



One of my classmates from seminary who is a pastor in England shared a recent reflection of his. I put it in this bulletin on page 5. If you don't know who Captain Tom is, google him ... an amazing person of goodness and perseverance.

I joke all the time that the diocesan Annual Catholic Appeal should be called the perennial appeal. I think we might say that about Lent. It seems like we have been in a perennial lent since CORONA hit last year. I share Fr. Nigel's sentiment about "the Church encourages us to renew our hope in the resurrection and not to be discouraged by the state of the world."

So I gave a donation to the Annual Catholic Appeal (\$10 for every year I have been ordained) and I take on the season of Lent not to beat myself up but to renew the hope, the joy, the love of the Lord. May God be praised!

There is so much from which to take encouragement here at the Parish. I see our dedicated ushers and readers and Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist and I am lifted up. One of our Extraordinary Ministers of the Eucharist is also an employee at Laurel Lake Nursing Home, since it is shut down to our normal Monthly Mass and Monthly Rosary, she has been bringing Eucharist and the Sunday Bulletin to the Catholic residents there. Her stories of the efforts of the staff and the faith of the residents have been a light shining in the darkness throughout this past year.

I think of our school. Nearly a hundred days of face to face learning! And they are not turned in on themselves. Most recently they made bags of Valentines that I was able to give to another parishioner who organizes a Valentines Project ... oh the goodness of reaching out to those in need with a simple message of hope and love!

I pop into the Faith Formation Zooms and I cannot but filled with joy at the dedication of so many of our youths who get up on a Sunday Morning to learn about their faith. You give me hope and fill me with joy.

Someone recently asked how they could get the joy of the Lord. I honestly think we all have it. It's God's gift to anyone. We need to remove the things that block it from welling up within us. That may be the most important part of Lent ... remove the sin and discouragement and yuck to let God's joy well up to fill us and brim over to a weary world.

#### **LENTEN REGULATIONS**

- 1. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of abstinence from meat as well as days of fast, when only one full meal is allowed. On days of fast, two other meatless meals may be taken according to one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal.
- 2. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat.
- **3.** The obligation to abstain from meat begins at fourteen (14) years of age.
- **4.** The obligation to fast begins at eighteen (18) years of age and ends at fifty-nine (59) years of age.
- **5.** Although the faithful may excuse themselves for a just cause from these laws of fast and abstinence, there is an obligation to substitute another penance and no Catholic should lightly excuse himself/herself from this obligation in the Lenten season.

## Scripture Meditation - February 21st, 2021

St. Oscar Romero said, "Aspire not to have more, but to be more." These powerful words provide the perfect framework for a conversion oriented Lenten experience. God is giving us this Lenten sign to stop being concerned about what you have and focus on who you are. This requires that we create a desert space and listen more attentively for God to reveal His presence. It is all so wonderfully simple on the one hand and so incredibly challenging on the other. The message is simple: love God, neighbor, and self. Those simple words make great sense, but we struggle translating them into reality. Our attachments, compulsions, obsessions, addictions, routines, and busyness all anchor us to the "idol of the self," keeping us mired in our compulsive need for self-aggrandizement. It's not about us!

God vowed, long ago, to nurture, sustain and protect the relationship He has with His people. He called us into being, nurtures us in being, and sustains us in being. Without the Loving Divine Presence, all life would cease. Once we slow down a bit and clear away some of the clutter, we can see how the journey of our life is unfolding. We can see what brings us in and out of tune with God's love and how we can better imitate God's loving fidelity in our relationship with Him. In short, we will see our myopic short sightedness and figure out how we can better share the Divine Fire within with others. Lent isn't just about giving stuff up for forty days and indulging again at Easter. We need to push things much farther and wrestle with the question of how we can be more. "Being more" means becoming more fully alive and in touch with the holiness of life and the divinity that lives in and empowers all beings and things. It is realizing that the "quality" of our presence is crucial to being an effective witness and herald of God's unconditional love.

The illusion we have bought into causes us to believe that the wrong things and systems matter. We tirelessly fight to keep things the way they are, to return to the former ways of doing things or restore some nostalgic fantasy memory of "life in the good old days." Lent isn't about maintaining what we have or returning to something that is gone. It's about becoming something new. It's about being more focused, centered, convicted, and grounded so that we can be a person who truly loves and treasures being made in the image of God. The secret to Gospel living is not found in accumulating anything for ourselves, even merit points for heaven. Gospel living means learning how to live with less so that others can live with more. The thought of permanently giving something up makes us feel uncomfortable. Truth often does.

