County considers \$1/hr raise for workers

In 2012, the Taylor County Commission gave employees a three-percent raise, their first raise in five years. In its proposed 2014-15 county budget, which the board will finalize during two public hearings held over the next two weeks, the commission has included a \$1 per hour raise for all full and part-time employees.

The commission will hold its first budget hearing Monday, Sept. 10, at 5 p.m. to set the tentative budget. A second hearing will be held Monday, Sept. 17, at 5 p.m. to approve the final budget and millage rates. The 2014-15 fiscal year begins Oct. 1.

The commission held a series of workshops in July to balance the county budget, culminating in a special meeting during which the county set its tentative millage rates at the same levels as the current year. Once the board sets the tentative millage rates, it can later lower them at the public

Property values increase for first time since 2008

For the first time in six years, the total real property value in Taylor County is projected to increase.

According to preliminary certified values for 2014 released by Property Appraiser Bruce Ratliff, Taylor County's total taxable value (including real property and tangible personal property) is expected to jump 1.84 percent or \$23.6 million this year.

The total taxable value of the county peaked in 2008 at \$1.465 billion. (This and subsequent figures are based on the taxable value used to determine property taxes for the Taylor County School District. In Florida, school districts

62 cases are handled in first 'Truancy Court' addressing student attendance

With only 180 days in the school calendar, every minute of instruction counts—especially when it comes to laying a solid foundation for a student's math and reading skills.

That's the message the Taylor County School District hopes to impress upon parents as it addresses rampant unexcused

absences through a new "Truancy Court" program.

"The goal is not to punish parents, rather to help them see the need for their children to come to school," Director of Support Services Michael Thompson said.

He noted that the district is seeing the bulk of truancy cases among primary and elementary school students.

"These are critical years where students are learning the fundamental skills they will need to perform later on," he said.

"We want to catch these students early so they don't fall so far behind that catch-up becomes impossible."

The first truancy court session was held Aug. 10 before Judge Bill Blue.

Some 62 cases were heard, based on the last six months of attendance of the 2013-14 school year.

"In some cases, students missed more than 60 days of school—or more than one-half of the 180-day school year," Thompson said.

"We are talking about unexcused absences, instances where there is no

good reason for the student not to be in school."

In those initial cases, parents will be required to return to court (in person and with their child/student) for the next two truancy sessions.

"If everything is going okay—meaning they are

Gracie Tull's family said prayers have been answered—the malignant tumor encompassing her left kidney is responding to chemotherapy treatment and shrinking.

Doctors have told her parents to expect some 29 weeks of on-going chemo, surgery and radiation

therapies.

Tull was diagnosed with a Wilms tumor in mid-August; she is presently undergoing a six-week regimen of chemotherapy.

Next Saturday's bake sale/raffle is being sponsored by youth groups from Westside Baptist Church and St. Johns Christian Fellowship.

Family and friends are coordinating the car wash and hot dog sale.

Remember when... If You Were Here

Nothing can make you miss home like a song and a few hundred miles.

It was two in the morning and I was sitting in a recording studio in Detroit with time on my hands, a song in my head and a longing for home. I had been in the studio for nearly 12 hours writing and producing a television infomercial for a cosmetics company. The work was done and everyone had gone except for me and Tom, the project's music director.

The song in my head was about longing to be home. And, because I had time on my hands, I jotted down the words to the song while Tom caught a few winks. When I was through with the lyrics, I woke Tom up, told him about the song, "If You Were Here," then I sang it for him. An hour later, I was in the recording booth adding vocals to Tom's music tracks. As the sun came up, we sat listening to the song that had been in my head for weeks blaring from a cassette player. I didn't miss home quite as much.

The hundreds of miles came back into play two months later.

That time, instead of being in a music studio at 2 a.m., it was 9 a.m. and I was in a video/film studio, Jam Session Films, which was owned by my producing partner, Carlesa. Everything else was the same. I was in Detroit which was hundreds of miles from home. I had time on my hands and that song on a cassette. Because I had nothing better to do, I played the song for Carlesa and she immediately said, "Come on. Let's go shoot a music video."

After reluctantly agreeing to Carlesa's suggestion, she and I spent the rest of the day scouring Detroit to shoot scenes for the video then most of the night editing the footage.

As the sun came up the next morning, we sat watching a music video of "If You Were Here," the song that had been in my head for weeks. I didn't miss home quite as much.

