-identified Unitarian Universalists (UUs), educating people about Paganism, promoting interfaith dialogue, developing Pagan liturgies and theologies, and supporting Pagan-identified UU religious professionals.

The Covenant of Unitarian Universalist Pagans (CUUPS) was chartered by the Unitarian Universalist Association at the General Assembly in 1987 for purposes of enabling:

- * Networking among Pagan Identified UUs; providing an outreach of Unitarian Universalism to the broader Pagan community continentally.
- * Providing educational materials on Paganism for Unitarian Universalist congregations and the general public.
- * Promoting Pagan - Jewish & Christian dialogue; encouraging the development of theological and liturgical materials based on earth and nature centered religious and spiritual perspectives.
- * Encouraging greater use of music, dance, visual arts, poetry, story, and creative ritual in Unitarian Universalist worship and celebration.
- * Providing support for Pagan-identified UU religious professionals and ministerial students, and fostering healing relationships with our mother the Earth and all her children.

We also extend CUUPS further by including all diverse, spiritual paths. We bring together a wide variety of people who come together to learn and teach spiritual classes. They love using the facilities to have events, which include: New and full moon and the sabbats (holidays).

We hear a lot of people saying, "we didn't know that this church existed". "Can we come to church and will I be accepted?" So many have felt welcome with the CUUPS group. Willow and I (Chrissy) teach classes and perform rituals. We also have volunteers now that want to share themselves with the spiritual community. We, CUUPS have been blessed by community and church in the past year. We are meeting new people each time we have an event. The best feeling in the world is reaching out to those that want to feel like they have a spiritual place to come to. A place that is filled with peace and love. A place that they can feel safe and be themselves on their spiritual path.

High Plains Stitchers

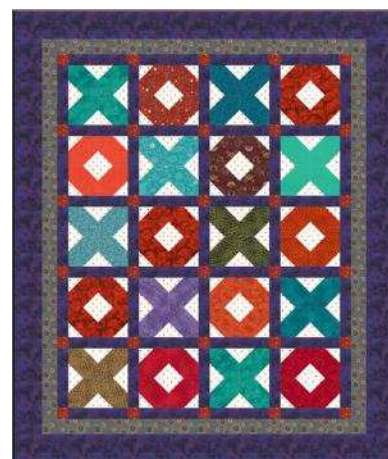
