



Due to the very high COVID levels in Essex and after advice from the Diocese, the clergy and churchwardens of the four parishes have advised that, in view of the present COVID situation, they will not hold services in any of the four churches at the present time.

The only exception to this is funerals, and provided the gathering consists of no more than 30 persons .

Open every day for private prayer but there will be no services until further notice. Please remember when you visit to observe social distancing and to wear a mask, unless you are exempt.

## St Mary's Fairstead

There will be no services until further notice but the church is always open for individual visits and private prayer. Please remember when you visit to observe social distancing and to wear a mask, unless you are exempt.

## St Germanus Faulkbourne

Churchwardens have decided not to hold any further services during the lockdown period. If services are permitted in March the Churchwardens will advise by phone and Facebook.



The four parish churches are currently not holding congregational services but Terling and Fairstead are open daily for personal prayer and quiet time. Rev'd Paul and Rev'd Will also hold online services each week, details of which are on page 12.

Let's hope that by the March magazine we are looking forward to being able to see our friends and families once more, but please remember that even once we have had our vaccinations there is a chance we might still spread coronavirus. This means it is important to continue to follow social distancing guidance and, if you can, in places where it's hard to stay away from other people, wear something that covers your nose and mouth.



# A Report from a Border Outpost 17.01.2021.

## From our special correspondent 'Up Country' in Ranks Green!

Well as our Editor pointed out in her request for articles there really is very little to actually report at the moment. Apart from the covid restrictions the weather is pretty typical for January, dreadful. So even dog walking presents little material to write about. I will draw on some of my travels though to make some attempt although they are not anywhere near as exciting as Peru or India I'm sure. For various reasons I've never really got round to a great deal of foreign travel although there are many places I would love to go. I absolutely love flying but the antics of fellow passengers on recent flights have driven me nuts. When returning from a trip to Rhodes in 2019 I was so determined not to let them get to me that I spent the whole flight looking straight ahead ignoring everyone, it was impossible to read or sleep. When I got up to leave the plane at the end of the flight the man who had been sitting next to me said loudly to his daughter "See she is alive, she is real." Anyway there are some absolutely wonderful places to visit in the UK.

One of my favourites is Scotland, there really is so much to see. We stayed in Inverness for our honeymoon over 50 years ago. That was my first visit to Scotland and it didn't disappoint. We travelled by Sleeper Train and hired a car when we arrived. We were advised that if the weather was fine in the East it would be raining in the West and visa versa and this seemed to be the case, so we planned our trips according to what we woke to in the mornings. We took the ferry to the Isle of Skye, visited ancient castles, Highland Games, the Culloden Battlefield and of course Loch Ness and it was a great introduction to Scotland.

A few years later we spent a couple of weeks on the Isle of Arran in the Firth of Clyde. Again we travelled by train and hired a car. I really enjoy travelling by train and find it quite relaxing, well as opposed to air



travel. I liked the compact island life of Arran, being able to drive right round it in a day, the many changes of landscape and scenery. Also the people were really lovely, nothing was too much trouble. On a bus trip one day the driver drove a lady right up a track to her door because she had a lot of shopping.

I've spent a few weekends in Edinburgh and it is one of my top five British cities. It's got everything except a river through the middle of it but never mind it's not far away. The Castle and other museums are fantastic, the architecture is outstanding, there are hundreds of other historic buildings. The Royal Yacht Britannia, Botanic Gardens and Zoo are a bit further out but all easily accessible via wonderful bus services. A walk to Arthur's Seat enables a good view of the city and its surroundings and the shopping is also pretty good.

In 2014 a friend and I completed the Great Glen Walk, starting at Fort William in the West and finishing at Inverness in the East. For those of you that enjoy a good walk I cannot recommend it enough. Walking along Loch Lochy, the Caledonian Canal and Loch Ness was a wonderful experience, not too challenging, but not easy, at least navigation was simple. Looking down on Loch Ness from high up in the mountains was spectacular, no signs of Nessy. Apart from a few villages and



accommodation we didn't see many people on route, some days hardly any. It was a very quiet, calm, peaceful walk.

In 2019 I knocked something off the proverbial `Bucket List' and visited the Orkney and Shetland Islands. I don't know why we always group these two archipelagos together because they are over a hundred miles apart. Orkney is only about six miles from the North coast of Scotland. Actually getting to either group is complicated. I thought I'd found the answer on line when I found a cruise that took in Orkney, Shetland and the Faroe Islands (somewhere I also want to visit) and then finished up in Belfast. Magic. I've been before but I could see the Titanic Experience, something else on the list. I was guickly on the phone to make a reservation and almost completed it when the travel agent said "its only a small ship, so I'm sure you will enjoy it." "How small"? I enquired. "About 1500 passengers" she said. I said "Sorry to have wasted your time but that's about 1450 too many for me". Eventually my sister found a marvellous coach/ cruise trip which suited us really well. We travelled across from Stirling and spent a few days in Caithness on the North Eastern tip of Scotland. We then proceeded by boat to first Orkney and then Shetland. Our time on both was short and only gave a brief glimpse of what they are really like but they had so much to offer.

