- ➤ A Network that brings together experts in public health, law, sustainability, economics, and business to look at how trade policy and trade and investment agreements protect and improve the population's health in the UK.
- PETRA is funded for three years by the UKPRP

WHAT IS PETRA TRYING TO ADDRESS?

On one hand:

- Trade provides prosperity, international co-operation and world peace.
- Trade benefits the public's health and is central to growth in income.
- Trade is both necessary and good for the UK and its trading partners.





WHAT IS PETRA TRYING TO ADDRESS?

On the other hand:

- Noncommunicable diseases (NCDs) such as cancer, obesity, heart disease, and diabetes are the greatest cause of premature death and illhealth in the UK.
- > Trade agreements can result in greater availability of products that directly contribute to NCDs.
- > Trade practices such as intellectual property protection can deem public health provisions (eg front-of-pack labelling) as barriers to trade.



- Business case for developing PETRA as an academic centre for trade and health






CHALLENGES

- ➤ Limited / siloed expertise in the UK






TOPIC SYNERGIES ACROSS UKPRP
