

Love Your Neighbor-Week 2



We have just crossed over into the season of Lent; a familiar territory for us all. We have returned, as we do each year, to this period of fasting and abstinence, to the tracing of ashes on our foreheads. With this we are reminded of our mortality and the need for repentance. It's a time of self-denial, of penitential rites and practices, of examining our interior darkness. But it is also a time for looking beyond ourselves and our own concerns, for reaching out to others. In his epistle, read at Mass a few weeks ago, St. James reminded us that charitable activity must always be a priority for Christians: "If a brother or sister has nothing to wear and has no food for the day, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, keep warm, and eat well,' but you do not give them the necessities of the body, what good is it?" (Jas 2:15-16). Going a step further, the U.S. Conference of

Catholic Bishops uses a broader definition of almsgiving on its website to include charitable actions as well as charitable giving.

How might these Lenten ideals of giving and serving converge? This Sunday, March 6, following the 8 and 10 a.m. Masses, you are invited to the North Church to attend a presentation by members of the Riverwest Food Pantry. Since 1979, Riverwest Food Pantry has been located at 924 E. Clarke St. in Milwaukee and aims to bring volunteers and residents together to combat hunger, isolation, and poverty in East Side Milwaukee neighborhoods. Riverwest also addresses the issue of hunger, starting with one meal at a time and goes further to help build and sustain a community. Among its accomplishments, Riverwest partners with local entities to maintain an urban greenhouse farm on Port Washington Road, north of Messmer High School in Milwaukee. The farm is successful in growing thousands of pounds of produce to be shared with the nearby neighborhoods and its residents. Along with its gardens, Riverwest also relies on donations to keep its pantries full and for volunteers to help sort and distribute food and to work at its greenhouse farm. Many opportunities are present for those of all ages to volunteer, even the youth in our community, with morning and evening hours available. All are invited and we hope to see you there!

This Lent, Saint Francis Borgia will be focusing on our twinning relationship with Saint Michael and Saint Rose of Lima Catholic Parishes. These two parishes are located in the heart of the City of Milwaukee. Our main focus will be to financially assist St. Michael's roof and window repairs. St. Michael Parish inherited a beautiful, historic church from its founders and that building requires significant investment. Currently, the impressive belltower needs tuckpointing, repositioning of loosed massive brick stones, cleaning of the interior and repairing veneer windows. The northern section of the Church needs a new roof and the historical Parish rectory building needs new windows to remedy significant energy waste.





If you would like to contribute to the roof project you may do so in the following ways:

Eucharistic Adoration By: Christina Garni

What is Eucharistic Adoration?

Eucharistic Adoration is the adoration of Jesus Christ present in the Holy Eucharist. In the many Churches that have this adoration, the Eucharist is displayed in a special holder called a monstrance, and people come to pray and worship Jesus continually throughout the day and often the night. Christ's great love for us was shown when he was crucified on the cross to pay for our sins and give us eternal life. He loves us without limit, and offers Himself to us in the Holy sacrament of the Eucharist. Can we not give Jesus a few minutes of love and adoration in return?

5 Ways to be Successful in Adoration

Have you ever gone to adoration? Have you tried, but felt defeated like I first did, and occasionally still do? Here's a list of 5 ways to be successful in adoration:

- 1. Be Patient-I was recently talking with a group of friends about their experiences of adoration and a lot of them expressed the same frustration-that sometimes, time seems to stand still, a few minutes seem eternal! Have you ever been out of shape and tried to go for a run, suddenly, five minutes into the run, you're huffing and puffing and you realize you've only gone one block. We tend to focus on the defeat. Adoration can be a bit of a work out... for your soul. So set yourself up for success and slowly increase your time-you'll be amazed at how God increases your capacity to be with Him!
- 2. Bring Scripture-Reading scripture is always a good thing, but is especially helpful and meditative during adoration. There are many prayer books and apps that contain daily scripture readings. I particularly like reading the Psalms and reflecting on a verse that speaks to me on that given day.
- 3. Pray the Rosary-The rosary is a beautiful prayer, one that many saints have prayed. St. Louis de Montfort said "When the Holy Rosary is said well, it gives Jesus and Mary more glory and is more meritorious than any other prayer." What better way to give Jesus and Mary glory than to pray the rosary in front of the Blessed Sacrament?
- 4. Listen to Praise and Worship Music-When I'm the only one in the Church, I love to start adoration by listening to praise and worship music. "Restless" and "I Shall Not Want" by Audrey Assad. The music and the lyrics help me quiet myself and turn my thoughts to God.
- 5. Be Okay with Silence-It's not easy to go a whole day without silence; we have music in our car, we have our phones and television available throughout the day. Even if we are in a quiet environment, we are usually accustomed to checking our phones for anything. In Audrey Assad's "Restless" she sings "And I'm restless, I'm restless, 'Til I rest in You." I find this sentiment to be so true when I am in adoration. Sure, the first few minutes I am restless as I begin to wind down, but eventually am filled with insurmountable peace. Allow yourself to sit in silence and to just be with Jesus. In an apparition to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque, Jesus spoke these beautiful words: "I have a burning thirst to be honored by men in the Blessed Sacrament." Go to adoration, even if it's just for 5 minutes. Jesus desires to be with you, to have you gaze upon Him, as He so lovingly gazes upon you.

It is an encounter with God through Jesus. It relives Jesus' life and resurrection and brings us freedom through a renewed relationship with Jesus each time. In the Mass we talk about celebrating the sacred mysteries. If we are to understand the Mass, we must understand what a mystery is and how the mystery relates to the sacrament.

Beginning with the Apostles the Christian community celebrated Baptism and Eucharist in accordance with Christ's commands. We see this in Mathew 28:19-20, "Go therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold I am with you always, until the end of the age." We also see in Luke 22:19-20, "Then he took the bread said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body, which will be given up for you; do this in memory of me." And likewise, the cup after they had eaten, saying, "This cup is the new convene=ant in my blood, which will be shed for you." In the early Church, the rites of Baptism and Eucharist were referred to as mysteries. In addition, we find this use of mystery through St. Paul who used it as a key concept in his understanding of what happened to Christ. The cross of Christ is a mystery to St. Paul because there is something hidden in the cross which we cannot understand without it being revealed. The cross is a concrete object but it reveals God's glory in the resurrection. A mystery is something that is concrete but brings us in contact with divine reality.

For example, when the priest urges the assembly at the beginning of Mass "To prepare ourselves to celebrate the sacred mysteries, let us call to mind our sins." He is asking us to recognize that the members of the assembly and their various roles, the words and gestures of the mass and the bread and wine are all mysteries. They are all concrete things that when brought together reveal a divine reality that Christ came, Christ died, Christ rose and Christ will come again.

A sacrament is a very specific mystery that Christ gave to the Church. The word "Sacramentum" connotes making the holy into something concrete. A sacrament is when we come in contact with space and time with something

that transcends space and time. In the Eucharist the bread and wine are in space and time and the Lord's body and blood transcend space and time. As we study the different parts of the Mass over the upcoming week we will find many mysteries in the Mass that lead up to the sacrament of the Eucharist.