Several weeks later, the hundreds of miles disappeared. It had been nearly five months since I had been home, and one of the first things I wanted to do was see my nephew Tony, who wasn't quite two. Later that day, when my mom brought him to my grandmother's house where I was staying, I told my grandmother to turn on the VCR and let him watch the video that I had put in while I hid.

"I want to see if he remembers me," I explained.

A few minutes later, I heard my grandmother tell my mother, Tony, and my cousin Kashari, who was two months younger than Tony, "Let's watch a video."

Tony and Kashari jumped up and down and cheered then plopped down in front of the television. Neither my grandmother nor mother had any idea what was on the video, so they were as anxious as Tony and Kashari.

I watched from the hallway as she pressed the play button on the VCR. The titles appeared on the television screen: "If You Were Here--a song written and performed by Anthony Lamarr."

"What is this?" my mother asked. "I hope he ain't trying to sing," my grandmother said and shook her head.

Then the titles faded, the music began, and I appeared on the screen.

"Get my uncle out the TV," Tony cried and charged into the television. "Get him out!"

I had to run into the living room to keep him from cracking open the television.

That day, I realized that even though I was living hundreds of miles away and had not been home in four months, I was never completely gone. Part of me was always there with them.

I've missed home since then, but never quite as much as before that day.

are exempt from certain state-mandated property

tax breaks which results in a slightly smaller figure for county tax purposes.

For example, the total taxable value for county

tax purposes in 2008 was \$1.417 billion.)

After 2008, the county's total taxable value fell \$56.1 million in 2009, \$89.1

million in 2010, \$73.9 million in 2011 and \$6.9 million in 2013.

The lone exception to the drop was in 2012, when the total taxable value jumped \$48.7 million.

Even this year, however, the real property value still fell \$31.8 million.

The drop was overcome by an unusually large rise in tangible personal property of \$81.7 million, resulting in an overall increase in the county's total property value of 4.2 percent that year. (Businesses and those who rent property are required to file tangible personal property returns. Tangible property is defined in Florida Statutes as "all goods...and other articles of value capable of manual

possession." Inventory and household goods are excluded.)

"We have been in a transitional period," Ratliff said. "We went from assessments being lower than our sales to where our assessments were higher than sales."

"This is the first time real property has gone up in relation to our assessments," he continued.

He noted that the increases in the real property values could be mainly found along the coast but added that there were some increases in the City of Perry as well.

As for the city, the total taxable value has fallen 13.4 percent since 2008, when it was \$254.6 million.

According to the 2014 preliminary figures, the total taxable value is set to increase \$2.7 million (1.23 percent) to \$226.8 million.

Ratliff said TRIM notices have been mailed to property owners and the final figure may be adjusted as they work with owners.

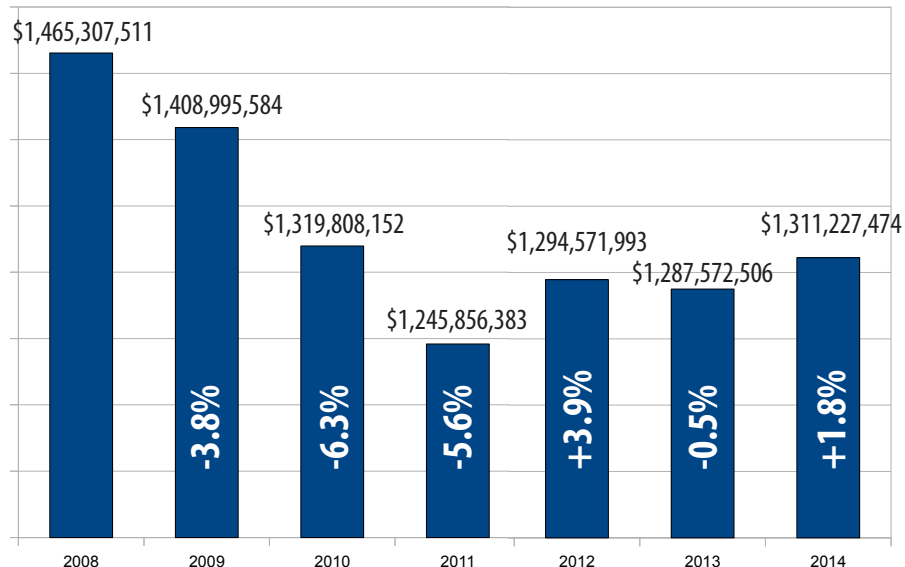
He also noted increases in property owners' tax bills may not have necessarily been caused by higher assessments.

