

#### **Fair Trade News**

How CONACADO Helps!

CONACADO (the National Confederation of Dominican Cacao Producers) currently has 9,500 members in 142 local co-ops throughout the Dominican Republic. Over 40% of their cacao is sold on the Fair Trade market. Each year the Fair Trade premiums are used for community projects including Education, Infrastructure, Health, and Development.

The funds provide school supplies and scholarships for members' children. They also provide for the repair and building of schools. Additional funds are used for home loans, electricity projects, and for building roads to remote areas. Health related funds are used for medicines, doctors' services, and the repair of clinic buildings.

Also important to the economy and to the well being of Dominican cacao farmers are the grants given to women's organizations that produce cacao, wine, and chocolate. Additional funds are also used for the promotion of eco tourism.

Equal Exchange (affiliate of Lutheran World Federation) is proud to be part of this effort and to offer Hot Cocoa and Chocolate Bars for sale. We'll be in the Fellowship Hall on January 5th to offer these fine products to our Church Family.

**November Mission Focus: Shepherd's Door** 

Shepherd's Door, our next door neighbor on 132nd and Halsey, is a ministry serving homeless women and children, supported by Portland Rescue Mission. The goals of Shepherd's Door are to lead residents to Christ, create a safe, secure environment, and assist residents in accepting personal responsibility and becoming self-sufficient.

Shepherd's Door houses women and children for extended stays as needed. While the resident is with Shepherd's Door she is equipped with life skills including parenting, nutrition, personal care, arts & crafts, cooking and more. She will receive one-on-one mentoring, assisting her in accomplishing her program. Shepherd's Door has room to house more women and children than they are currently able to do, due to funding shortages. Always urgently needed are diapers (pull-ups especially, larger sizes), bus tickets (single or monthly passes), and baby formula (Enfamil w/iron and Enfamil, lacto free). More specific wish lists and baskets to put donations in are in the narthex and we thank you for bringing donations during the month of January.

Lorraine Holte is our liaison to Shepherd's Door and she will also have a list in the Fellowship Hall of items they need.

# Everything You Wanted to Know About The Book You Never Read

Remember that book in the bible that your confirmation pastor said was pointless and probably should not be in the Bible – the one that we never read in worship? Join us and Concordia University Professor Benjamin Nicodemus, on Wednesday nights, beginning January 8th as we begin an eight week course - diving head first into this book that is thought by many as "a waste of time" – the Epistle of James.

### What Is It?

James is one of the most misunderstood texts in the Bible. It is a book famous for telling its readers how they ought to live. Many Lutherans struggle with James, Even Martin Luther struggled with James calling it the "epistle of straw" because it does not seem to support "justification by grace through faith." This 8 week course will challenge us to look carefully at this text to find that, not only is it not so contradictory to what Lutherans believe, but in fact it is one of the most inviting books in the whole Bible. James encourages readers to think for themselves and ask tough questions – the very thing Luther wanted people to do in churches. This class invites you and helps you do that. This class will not only help you see things you never expected in the book of James, it will provide you a framework from which you can look at all books of the Bible. You will learn to become critics of the New Testament, ask relevant questions both to the text and to your lives. This class is for all people who want to take the Bible seriously and examine it in meaningful ways. This will be an 8 week course with the topics listed below – while I hope that everyone attends all 8, each of them will be independent enough that one could attend inconsistently.

# Eight Sessions

- 1. Author and audience? Are we included?
- 2. Genre How does this make sense?
- 3. Why isn't Jesus in this text? Where is the Logos?
- 4. Stoic thought in James do I deserve death?
- 5. Freedom and the law How can it be both?
- 6. Was Luther right? Does James contradict Paul?
- 7. What is wisdom? How could that possibly hurt us?
- 8. What is this "taming of the tongue" business? Is this just practical advice?





Ben Nickodemus is a professor in the College of Theology, Arts, and Sciences at Concordia University. His area of study is New Testament and Hellenistic religions with a specialty in 2<sup>nd</sup>-4<sup>th</sup> century Coptic Egypt. He is particularly interested in dialogue between religious communities in terms of identity formation. He works primarily on dialogues between different religious practice and different hierarchies of authority in the development of the Early Church. He is particularly interested in the development of alternate forms of spirituality as they developed over time as expressed in monastic worlds, Nag Hammadi and related literature, and Manichaeism. He has taught courses on the New Testament, Old Testament, and Theory and Practice of Religion, and Religion and violence at various institutions.
