

Field Trip Planning

Location & Hours of Operation

The park is open every day of the week from 9 am to 5 pm except Christmas Day, Thanksgiving Day and New Years Day. The park's address is: 450 Auburn Ave. NE, Atlanta, GA 30312.

Fees

The park is fee FREE.

General Parking/Bus Parking

FREE General and bus parking is available on John Wesley Dobbs Avenue between Boulevard and Jackson Street. See park map for more information.

Group Size & Safety

It is recommended to limit field trip groups to 125 students or less with a minimum chaperone to student ratio of 1:10 depending on the age group. Safety hazards onsite include high traffic areas with several street crossings and a high volume shared public spaces.

Accessibility

All park facilities are wheelchair accessible and visual displays are subtitled in English. Park brochures in Japanese may be requested at the Visitor Center.

Picnic Area

Having lunch at Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site? The outdoor amphitheater, Peace Plaza on the corner of Jackson Street and Auburn Avenue (across from Historic Ebenezer Baptist Church) is a great place to rest and take a leisurely lunch with your class. Additionally, there is a covered picnic pavilion with 10 picnic tables south of the bus parking area surrounded by grass. Both areas are first-come, first-served.



Educational activities and programs are offered annually for a limited number of field trip groups by reservation only at Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site. Program offerings are limited to school groups and may not be reserved by private tour agencies or third parties.

- All campus facilities are within a 5-7 minute walking distance.
- FREE parking is available between Jackson Street and Boulevard on John Wesley Dobbs Avenue.
- Facilities in GREEN are open to the general public with exception to the Birth Home. Birth Home tours are available by reservation at the Visitor Center upon same-day arrival.


Where to Go

Visitor Center

- Theater Film Showings:
 - <u>New Time, New Voice</u> (30 mins): A film about the life and legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his role in the Modern Civil Rights Movement
 - <u>Children of Courage</u> (15 mins): A film on young people and their role in the struggle for civil and human rights
 - <u>Birth Home</u> (15 mins): A video tour of the home where Martin Luther King, Jr. was born with stories of his childhood.



- <u>Courage to Lead Exhibit</u>: Permanent exhibit follows the movement from Jim Crow laws up to the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
- <u>Children of Courage Exhibit:</u> Young people and the struggle for civil rights from 1930s to present
- D.R.E.A.M. Gallery: Explore the rotating exhibit space featuring aspects of the movement
- <u>Birth Home Tour Tickets:</u> (Free) Tour the home Dr. King was born and lived the first 12 years of his life. Tickets are available on a first-come, first-served basis, same day, in-person reservations only. Tours are limited to 15 persons per tour. No exceptions. Check the park's website to see the park's "Open House" schedule. "Open House" tours are a condensed birth home tour, similar to a walk-through. No tickets or reservations are required on special "Open House" tour dates.





- <u>Heritage Sanctuary:</u> Visit the spiritual home of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. at the Historic Ebenezer Baptist Church Heritage Sanctuary. The sanctuary has been restored to the way it looked from 1960 to 1968 when Dr. King co-pastored along side with father, Rev. Martin Luther King, Sr.
- Oral History of the Church: (5-7 mins) Ranger-led talk in the sanctuary about the history of the Historic Ebenezer Baptist Church and heritage of the King Family involvement at the church
- <u>Fellowship Hall:</u> Original sanctuary of the church from 1916 to 1922 now showcasing an exhibit, interview film of Dr. King's older sister, and several original artifacts of the church

Where to Go



The King Center

- <u>Freedom Hall Exhibit:</u> a 2-story exhibit hall showcasing personal artifacts of Dr. King and Mrs. Rosa Parks
- <u>Eternal Flame & Reflecting Pool:</u> serves as a reminder of the Kings' undying commitment to their beloved community and preserved the final resting place of Dr. & Mrs. King

Historic Fire Station No. 6

- Exhibit Hall: features the history of Atlanta post-Reconstruction, the Rise of Sweet Auburn, and the history of firefighting in the city
- 1930s Fire Truck: features the same model fire truck that Dr. King would have seen in the fire station during his childhood years



• <u>Sweet Auburn Film:</u> (15 mins) showcases the thriving Sweet Auburn community from its conception



Park Bookstore: Purchase souvenirs and other memorabilia benefiting the Martin Luther King, Jr. National Historic Site. Teachers receive a 15% percent discount on materials for the classroom. Ask the bookstore cashier for more information.

King Birth Home: Located at 501 Auburn Avenue, Dr. King was born and lived the first 12 years of his childhood in this house. The house was originally built in 1895 and purchased by Dr. King's maternal grandfather in 1909. *Tickets required. Make reservations at the Visitor Center.*

<u>Preservation District:</u> Self-guided wayside exhibits showcasing the Sweet Auburn community from Boulevard eastward to Bradley Street on Auburn Avenue.

The following is intended to assist planning your group visit to the park. Please note the recommended duration of time in each location is an approximate estimate. Most visitors and groups plan to spend between 2–3 hours on-site.

Visitor Center

Total Duration: 20 minutes—45 minutes

 - ⇒ Grades 5 and Up: "New Time, New Voice" (30 Minutes)

Historic Ebenezer Baptist Church

Total Duration: 20 minutes—30 minutes


- Heritage Sanctuary (upstairs)
 - ⇒ Listen to Dr. King' Sermon on the loudspeaker (15 minutes)
 - ⇒ Schedule a ranger-led presentation of the history of Ebenezer Baptist Church (10 minutes)
- Fellowship Hall (downstairs)
 - ⇒ See the original microphone Dr. King used when copastoring Ebenezer Baptist Church
 - ⇒ Grades 9 and Up: Watch 15 minute film interview of to Dr. King's sister, Christine, sharing memories of growing up in the church

Upon receipt of submission, the park's Education Coordinator will contact you regarding confirmation of itinerary details and send you a final itinerary for your visit. Please allow for 5 – 7 business days to process. Requests are accommodated on a first-come, first-served basis. Depending on availability, your preferred date (s) and/or time (s) may not be available. The months of January through March receive the highest volume of requests. If visiting during these high visitation months, please plan on submitting your request as soon as possible.