The school district's required local effort millage (which is set by the state legislature) is set to increase by 3.19 percent.

Additionally, the city's proposed millage rate represents a 27.72 percent increase over the current rate.

Taylor County Taxable Values 2008-2014

Property values in Taylor County peaked in 2008 at \$1.46 billion. The total taxable value of the county in 2014 is 10.52 percent below that number.



All figures are based on the taxable values used to determine property taxes for the Taylor County School District. In Florida, school districts are exempt from certain state-mandated property tax breaks which results in a slightly smaller figure for county tax purposes. For example, the total taxable value for county tax purposes in 2008 was \$1,417,583,210. Figures for 2008-2013 are final certified rates, while the 2014 figure is the preliminary certified rate.

Labor Day is in the rear view mirror; what's ahead this Fall?

Labor Day 2014 is in the rear view mirror and we are quickly approaching the fall season which officially begins on Sept. 23. The long unbearably hot days of summer will soon become a memory as we ease into cooler days.

It's time for football, festivals, hayrides and pumpkins. And while we are on the subject of pumpkins, here is a recipe you might like to try.

1 c. pecans, chopped (roasted, candied optional)

1 c. butter/margarine, melted

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In a large bowl, whisk together pumpkin, evaporated milk, eggs, sugar, cinnamon and salt. Pour into greased 13x9 baking dish.

Layer dry cake mix evenly on top of pumpkin mixture. Sprinkle pecans on top of cake mix. Drizzle melted butter evenly over the top. Bake for 50-55 minutes or until golden brown.

Cooking Hints:

• Eggs-actly the same: When you're short one egg for a cake mix, substitute two tablespoons of

mayonnaise for each egg. You will never taste the difference.

• Shred the butter: When a recipe calls for softened butter but you forgot to take it out of the refrigerator in advance, measure the correct amount and shred it as you would a carrot. The small pieces will be soft enough to work with immediately.

Keaton Beach Fishing Report

Angler reels in 'rare' Pompano

I had Zack and Nick Cook with Nathan Alexander of Woodstock, Ga., out Saturday and we landed 16 trout with one 25-inch gator which I landed on an Assassin Violet Moon five-inch shad on an Assassin Pro Elite jighead from 2.8 feet of water.

We also had a 24-inch trout for Nick and two more over 20 inches long. Nathan caught a 20-inch red on a pigfish under a Back Bay.

On Sunday, I took the same crew out and this time Nathan took top honors with a 25-inch, 5.1 pound trout. Nathan also landed a cobia which was an inch too short for the grill.

But the best fish of the weekend was a pompano which Zach caught on a pinfish! In my 24 years of guiding out of Keaton, no one has caught a Pompano on board my charters.

That is unusual enough, but to catch one on a live "fish" is especially rare, as they are mostly crustacean and mollusk eaters. We

brought in 17 trout, a Spanish and the pompano with four trout over 20 inches long

Here are some reports from the girls at Sea Hag at Keaton:

Jack Minchey and David McAfee had their limit each day last week (Wednesday through Saturday) fishing with live pinfish under Cajuns. Jack told me he fished some in the mornings -- catching about half their limit. Then they came in and went back out to finish their limits on the incoming tides in the late afternoons.

On Saturday, Mitchell Donahoo and Wes Carter with E.L. Sprayberry of Ashburn, Ga., had their limit of trout to 23 inches while fishing with grubs and Gulp in 4 - 6 feet of water near Rock Island

David Bosch of Tifton, Ga., fished Saturday with Peng, Calvin and Guna Chee and landed 16 trout, 2 Spanish and a couple of sea bass. All were caught on pinfish under Cajuns in 5-6 feet of slightly stained water. Water temps rose from 82 to 86 degrees.

Brosnan proves he can still be a spy in messy 'November Man'

It's been more than 10 years since actor Pierce Brosnan last played spy legend James Bond, so maybe it's time for him to return with an espionage thriller.

Unfortunately, that film, "The November Man," never seems to elevate itself above being slightly more than generic. It's not a bad film and there's enough there that fans of the genre should find some enjoyment, but it's not a movie that's going to stick with you for long.

Story-wise, "The November Man" doesn't offer anything new or different, and while the action is entertaining at times, with the gunfights and car chases we expect from these kinds of movies, there is always too much going on to allow the audience the settle in and enjoy. It feels longer than its 104-minute runtime would suggest, with plenty of twists and turns that are, for the most part, predictable.