The Orkney Isles have wonderful scenery, mystic ancient historical sites and of course numerous relics and remains from military and naval battles in both world wars. The Italian Chapel, completed by Italian POWs in the Second World War is breath taking. If you stand still and close your eyes looking down on Scapa Flow, you can see it filled with all the Battleships of the Second World War. The scenery of the Shetland Isles is far more rugged and there is much less cultivation and no trees. The light



on clear days, which are few, is staggering and the air is noticeably so much purer.

It is now possible to travel by car, cycle or even walk round the Northern edge of Scotland. The North Coast 500 is a 516 mile route starting and finishing at Inverness Castle via John O Groats, Sutherland,. Ullapool and Wester Ross and was first launched in 2015. Another one for my Bucket list.

# Free online lectures



### Loan fee fraud

#### 2020 was a hard year. However, there are scammers out there looking to make it even harder.

Loan fee fraud occurs when people pay an upfront or advance fee for a loan they never receive. It's an increasingly common scam which is reported to the Financial Conduct Authority, with people losing £220 on average.

The good news is that you can protect yourself with this guick three-step check:

- If you're asked to pay an upfront fee, it could be a scam
- If you're asked to pay quickly, it could be a scam
- If you're asked to pay in an unusual way, such as vouchers or money transfer, it could be a scam

Always check that the provider is authorised by the FCA before you borrow. Visit the FCA's Financial Services Register.

# **Protect your new Christmas gifts**

# Over Christmas you may have been lucky enough to have received some rather nice gifts.

Have you got rid of the packaging yet? Left by the roadside for the recycling collection - what better advert to the thief of where to find some new things to steal. Where possible fold the boxes inside out, or tear the box up, or package it in something else, or take it to the recycling centre yourself.

How many of us have thought about **recording the serial numbers or property marking** it. Be it a cycle, electrical goods, garden equipment or mobile phone it may have a serial number. You can record your serial numbers free of charge at <u>www.immobilise.com</u> and others. There are also a number of property marking products available like indelible pens, UV marking pens, SelectaDNA, SmartWater, CRE mark by CRE products to name but a few (check suitability for the property item).

With **jewellery and antiques** don't forget to **take photographs** of it, include an 'Object ID card' or ruler in a photograph to give it a scale. Some of these property marking products may also be suitable and you can now upload photographs of your property to Immobilise too.

Many TV's, personal music devices, computers and other electronics come **pre-loaded with security and/or tracking software**, make sure that it is activated. <u>If you are storing valuable</u> <u>college work or other on a laptop don't forget to</u> <u>back up your work elsewhere just in case you lose</u> <u>the laptop.</u>

**Smart phones**: Don't forget to make a note of the **IMEI number** of a mobile phone, to find it key in \*#06#, with this if it's stolen you can block it. You can **download an 'App' on mobile phones** to find your phone and more importantly wipe that data stored on it, check your 'App store' or mobile phone provider. A little reminder - When texting or talking on phones, or listening to music **remain 'in touch' with your surroundings**, a number of road accidents, thefts and assaults occur when we fail to note what's going on around us, don't forget to pass this advice on to children.

# The Story of Edward Bear & his Club

Last month we heard the sad news that somebody had apparently stolen poor old Edward Bear, who had sat benevolently looking out over the Terling church font for many a year. Why was he sitting there and what was his story?

This month Jackie Isted has kindly put pen to paper again to tell us the history of the much loved Edward Bear.

**Terling Edward Bear Club** was started by The Hon Margaret Fox in 1983 when she moved from Haddenham, Cambridgeshire, into Tudor House, Terling.

An Archdeacon's widow who had run a club at her husband's Church, the club was very welcome as



at that time there was only Play Group on two mornings a week for 3 to 5 year olds, and Sunday School for 3 plus year olds.

Edward Bear Club was held at Tudor House once a week from 2-3pm and welcomed babies to children of school age. Every child had a bear to cuddle during a short service, followed by social time with refreshments for the mums.

Margaret was helped by Annabel Burtt and Audrey Mitchell who played the piano.

Margaret moved to Ely in 1966 to be near her family, and Reverend John and Penny Hall

continued running the club, sometimes in the Chapel or the Rectory,

and helped by Annabel Burtt, Jackie Isted, Audrey Mitchell and Hilda Doe.

Unfortunately for Edward Bear Club, children became the Rising Fives, starting school just after their fourth birthday, and Play Group changed to Pre- School five days a week from 9.30am to 3pm, which depleted numbers attending Edward Bear.

Our numbers fell with only babies to three year olds, and mums often had to miss out on social time in order to collect their older children from school just after 3pm. With the evolving of events, Reverend and Penny Hall closed Edward Bear in 1994.

In September 1994 Jackie Isted was asked to be a midday assistant at Terling Primary School to specifically supervise these little tots.

We just hope we can all get together in person soon.