PLEASE WEAR YOU MASK THROUGHOUT THE MASS: Unless you have an exemption and cannot wear a mask, please be sure to <u>wear a mask to Mass</u>. We all need to be respectful of each other and recognize that while most will be wearing masks, there are folks who have a qualified exemption not to wear one. If you have concerns regarding being seated near someone with out a mask, please don't judge, just ask an usher to reseat you. We also hope people will <u>use the bathroom and wash up before you get to the church</u>. We will continue to seat people three rows apart and try to separate "COVID bubbles" within the pews by at least

<u>6 feet</u>. There is <u>no holy water in the fonts</u>, <u>no sign of peace</u> and <u>communion is now allowed both on the tongue or hands</u>. These are unusual procedures that we continue to get used to, but they are acts of charity and solidarity with each other as navigate this time of pandemic. Thank you for your patience.

<u>ADORATION:</u> Takes place each day, Monday through Friday, following the 7 am Mass until Noon (except for funerals or severe weather). We are using the main church of St. Mary Mother of the Church in Lee until we get to a situation when we can safely re-open the Oratory. Join us for a few moments of quiet or stay for a whole hour. God's grace is present in a powerful way.

Next Sunday (2/21) we will celebrate the Rite of Sending at the 11 am Mass and then we go to Springfield to meet the bishop within the Rite of Election & Call to Continuing Conversion. #### **Captain Tom and the Ripple Effects of Goodness**

We recently celebrated *Candlemas*, or the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple (2nd February). When Joseph and Mary brought the baby Jesus to the Temple in Jerusalem - to fulfil the Law by consecrating their first-born son to God - the old man Simeon, to whom the Holy Spirit had revealed that he would see the Messiah before he died, took the child Jesus in his arms, and said, "Now, Master, you can let your servant go in peace... because my eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared for all the nations to see" (Luke 1:29-31).

I'm sure many people were touched by the fact that Captain Sir Tom Moore was called home to God on this very day. This old solider, aged 100, who lived in Bedford England (and whose grandchildren have acquaintances in our parish here in London) touched literally millions of hearts - at home and abroad - by simply walking in his garden to raise funds for the NHS! Something about his dogged determination to keep going, despite his frailty, struck a chord with so many of us. His actions remind us: there are many Captain Toms in our society! How many people there are who quietly but persistently seek to do good, to help others, and to reflect God's goodness - we pray that, like Captain Tom, their efforts may have ripple effects beyond anything they can imagine!

On Ash Wednesday last year, my car suffered a flat tyre. I muttered, "It's going to be an interesting Lent!" Little did I know: not long afterwards came the first lockdown. For many of us, the past year has been like a long Lenten experience, but the Church encourages us to renew our hope in the resurrection and not to be discouraged by the state of the world. "The Lord is waiting to be gracious to you; happy are all who hope in him." (Isaiah 30:18). May this season of grace prepare our hearts to experience the joy of Easter with new confidence, for our Saviour never abandons his people.

**Question:** Does it matter what leg you kneel on when genuflecting?

**Answer:** Genuflection is an act of devotion that literally means "to bend the knee." For many Catholics, it's an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection. The practice of "bending the knee" is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. It has been said that the practice dates back to the time of Alexander the Great, but it became a common part of etiquette in the royal courts of the Middle Ages. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting, becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist. In our tradition, although many have been taught or prefer to genuflect by placing their right knee on the ground, there is no prescribed way to genuflect. This is especially important to keep in mind if physical limitations or age make certain movements difficult for us. Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during eucharistic adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. In churches or chapels in which the tabernacle is in a separate space, we are invited to simply bow toward



Very old paper cemetery maps are being converted into PDFs so that engineers can work with them to create an overlay of the cemetery that will be viewable by grave on Google Earth. In addition, once the software is tailored to our specific needs, we will begin the painstaking process of data entry. We ask for your patience as moving all records online will take a great deal of time. A very special thanks to our very generous donors who have helped to make this all a reality!