Ultimately the movie's problem is that it tries to find a middle ground between the high-flying popcorn entertainment of the Bond films and the slow-boiling realism of the John le Carré adaptations ("Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy," "A Most Wanted Man") and finds doing so is a balancing act that it can't maintain for the duration, providing neither the sustained action nor the emotional bases it needs to succeed.

The story follows Peter Devereaux (Brosnan), a former CIA agent brought back into the fold when his handler Henley, (Bill Smitrovich, "The Event") tells him an operative needs to be extracted from Moscow. When the mission goes tragically wrong thanks to his former protege, David Mason (Luke Bracey, "G.I. Joe: Retaliation"), it sets off a cat and mouse game between teacher and pupil as Devereaux tries to put together a puzzle involving a Russian politician in line to become president, a refugee with secrets to tell and people inside his own agency.

Before seeing the movie, I saw two different trailers for "The November Man." One emphasized Devereaux's attempt to protect refugee aid worker Alice (Olga Kurylenko, "Quantum of Solace") from hired killers and CIA agents. The second almost exclusively told the story of Devereaux rivalry with Mason. It felt like I was seeing

trailers for two different movies. Having seen "The November Man," I can say it feels like two movies trying to coexist in a single body.

Much of the movie's first act sets up the reason why Devereaux and Mason want each other dead, but ultimately, their rivalry has nothing to do with the overarching mystery, which is frankly more interesting and if the filmmakers had devoted more of their energy to that side of the story, the overall movie would have been much better.

"The November Man" was produced by Brosnan himself, with Roger Donaldson ("The Recruit," "The Bank Job," "Dante's Peak") directing. The story is based on the novel "There Are No Spies" by Bill Granger, which is actually the seventh book in a series.

Brosnan is good in the lead, proving he is not too old to play the action star. He brings his usual layer of cool, so in the moments when he breaks down it feels more genuine than many of his co-stars. I'm guessing Bracey plays Mason like he was asked, but the character never seems to grow beyond someone who seems to be a petulant child angry at his father for some reason. Like much of the film, their entire rivalry plays out almost exactly like you would expect.

Kurylenko's Alice is the linchpin for almost every main plotline and proves to be the most interesting character, which is a bit sad considering the movie tends to forget about her at times while it's off dealing with Devereaux and Mason. I said it before, but if they cut the entire Mason subplot it would not have affected the story's outcome in any meaningful way, and would have instead given them more time to develop Alice and her connection with Devereaux, setting the stage for a better, more interesting and more compelling movie.

Instead, we have two films blended together into one mostly generic action thriller than its not greater than the sum of its parts. If "The November Man" has anything going for it, the film shows Brosnan still has the charisma to pull off a movie like this, or at least a better one.

The movie is rated R for strong violence including a sexual assault, language, sexuality/nudity and brief drug use.

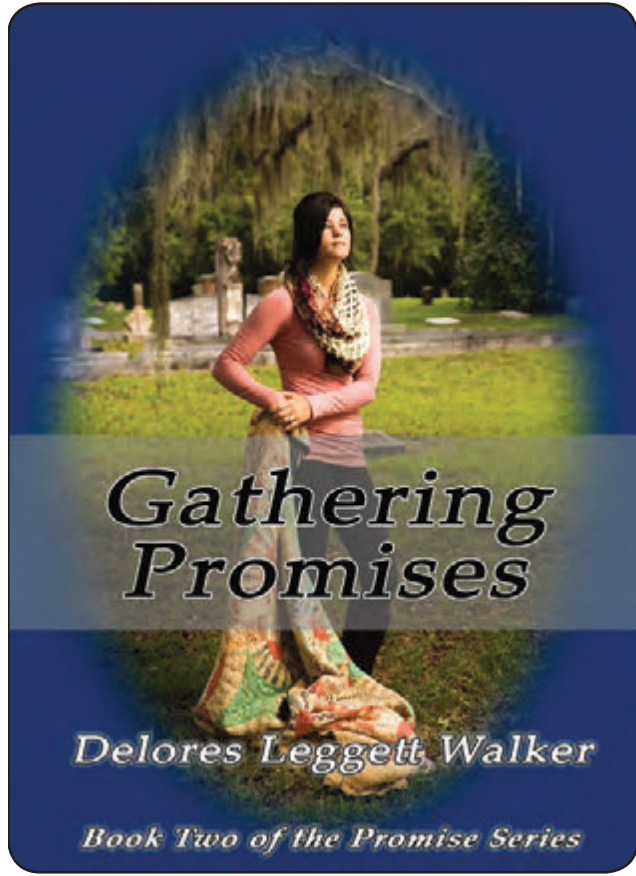
closes this chapter of her life.

