



the street from the founder and first President of Pan American Orchid Society, W.T. Mabry.

As a child she would sneak into his back yard to admire his Myna bird and unusual flowers. As she grew up, her father, who she did not live with, would surprise her with orchid corsages on every holiday and special occasion. And when she married her first husband he gave her the very first of her orchid plants, a beautiful red Cattleya from Jones and Scully in Miami.

Her mother in law, at the time, was an avid orchid grower in Miami. Gail still has the babies from her mother in law's Oncidiums plants from the seventies.



Gail has grown orchids for decades, and saw a lot of her precious plants be destroyed by her use of Benlate in the 80's and then wash away with Hurricane Andrew in the 90's. From the Editor

Sometimes the impossible—or almost impossible—does happen. A colleague, all the way from Brazil, sent me a newspaper link from the Courthouse News Service, published 9/13/16, I copied part of it here: "Rare Orchid Finally Has Federal Protection" - WASHINGTON (CN), by Ramona Young Grindle — The rare white fringeless orchid, first listed as a candidate species in 1980, has finally been listed as a threatened species under the Endangered Species Act. [...]

"I'm breathing a sigh of relief that this beautiful flower has finally gained Endangered



Species Act protection after a 41-year wait," Tierra Curry, a CBD senior scientist, said. "Protecting the white fringeless orchid will also protect the threatened marshy habitats that are such a special part of the southeast's natural heritage."

The orchid is found is small isolated populations widely scattered across Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, South Carolina and Mississippi. Of the 57

known locations, 33 are found on public lands, mainly in forest wetlands. Less than 20 percent of the populations have more than 100 flowering plants.


The plant is dependent on three butterflies for pollination, and on a particular fungus to aid the tiny windblown seeds to sprout and become established. Threats to any of those species also threaten the orchid, which is additionally challenged by habitat destruction from development, forestry practices, alteration of stream habitats, invasive species and collection.
