Speaker: David Beresford "Bugs in the Garden"



David Beresford is an Assistant Professor at Trent who teaches entomology (the study of bugs) and invasive species biology. His research focuses on insect pests of livestock and wildlife, as well as insect biodiversity in Northern Ontario. The website "Rate My Professor" ranks David as a solid 4.7 out of 5 for awesomeness with comments such as "such a nice person, most amazing prof at Trent" and "Great Prof, would



take all of his courses if I could", and "Hands down my favourite professor at

Trent". One warning that could be a predictor of his talk to us is "careful, he has a tendency to get off topic and tell stories about flies, and his research in flies". We welcome his passionate talk to us about his bugs!

2016 Scholarships!

At our November meeting, we will be awarding \$1000 scholarships to these deserving students:

Anders Fish is currently finishing his fourth and final year of Honours Bachelors of Science in Sustainable Agricultural and Food Systems. He has worked on many farms -- in his hometown of Antigonish, Nova Scotia and in Spain and France as part of the Worldwide Opportunity on Organic Farms (WOOF) program. Throughout his degree at Trent, he has worked at the Trent Vegetable Gardens and the Seasoned Spoon Cafe which, together, create a sustainable food system and an important educational resource. His passion for agriculture has led to his engagement in faculty-supported and self-directed research into vegetative-damaging air pollutants, and potentially novel and sustainable fertilizers. In the future he hopes to complete a Masters degree with an emphasis in sustainable agricultural methods in the developing world, with application for adaptation to climate change.

Megan Kitchen gained her initial horticultural experience with various high school green industry classes, an employment position at Gardens Plus and a cooperative education placement with the Invading Species Awareness Program. Since then, she has expanded her experience by volunteering at Peterborough GreenUp in Ecology Park as well as employment at Griffin's Greenhouses where she worked for two consecutive summers. After three years studying at Fleming College she has completed the Ecosystem Management Technology Program, receiving a diploma as an Ecosystem Management Technologist. As a final project for the program she worked in collaboration with the City of Kawartha Lakes Environmental Advisory Committee to lead a team of students in creating a pollinator monitoring program report. This report emphasized the importance of pollinators (such as butterflies, moths, birds, beetles etc.) and promoted the installation of pollinator beds with native plant species. For the summer of 2016 she worked at the Otonabee Region Conservation Authority as an Environmental Technician Assistant. Here she had the opportunity to participate in many events engaging the community and school groups with activities such as tree plantings, pollinator presentations and shoreline restorations. Currently, she is attending Trent University to pursue a Bachelor of Science in Environmental Science.

Lauren MacTavish is currently attending Trent University pursuing a Joint Major in Sustainable Agriculture & Food System Studies and Sociology. While at Trent she has volunteered at the Trent Vegetable Gardens and The Seasoned Spoon Cafe where she has been able to gain knowledge of a local food system and gardening. She is interested in food insecurity and food programmes within Canada and the localization of our food systems. In the future, she hopes to be able open a food cooperative to help farmers sell and consumers to buy more local products and increase food security in communities.