Woman indicted for bilking big rig owners with false IRS stamp

United States Attorney Pamela C. Marsh, Northern District of Florida, announced that Elisa Christina Avila Jackson, 30, of Tallahassee, was arraigned this week in court after being charged by a federal grand jury with five counts of wire fraud and one count of possessing a counterfeit Internal Revenue Service ("IRS") stamp.

The indictment alleges that between June 7, 2011, and Feb. 11, 2014, Jackson conducted a scheme to defraud owners of large tractor trailers around the State of Florida of monies that were to be paid to the IRS relating to the federal Heavy Highway Vehicle Use Tax. Jackson operated Bee's Carrier Permitting and Licensing, Inc. ("BCPL"), which purportedly provided assistance to owners of large tractor trailers in preparing and filing their annual applications for registration with the State of Florida.

As mandated by federal regulation, prior to issuing a vehicle registration, the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles required BCPL

and others applying for annual large tractor trailer registrations to provide a copy of a tax form stamped by the IRS as proof that the owner's federal Heavy Highway Vehicle Use Tax had been paid.

The indictment further alleges that Jackson collected from BCPL customers the amount due and owing to the IRS for the Heavy Highway Vehicle Use Tax and promised to pay that amount to the IRS. However, rather than paying the Heavy Highway Vehicle Use Tax to the IRS, Jackson created fraudulent IRS forms bearing a counterfeit IRS numbered remittance stamp, which forms falsely reflected that these taxes had been remitted to the IRS, the filing stated.

The indictment also charges that through this scheme, Jackson fraudulently obtained approximately \$248,000.00.

Counts one through five of the indictment charge Jackson with wire fraud. For each of these counts, if convicted, Jackson faces

a term of imprisonment of not more than 20 years, a period of supervised release of up to three years, a fine of up to \$250,000, and a \$100 special monetary assessment. Count six charges Jackson with possession of an IRS stamp with intent to defraud.

The trial of this case is scheduled for Nov. 3, before

the Honorable Robert L. Hinkle.

The indictment results from an investigation by the IRS-Criminal Investigation, with the assistance of the Florida Highway Patrol and Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, Bureau of Commercial Vehicle and Driver Services.

