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



Sophie's Place



Sophie's Place was designed with children in mind — bringing comfort and peace to young patients suffering from pain, illness and serious injury.


Recent clinical studies show music therapy provides an evidence-based, integrative medical approach to treating patients, decreasing sedation needs, alleviating pain in conjunction with anesthesia or pain medication, elevating patients' moods and promoting movement for physical rehabilitation; among other healing benefits. Thanks to our philanthropic partnerships, we have more than 300 referrals per month for individual music therapy sessions, and clinical staff are seeing the immediate impact on their patients.

Shelly McGriff Endowed Nursing Scholarships

Thanks to the generosity and commitment of our staff and a giving community, we are able to offer nursing scholarships to qualified and motivated individuals in healthcare to further their training and education. Last year, four employees were awarded scholarships to aid their education — ranging from a master's degree in nursing to just starting on the journey to becoming a R.N.








Sutter Neuroscience Institute

Each year, thousands of patients throughout the Valley Area receive outstanding care through the Sutter Neuroscience Institute (SNI). This center provides diagnosis and treatment to patients young and old with complex conditions of the brain, spine and central nervous system. Most notably, our memory clinic has been published in the Journal of Clinical Investigation for an Alzheimer's study and in The Official Journal of the American Academy of Neurology for treatment of neurobehavioral symptoms of adults with autism.

Thanks to philanthropic partnerships like yours, we are able to provide the latest treatment options — while advancing research — for neurological disorders.

Sutter Institute for Medical Research

Since 1957, leading-edge discoveries (i.e., Transcatheter Mitral Valve Repair and Replacement) and life-saving breakthroughs have been the result of research happening at Sutter Institute for Medical Research (SIMR). Today, with the help of community investments, clinicians participate in investigative research studies on endoscopy, orthopedics and robotics, while also collaborating on disease prevention, diagnosis and treatment for patients across the country.





Smeloff-Cutter Heart Valve: The heart valve was created at Sutter Institute for Medical Research in 1962 by Ed Smeloff, Sr., M.D. soon after establishing Sutter Institute for Medical Research. This innovation saved thousands of lives around the world by offering patients a better-performing mechanical replacement for their faulty heart valves.



Sutter Medical Center, Sacramento's Emergency Department: Helping patients get the care they need when, where and how they need it.

Having Sutter Medical Center, Sacramento's emergency services right here in Sacramento brings relief from pain and discomfort for tens of thousands of people every year, 7 days a week, 24 hours a day.

As the busiest emergency department in the Sutter system and the busiest pediatric emergency department in the region, we expect to see up to 110,000 patients in 2017.

In 2015, thanks to a lead gift from the Pappas Family and investments from other philanthropic partners — the region's first dedicated pediatric emergency department was created at Sutter Medical Center, Sacramento. The space was designed with children in mind with a separate waiting area and nurses and physicians specially trained to care for our youngest patients.



Most recently, thanks to generous philanthropic support like yours, our emergency department patients now have access to new ultrasound technology. With ultrasound, patient care is improved with more efficiency and accuracy in placing complicated IV's, screening for retinal detachment and other eye problems, identifying areas for draining abscesses, and identifying potentially life threatening traumatic injuries.

Living Walls at Sutter Cancer Center

In 2016, Sutter Medical Center, Sacramento renamed our infusion therapy center the Mikuni Infusion Center, in honor of Mikuni Charitable Foundation's ongoing contributions totaling nearly \$1 million to Sutter Cancer Center's Breast Cancer Navigator Program over the past 20 years.

The Breast Cancer Navigator Program assigns a nurse to act as a personal patient guide and advocate, helping people understand their diagnosis, explore treatment options and recover at their own pace.

Thanks to world-renowned Sacramento performance artist David Garibaldi, patients waiting at the Mikuni Infusion Center can now enjoy artwork he calls "Living Walls," inspired by memories of those who have survived cancer. Mr. Garibaldi said, "While people sit here, I want them to be inspired by this painting. Every time they come here, I want them to be able to find something new and compelling."

The Breast Cancer Navigator Program and the new art at the Mikuni Infusion Center are just two examples of the way philanthropy touches patients' lives every day.

BEAR program: The Bridging Evidence & Resources (BEAR) Center is a joint program between Sutter Medical Foundation and Sutter Children's Center, Sacramento that provides care to infants, children and teens who have been seriously neglected or physically or sexually abused. Donor support allows the BEAR Center to provide vital 24-hour child abuse assessment and community resources throughout the region.

Cancer Center: Philanthropy helps us put the very best tools in the hands of clinicians faster. Providing a wide range of leading-edge cancer services for patients of all ages in the community, we seek support for advanced new technologies and programs that provide cancer patients with healing therapies.

Child Life Program: Our specialists work with children, their families and care providers to make life as normal as possible while in the hospital. They also provide essential life experiences for gaining a sense of mastery, for play, learning, self-expression, family involvement and peer interaction.

Getting to Zero: Getting to Zero is a regional campaign in Placer, Sacramento and Yolo Counties to align individual, corporate and government resources to address homelessness. Using the housing first best practice model, the goal is to achieve functional zero — when the number of homeless individuals is equal to or less than the number of permanent housing units.

Healing garden: The proposed healing garden will be a comforting, peaceful retreat for patients, family and staff at the hospital. There is an opportunity to leave a lasting legacy by naming the healing garden at Sutter Medical Center, Sacramento. **Medical research:** The Sutter Institute for Medical Research (SIMR) combines world-class research efforts with community-based medical care. Through SIMR, physicians take part in hundreds of research studies, advancing our understanding of disease prevention, diagnosis and treatment. In addition, Sutter Health is raising funds to support a Biobank that will link blood sample data and electronic health record information from consenting patients. These studies will help researchers better understand how people develop disease over time, leading to more personalized treatment and improved care.

Pet therapy: Studies have shown that pets can lower stress and anxiety, improve vital signs, and reduce loneliness and depression. Donor support connects trained therapy dogs with patients and families to lift spirits and provide comfort and unconditional love.

Recent clinical studies show that music therapy provides beneficial effects on hospital patients and with philanthropic support, our music therapists bring comfort and peace to our young patients through music.


Among the many milestones on her path to becoming a recognized leader in the non-profit sector, Diane served as the first female president of the Rotary Club of Sacramento.
