#### The Food Pantry

The Food Pantry had 204 families, (428 adults and 178 children) in the past three months.

The Regional Food Bank of Northeast New York in Latham gave a grant of \$2100.00 to be used from November 1, 2019 to June 26, 2020.

The Boy Scouts and Cub Scouts had a food drive and tremendously helped fill our shelves. The Boy Scouts had over 1200 pounds of food and the Cub Scouts brought in over 30 bags of groceries.

Hannaford donated 50 boxes (Help Fight Hunger) to our pantry.

The Elks Club continues to donate bags of food monthly.

Our church congregation and donations from individuals in the community have been generous. All this has helped to keep the Food Pantry open.

#### **Trustees News**

Fall is a very busy time of year for the trustees. Here's an overview of some of their work:

- Our outdoor sign, new this year, has had some minor leaks but the company is being contacted for repairs. We appreciate Linda Sheeran being the one to regularly post inspiring messages on the sign for all to see and enjoy.

- Carpet cleaning of the church has been discussed with quotes being requested comparing renting a shampooer and paying our custodian to do the work or hiring a company. When all of the information is compiled a decision will be made.

- A full pew in the back of the church was removed over the summer to accommodate space for the new sound system equipment. That pew was shortened and placed in our downstairs fellowship hall and it will be welcome seating, especially for those who do take out doing our dinners. The full pew in the Connections Café was also made shorter so that it could be safer, and it is a favorite sitting place for many.

- All of the boilers and furnaces in the church's three buildings have been serviced this fall.

- Three bids are being solicited for our snow plowing needs at the church for 2020

- Trustees will be working on creating a list of projects they believe are high priorities, with suggested time frames.

- Fellowship Hall accessibility One engineer has provided schematics that include a new back entrance area, and then an inside ramp 4 feet wide, that would go toward the kitchen. Once 2 others have submitted their proposals, Trustees plan to fill out the required Ministry Priorities form and get it to Church Council for their input. If any group wants funding for a project not included in our 2019 budget, they need to use this form and come before the leadership of Church Council.

#### Parsonage News

The required, annual fall walk-through of the parsonage found that it was in good shape. There have been problems over this past summer related to the septic system. Odorless Sanitary Services has been contracted to replace the septic system for an estimated cost of \$4800 this November. A birch tree in the backyard will need to be taken down, and in the spring season topsoil and seeding will need to be done.

The garage door also needs to be replaced. Bids are being solicited. Hopefully work will be completed. Our insurance will be used, with the Warner's paying any deductible.

For everyone's awareness there are three people serving on the parsonage team: Joyce Garlock, Mike Cramer, and Kelly Schmidt, who is a trustee liaison. Minor repairs and maintenance needs are overseen by this team. They have a line item in the budget. For larger, costly repairs the oversight of the Trustees is needed. Funding would also come from them, unless Church Council decides otherwise.

#### Sound System Update

In November Mark Warner shared in worship some important reminders about using our new sound system. Portable microphones need to be manually turned on and placed very close to one's mouth. The gooseneck microphone on the pulpit should never be touched or moved. It has the capacity to convey speech clearly from its position. There is now a microphone on a stand near the altar rail to be used by anyone who needs to make an announcement. Recent difficulties with the pastor's portable microphone should now be resolved!

Sound Solutions, the company that installed our new equipment, hosted a six hour workshop in November. We appreciate that three men from our congregation went to this training: Dave Edwards, Mark Warner and George Wilson. This team of volunteers would be welcome to anyone who would like to learn how to use the system to assist during worship services.



Hello! My name is Pamela Hannan and I am so very pleased to be your newest member at Ballston Spa UMC. Pastor Kelly has invited me to share a little about myself, including my earliest church memory, my favorite bible verse and my favorite hymn. Actually, this is a homecoming for me as I was baptized here on December 19, 1954 by the Rev. Winston Saunders. By pure coincidence, Rev. Saunders came to Shenendehowa UMC in 1979, just in time to be the officiant for my marriage to Ken Hannan. My family lived in

Ballston Spa in the early 1950's, then South Glens Falls for 11 years, then Clifton Park. I lost my parents two years ago just before Christmas. My father had been ill for several months and ultimately died while under Hospice care. Six days later my mother quietly passed away, diagnosed with Broken Heart Syndrome. They are in their final resting place in our family plot in Ballston Spa Village Cemetery.

Ken and I have been married for 40 years and retired together 4 years ago. I was an RN and he was in business management. We have 2 children and 3 grandchildren. Our daughter and son-in-law and their 3 children live south of Watertown, NY, and our son and his wife live in Boston. During the early years of our marriage Ken was transferred quite often. We lived in Rochester, Louisville KY, Hampton NJ, and then ultimately home (for me) to Clifton Park, where we have been since 1990.

Ken and I love to travel, following in the footsteps of my parents who traveled all over the world. We spend our winters now in Arizona and Florida, and when we're home here in the northeast we pick up and go on little getaways all the time. We love the ocean, the mountains, the Finger Lakes, or just spending time with our children and their families. In addition to traveling, I enjoy trying new restaurants, hiking, reading historical novels and doing genealogical research.

My earliest memory of church. That's easy, as it is also a favorite memory of mine overall: I loved sitting next to my mom in church. I was probably 4 years old, and I was just so very impressed that my mother always recited the *Apostles' Creed* from memory. I mean, wow! It was even longer than the Pledge of Allegiance! I remember looking around and beaming, because everyone else was reading it from their hymnals. One time I asked her why we say, "I believe in the Holy Catholic Church." Without skipping a beat, she replied, "Because Grandpa was Catholic." This seemed to be a perfectly logical explanation to me at the time, and to this day I smile whenever I hear those words. My favorite bible verse has always been *Psalms 121*, and my favorite hymn is *This is My Song*. We sang this at my father's funeral and there wasn't a dry eye in the place. As I told Pastor Kelly, my transferring my membership "back" to Ballston Spa UMC at this point in my life is the right step to take in my life's journey. I feel very much at home and I know that my parents are smiling down on me.

#### Help needed following Halloween Floods

This year's Halloween night was one for the books-the entire day consisted of heavy rain. Sadly, the rain resulted in flooding in 11 UNY counties: Cayuga, Chautauqua, Dutchess, Erie, Essex, Hamilton, Herkimer, Montgomery, Oneida, Saratoga, and Warren. The impact of these floods on 800+ homes has been severe:

- An estimated 230 homes have major damage.
- An estimated 70 homes were destroyed or condemned.
- An estimated 20 homes are inaccessible.
- An estimated 160 homes need muck-out and debris removal service.
- An estimated 300 homes have had gas and/or electricity turned off and need utilities service.
- 19 families need temporary housing.

The Upper NY Conference's Volunteers in Mission is currently focusing on the Rome/Utica area and has established a semi-command post with the Red Cross and other agencies to center their planning/dispatch and overnight accommodations. Not only do they have a place to sleep, but also, the Red Cross is providing food and showers as well.

Let's celebrate all of our volunteers and their good work. See Pastor Kelly if you are interested in being trained to assist with disaster relief efforts.

#### United Methodist Church ad campaign targets the lonely

Nashville, Tennessee - The United Methodist Church has launched the "Not the Only One" advertising campaign to help offer encouragement through community.
