AGO NATIONAL HAS A NEW PILOT PROGRAM CALLED "AGO VOLUNTEER MEMBERS"

AGO has initiated a pilot membership program for organists and choir directors who earn less than \$1,000 per year in their current position. If the person attends an educational workshop for volunteer organists hosted by Don Cook, AGO's Councillor for Education, they will receive a complimentary six-month AGO membership with all of the benefits of regular members with one exception – they will be able to access "The American Organist" magazine on-line in lieu of a hard copy. After the initial six-month period, they can choose to continue their annual membership for \$50.00 per year with these same benefits.

10th Annual Presidents' Day Organ Festival – MONDAY, FEBRUARY 20, 2017

(INFO UPDATED JANUARY 24, 2017 FROM LA CHAPTER)

<u>The 10th Annual Los Angeles Presidents' Day Organ Festival is Monday, February 20, 2017</u>. This year we celebrate four organs in the Pacific Palisades and Santa Monica area. With a total of seven performances featuring nine artists, it will be a full day of great music.

In addition to repertoire by familiar names like Bach, Franck, Durufle and Rheinberger, a highlight of the 2017 Festival is a focus on works by living Southern California composers. Plus, commissioned for the 2017 Festival is a piece by composer Alan Terricciano, Professor of Dance in the Claire Trevor School of the Arts at University of California Irvine. Christ Cathedral organist David Ball will perform the Terricciano piece as well as two West Coast premieres of new works by young composers Ryan Dodge (b. 1993) and Daniel Ficarri (b. 1996).

Southern California composers featured include Christoph Bull, Edwin Childs, Emma Lou Diemer, Norberto Guinaldo, Craig Phillips, Jan Sanborn, and Mark Thallander. Most of the composers will be in attendance.

Performers this year are James Vail, Haesung Park, Lisa Ham, David Ball, Mark Thallander, Peter Green, Christoph Hintermuller, and Christoph Bull. At the first venue, St. Matthew's Episcopal Church in Pacific Palisades, organist Hyeja Kim will assist resident organist Haesung Park in a duo organ performance featuring the churchs' two organs: a Fisk and a small mechanical action organ built by LA AGO member Greg Harrold.

Other venues are Corpus Christi Catholic Church with a mechanical-action Schudi organ, Santa Monica First Presbyterian Church with a Schantz organ, and Santa Monica First United Methodist Church with a Casavant organ.

A gourmet sandwich lunch is available for \$10 with advance reservations. Please make your lunch reservation at www.laago.org by February 16th. Plan to pay on site with cash or check. A reception follows the last performance, beginning at 3:15. CDs and music will be for sale and benefits the AGO.



Dear Carol,

It was so nice to see you again and particularly at an Organist's Guild Dinner meeting. I am so glad your students did so well in the competition on Saturday. AGO and MTAC have been very important in our lives for so many years.

Just been remembering so many special times with you, my dearest friend. For some reason July 4th comes to mind. Our sons, David, Michael, and Dan would start up at your house on the top of our steep alley with sparklers and let them roll down the hill, and then you would sit on your porch and we would sit in our patio and cheer on the beautiful display of fireworks at Brengle Terrace.

I remember playing for a program and we were doing duets and trying to do unusual things like changing seat positions on the bench without stopping the music....and with giggles in being "crazy" for a bit. And trying out new pieces for our students or organ pieces to see what effect they might have on our congregations, and playing piano and organ duets for concerts, meetings and services, and sharing fruits from the many trees in our Vista yards, grieving together over the loss of loved family and friends and your precious Bob being so kind to me, particularly as my beloved husband was

leaving this world, nine years ago, and always being willing to come down and fix anything I needed. And sharing new recipes, new ideas, new goals, and many dreams for the future. And now working together on a fun book "The New School of Practical Church Music-A Catalog of Courses" with the hopes that others will enjoy it when we finally get it on the market. Lots of great laughter with this creation.

Thank you for sending me a bit of information that I did not know or had forgotten about you. I did not know you were born in Long Beach. That was interesting that your parents were in the Navy and then you all moved to Winston Salem, North Carolina and then to Lake Worth, Florida until you were through with college. It was fun to read how you got started in church music. "At age 11, I was asked to play 'What a Friend We have in Jesus' on the piano for Bible School and practiced it about 100 times to learn how to play it as a hymn." Some of your life sounds like mine. I played at base chapels like you did only you met your Marine husband when you were playing and I had already met and married my Air Force hubby. So you played in base chapels and churches in Okinawa, Camp Pendleton, and Yuma! I got my organ playing start when I was about 13, too. Fortunate that you were selected to take some organ lessons that came with the new Lowry Spinet organ at your church and then the opportunity to continue organ lessons on a five manual Aeolian Skinner at the Episcopal Church. Wow! No wonder you loved it and decided to continue your organ studies at Converse College in Spartanburg, South Carolina. You have had so many wonderful experiences doing solos and accompanying in college and community chorales as well.

I guess I must have met you about in 1982 (or before) when you became the organist at Vista Methodist the first time. Then you served as organist/choirmaster at All Saints Episcopal (Vista) for 12 years. For the past 6 years you have been back at the Methodist Church and do both piano and organ in this lovely building. It has been my pleasure to attend that church for the many wonderful musical events you have done there... and lucky to play some duos with you, too.

It has been a very long friendship, musically and personally. Bill and I so appreciated all the talents and time you shared as we worked to make all the AGO and Community events successful. Included, of course, was the massive undertaking of a Regional Convention in 1988 and now organizing the scholarship fund for AGO plus so many other events to produce so many fine student musicians. I have rejoiced with your students' awards and musical careers as you did with mine and do you remember our summer piano parties and week-long workshops? What fun!

I am happy that you and Bob have been married for almost 20 years and I liked the way you wrote "He is a great supporter of my musical endeavors and the AGO. We both enjoy tennis. I also garden and try to keep up with maintenance of our home which we call the 'Hotel California' (you can check out but you can never leave)." We both share a vital interest in our family histories. It was great you could recently take the trip to Ontario, Canada to visit places and people connected with your family. I hope you are writing all that down – someone in your future family will be glad you did.

Well, dear Carol, I have rambled much too long and could still go on and on but I just want to thank you once again for being my wonderful friend.
