The Seven Stars pub in Dinton

On Friday 8th April, a For Sale notice was erected outside the Seven Stars pub in Dinton. This was the starting point for a roller coaster journey taken by a group of locals. Terry Heath, Dick O'Driscoll, Jon Taylor, Chris Robinson and Steve Merry, all regulars in the Stars, came together and decided to try to buy the pub to safeguard this asset for the community.

Initial response from the community was encouraging and through a combination of emails, leaflet drops, telephone calls and face to face meetings, sufficient funds were available to enable a final bid in competition with others in early July. The bid was successful and during the next three months a bank loan was arranged, a grant was applied for, surveys were carried out, prospective tenants were interviewed to take on the lease and for the last eight weeks the team actually ran the pub.

On Wednesday 16th November the purchase was completed and the Seven Stars now belongs to 64 local investors. The communal joy on securing the pub was overshadowed by the tragic and untimely death, three days before completion, of Chris Robinson.

The Seven Stars is now in the capable hands of Dave Berry and Stephanie Guiraute (ex The Crown in Cuddington) offering excellent value food and drink. It is hoped that the 'Stars' will become again the focal point for the community that it once was.

Theft of Lead from Dinton Church

Overnight during late October, thieves stole two sections of lead drainpipe from the south side of the church. The lower half of each piece of drainpipe was stolen and the upper half remains in place. Plastic piping is to be installed (by the time you read this article the installation should be in place) as a temporary measure and the PCC will consider how to best to replace the loss for the longer term. It would not appear to be sensible to replace with lead, since that would be at further risk of theft. Dinton Church is Grade 1 listed and English Heritage have, at least until recently, insisted on a "like for like" replacement policy. Recent reports in the press suggest that this policy may now have been relaxed. The pipes were marked with Smartwater which can assist with tracing the metal. The police have been informed, and their general advice (not just for the church) is for residents to look out for any suspicious persons or vehicles and to report these (0845 8 505 505). This might help to prevent, or detect, a crime.

Wassail- mid-12c., from Old Norse. *ves heill* "be healthy," *Wassailing* "custom of going caroling house to house at Christmas time" is recorded from 1742.

Swaddling - c.1300, probably a frequentative form of O.E. *swathe The* phrase *swaddling clothes* is from Coverdale (1535) translation of Luke ii:7.

Tinsel - mid-15c., "a kind of cloth made with interwoven gold or silver thread," from Mediavel French. *estincelle* "spark, spangle" (see *stencil*). Meaning "very thin sheets or strips of shiny metal" is recorded from 1590s.

Deck - as in deck the halls presumably like decorate.

Magi - c.1200, from L. *magi*, pl. of *magus*, from Gk. *magos*, word used for the Persian learned and priestly class as portrayed in the Bible (said by ancient historians to have been originally the name of a Median tribe), from O.Pers. *magush* "magician"

Bible Reading Notes

The Bible reading Fellowship was founded in1922 by an Anglican vicar who printed a monthly leaflet of daily Bible readings with a brief comment along with a mid week meeting to discuss the reading. Today from its headquarters in Abingdon the BRF distributes millions of Christian publications throughout the world.

The notes appear three times a year in booklet form and assist the reader to look at the Bible in a simpler way. There is a page for each day of every month with a verse a short article examining its meaning in layman terms and a prayer or reflection, The writers come from across the Christian spectrum -the clergy and lay people from many trades, professions and churchgoers each bringing their unique interpretation to characters and stories in the Bible. There is a choice of four booklets each costing £4 per copy:

1. NEW DAYLIGHT -Helps you explore the Bible deepening faith and understanding. It also notes some of the special festivals that make up the church calendar to help the reader understand the riches of the Christian year.

2. GUIDELINES-Offers a broader depth of applied theology and is intended for anyone who wishes their daily reading into a wider appreciation of biblication reflection. The readings are arranged in weekly units broken into six sections plus an introduction.

3. THE UPPER ROOM -Written exclusively by the readers themselves who seek to share the insights of their faith with others. The readings contain a reflection on the passage and prayer followed by a thought for the day.

4. DAY BY DAY WITH GOD- Provides a short Bible passage explained and applied especially for women by women. A suggested daily prayer or meditation is included which helps the reader connect the passage with their own lives. 



DECEMBER GARDENING



Not a month to be very active in the garden, especially if the weather is as bad as last December.

Looking back over 2011, despite the climate playing all sorts of tricks, hot temperatures in April and May and some very dry periods, in general the best year for a long time for fruit and vegetables, although some of my dahlia growing friends had to wait a long time for some of their plants to flower.

So far 2011 has been very dry in this part of the country, and unless there is some very wet weather in the next two months 2011 will be the driest year for a long time. I do write this a month in advance, just in case it rains all through November. Protect tender plants from frosts with fleece, so much better than having to cover with straw.

Look back and consider what went wrong and try to put things right next year, order or buy seeds and plants in good time, check over any plants, fruit or vegetables that may be in store and the only planting that some people may do, is to sow seeds of special onions in order to grow very large bulbs, this is traditionally done on Boxing Day.

Wishing everyone a Happy Christmas and good gardening in 2012.