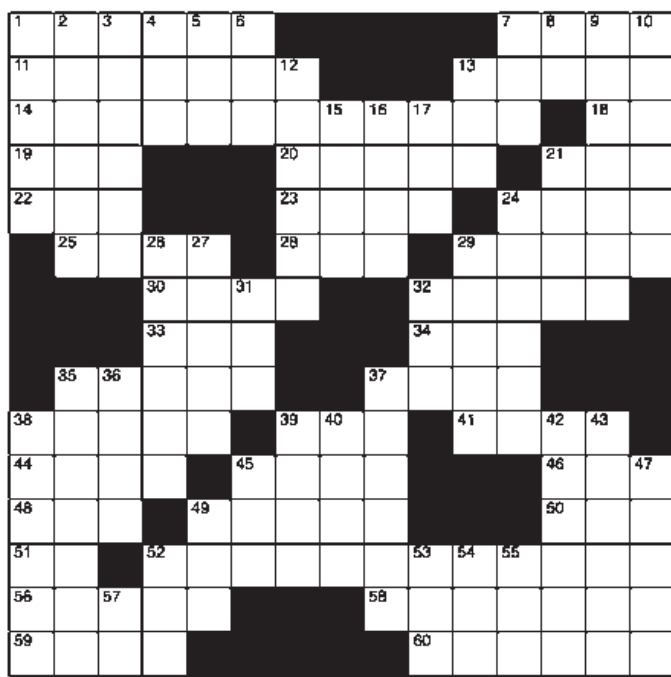

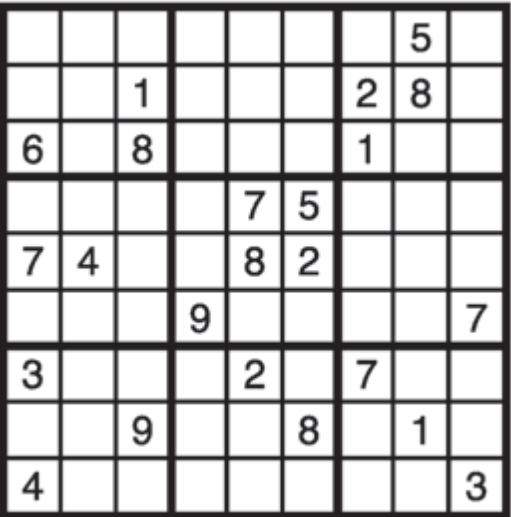

FROM THE RECIPE BOOK

Some spice to turn traditional breakfast on its head

While Americans have grown accustomed to such staples as cereal and oatmeal when they sit down at the breakfast table, breakfast is vastly different in certain areas overseas. For example, in her book "5 Spices, 50 Dishes" (Chronicle Books), cookbook author and teacher Ruta Kahate notes that her mother-in-law serves the following recipe for "Black-Eyed Peas in a Spicy Goan Curry" for breakfast, adding a little extra kick to the most important meal of the day.

Black-Eyed Peas in a Spicy Goan Curry

Serves 4 to 6

- 1 cup dried black-eyed peas or two 15-ounce cans, drained
- 2 tablespoons canola oil
- 1 small yellow onion, minced (about 1 cup)
- 1 teaspoon coriander seeds, finely ground
- 1/2 teaspoon finely grated garlic (about 1 large clove)
- 1/2 teaspoon finely grated fresh ginger (about 1-inch piece)
- 1/2 teaspoon ground turmeric
- 1/2 teaspoon cayenne
- 1/2 teaspoon cumin seeds, finely ground
- 1/4 cup minced tomato (1 small tomato)
- 2 cups (or 1 cup if using canned peas) hot water
- 1/2 teaspoon salt, or to taste if using canned peas
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1 cup canned coconut milk
- 2 tablespoons minced cilantro leaves
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

If using dried black-eyed peas, rinse and soak them in enough water to cover them for 6 to 8 hours. Drain.

In a large saucepan, heat the oil over medium-low heat and saute the onion until it turns dark brown, about 8 minutes. Add the coriander, garlic, ginger, turmeric,

cayenne, and cumin, and stir for 2 minutes. Add the tomato and stir over low heat until it disintegrates.

Add the peas and mix well. Pour in the water, add the salt and sugar, and bring to a boil. Turn the heat down to low, cover, and simmer until the peas are cooked through, about 20 minutes. If using canned peas, simmer for only 10 minutes (it is essential to simmer the canned peas, too, so that the flavors blend better). Stir in the coconut milk and simmer uncovered for another 8 to 10 minutes, again allowing the flavors to come together.

Add the cilantro and lemon juice, simmer for 1 minute more, and remove from the heat. Serve hot.

Note: If you are using dried black-eyed peas, the cooking time can vary depending on the age of the beans.

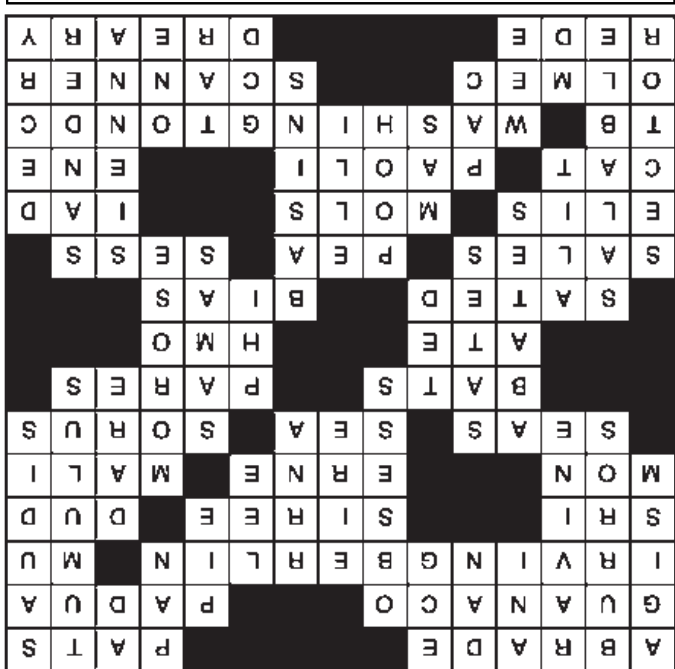

Students 'accountable' for academic performance

within the allowed limit of excused absences and the child's grades reflect he or she is putting forth the effort in school—then the parents will be allowed to check in once a month with the court for the remainder of the truancy probation.”

