
⁷ It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline? 8 If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons. 9 Besides this, we have had earthly fathers who disciplined us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? ¹⁰ For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. ¹¹ For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.





Observation & Interpretation



- ¹ Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, ² looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. ³ Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted.
- O-1: "Therefore" obviously refers to the subject matter in Chapter 11. It means "because of" or "for this reason" usually but the Greek word used here is used in only one other place in the NT. It has a modifier that emphasizes its meaning.
- I-1: The easiest interpretation is "then therefore" but is not translated that way and leaves out the emphasis that could be said, "by these actions, therefore, ..." live a life like these that influences others.
- O-2: The author is constantly returning to Jesus just as he started out in Chapter 1.
- O-3: Jesus is not just an example but "founder" of our faith; He surely is in his model of endurance which is another theme of this letter.




Observation & Interpretation



⁴ In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood. ⁵ And have you forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as sons? "My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, nor be weary when reproved by him. ⁶ For the Lord disciplines the one he loves, and chastises every son whom he receives."

- O-1: v.3 leads into this section on Christians as children of God or "sons" by advocating to not grow weary.
- I-1: It is impossible not to relate the recipients' struggles as Christians to the Lord's discipline. This is a tough subject that cannot be rationalized apart from our walk with Christ.
- O-2: The author quotes <u>Proverbs 3:11-12</u> emphasizing that the reprove of the Lord has been a constant in the life of faith.
- I-2: One had to be a "son" in OT times to gain an inheritance.



Observation & Interpretation




⁷ It is for discipline that you have to endure. God is treating you as sons. For what son is there whom his father does not discipline? ⁸ If you are left without discipline, in which all have participated, then you are illegitimate children and not sons. ⁹ Besides this, we have had earthly fathers who disciplined us and we respected them. Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? ¹⁰ For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. ¹¹ For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.

O-1: If we are not disciplined, we are not sons.

O-2: The purpose of God disciplining us is to allow us to share in God's holiness. Therefore, disciplining us is for our own good.

O-3: God's discipline is not pleasant, but look what it yields: righteousness!



O-1: Hagner calls this section "Holiness and Warning." Most other authors include this with the rest of the chapter as a final warning

O-2: This starts with a reference to <u>Isaiah 35:3</u>, but it may also be a takeoff on <u>Isaiah 35:3-10</u> in its mention of holiness.

O-3: The result of holiness is expressed in Hebrews 12:14-16.

O-4: The warning is <u>not</u> to be like Esau vs. the other saints in <u>Chapter11</u>.



- O-1: This is a contrast of the earthly covenant and the Heavenly covenant.
- I-1: The giving of the earthly covenant was terrifying, but the giving of the Heavenly covenant was glorious.
- O-2: The "sprinkled blood" of Jesus vs. that of Abel. "Abel's blood cried out for vengeance; Jesus' blood cries out for mercy, forgiveness and love" (quoted from "The Superiority of the New Covenant: Hebrews" by Bob Utley, Logos)



Observation & Interpretation





O-1: The author makes reference back to one he made in <u>Hebrews 3:12</u>. Its part of this final warning of "Don't Refuse Him" (God).

O-2: If the Israelites did not escape the Old Covenant, how can we escape the New Covenant?

O-3: The "shaken" reference comes from <u>Haggai 2:6</u> about the post-exile temple, but has a future meaning in the New Covenant and Jesus.

O-4: This section refers back to Hebrews 10:26-31.





- 5. What is your response to the New Covenant? Are you sure of your salvation? If not, talk to your leader.










Hebrews Quick Review & Bottom Line



- Pros Ebraious ("To Hebrews")
- Author and Place of Writing: Known only by God (Paul, Barnabas, Luke, Clement of Rome, Apollos, Silvanus (Silas), Philip, Priscilla)
- Date: c. 64 68 AD (<u>before the Romans destroyed Jerusalem</u> and the <u>Temple</u> during the <u>First Jewish–Roman War, 66-73 AD</u>)
- Audience: Jews who are...
 - Saved, but wavering due to growing persecution;
 considering going back to practicing Judaism
 - Close to being Saved, but haven't committed yet
- Bottom Line: **Jesus Christ is superior in every aspect** "There is more to be gained in Christ than to be lost in Judaism."