Under the district's current attendance policy, students are deemed truant with five unexcused absences per month or 15 unexcused absences in a 90-day window.

“Truancy and student accountability go hand-in-hand. If they are not there, they can't learn the material.

“One of the things Judge Blue stressed to the parents is that truancy court isn't about punishment, but if the truancy continues, parents receiving public assistance could see that stopped as a result of the truancy or they could face fines or jail time,” Thompson said.

Addressing the issues, Superintendent of School Paul Dyal said: “Our

school district, like all school districts in Florida, are part of a statewide accountability system as mandated by our state legislature and administered by the Florida Statutes. This accountability, through the Florida Statutes, monitors the performance of students, teachers, principals, the schools and the school district for student performance on the Florida Standards.

“Students are held accountable for their performance on the new Florida Assessment and End-of-Course (EOC) exams. Teachers are held accountable through their evaluations, from which a portion is based on the performance of their students on the assessments that can determine receiving of performance pay. The principals are held accountable for their school based on the performance of the students that attend. This performance is part of their evaluation and also determines if they receive performance pay. The

school is held accountable for the students' performance as the school grade is based upon the proficiency of the students based on the state's school grading formula. The district is held accountable for the overall success of the schools based on all students' proficiency to determine the district's state issued grade.

“Because of the 'high stakes' that student performance plays in the accountability model outlined in Florida Statutes, attendance has become even more important than it has ever been. To be able to cover all of the standards, assess the students for mastery and re-teach if needed, the schools have developed curriculum maps that are used to develop lesson plans that drive the instruction each day.

“Everyday school attendance is the only way that students have to be introduced to the skills and content that is required in each subject and each grade level. When a student

misses school they miss the opportunity to be part of the instruction delivered by the teacher that day. The new Florida Standards are so rigorous and require intense instruction that make-up work doesn't replace classroom instruction.

“Our teachers, our principals and our district staff are required by statutes to enforce the laws that address school attendance as well as the responsibility in addressing what has to be done if students are not coming to school on a regular basis.

“Florida Statute 1003.21 School Attendance, is the compulsory school attendance law that governs students age six to age 16.

“Florida Statute 1003.26 Enforcement of School

Attendance, governs the steps schools take to promote and enforce regular school attendance.

“In this statute, the schools after all attempts to correct non-attendance provide the documentation to the district office at which the documentation is submitted to the county judge for truancy.

“Taylor County School Board Policy 5.02 Student Attendance says that attendance be addressed in the Student Progression Plan. The Student Progression Plan addresses number of absences, unexcused absences and excused absences. This information is also a part of the student handbook for each of our district's schools. This information is based on Florida Statutes and Board Policy.

“The Taylor County School District encourages our students and parents/guardians to adopt a philosophy that everyday school attendance is important. Allow our teachers to be able to be involved in the education of your child each and every school day.

“Remember, if your child has to miss school, send a note to their teacher, or call the office so you can have it recorded as an excused absence. We understand sometimes students have to miss. Remember, when your child isn't at school, they are missed.”

hearings, but it can't raise them.

According to County Finance Director Tammy Taylor, the budget originally included a three-percent raise for employees, but that was changed to the \$1 per hour raise during the commission's discussions. Call-in and seasonal employees will not be included in the raises, she said.

Because of an increase in the projected taxable value of the county, while tax rates are staying level, the commission is set to bring in an additional \$208,000 in tax revenue for its general fund as well as \$30,000 in its MSTU fund (which is funded on a tax on property in the unincorporated area of the county for services duplicated by the city such as fire protection).

The county's proposed 2014-15 budget totals \$41.3 million, an increase of \$4.2 million over the current year. According to Taylor, \$1 million of the increase will result from accumulated excess sales tax revenue for the hospital as well as \$725,000 in road paving grants and \$409,000 in airport grants.

Based on a budget summary provided by Taylor, many internal departments are set for increases over the current year due to the proposed raises.

The commission has proposed to cut its funding of the Perry-Taylor County Chamber of Commerce

(\$5,000) as well as United Way (\$20,384). The budget does include \$10,000 for

Main Street Perry and \$1,500 for the Taylor Soil & Water Conservation Board.
