He is a nationally-acclaimed performer and is in demand as a clinician, recitalist, leader of hymn festivals, silent film accompanist, and organ consultant. Dr. Schwandt has been a featured performer for the American Guild of Organists (AGO), the American Theatre Organ Society (ATOS), and the Organ Historical Society (OHS). He has been featured numerous times on American Public Media's *Pipedreams* broadcasts. Equally at home on a classical or theatrical pipe organ, he is known for his musical versatility and ability to excite and engage audiences of every kind.



John Schwandt has served churches as a parish musician in Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Indiana. Most recently, he served as Artist-in-Residence at McFarlin United Methodist Church in Norman, and is currently Artist-in-Residence at East Lake United Methodist Church in Birmingham, Alabama.

James Hammann has recently retired as co-chair of the music department at The University of New Orleans and relocated from there to Iowa Falls, Iowa, where he is the proud owner of an historic Lustron Home. During his twenty years at UNO he taught

organ, harpsichord, theory, and music history. He is presently serving St. Matthew's by the Bridge Episcopal Church in Iowa Falls as their organist. Dr. Hammann holds degrees in organ performance and church music from Ohio Wesleyan University and The University of Michigan. His major teachers include Rexford Keller,



Robert Clark, and Marilyn Mason.

Hammann's conducting credits include a recent three-year tenure as music director of The New Orleans Civic Symphony, a four year stint as music director of The Allen Park Symphony, and conductor of the Southeastern Michigan Choral Society. He was named "Artist of the Year" by the Toledo Arts Commission in 1978 for his founding and conducting of The Little Orchestra Society of Toledo.

Hammann has played organ recitals throughout the United States, and has given over one hundred performances of his one man show, "Old Bach," where he dons costume and wig to recreate moments in the composer's life and play representative selections on the organ and harpsichord. He holds the Associate Diploma from the AGO.

Eric Olson is a doctoral student at the University of Minnesota, studying violin with Sally O'Reilly. Other violin teachers include I-Fu Wang, Robert Dan, and Patricia Smith. In addition to his violin studies, Eric studied viola with James Vanvalkenburg and Robert Dan, and piano with Deborah Moriarty, Alan Nathan, and Penny Draper. He is currently the adjunct Professor of Violin and Viola at Bemidji State University, and a part-time instructor at Simply Strings Studio in St. Paul.

Jennifer Olson holds a Bachelor's degree in voice from Wittenberg University and a Master's degree in voice from the University of Michigan. She is currently pursuing her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at the University of Minnesota under the tutelage of Adriana Zabala. Simon Johnson, Organist and Assistant Director of Music at the renowned St. Paul's Cathedral in London will play a concert on the newly-refurbished and



enhanced pipe organs of the Cathedral of Saint Paul on Tuesday, February 25, at 7:30 p.m. The public is invited, and a freewill offering will be taken.

The program will include: Mendelssohn – Allegro, Chorale and Fugue in D; Brahms – Herzlich tut mich verlangen; J.S.Bach – Prelude

and Fugue in C major (BWV 547); and Widor – Symphony No 6.

In London, Simon presides over the five-manual Willis/Mander organ, one of the finest musical instruments in the world. In addition to the daily round of services at St Paul's, Simon also plays for all the important national services and events that take place there, most recently at the funeral service of Baroness Thatcher.

Last year he played for the national service of thanksgiving to celebrate the diamond jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen, for which he also arranged some of the music. He directed the music at the national service commemorating the withdrawal of British armed forces from Iraq, and also performed when the Dalai Lama received the Templeton Prize at St Paul's.

The 100-voice VocalEssence Chorus and the 32-voice Ensemble Singers will perform two *John Rutter Jubilee* concerts in honor of John Rutter at Central Lutheran Church on Friday, March 21 at 8:00 p.m. and Sunday, March 23 at 4:00 p.m., as part of the 45th season of VocalEssence.

John Rutter was originally scheduled to conduct these performances, but has recently been advised by his doctor to refrain from international travel for the next six months due to a short-term illness.

Minnesota Public Radio's classical music expert John Birge will lead a concert conversation with VocalEssence founder and artistic director Philip Brunelle about his experiences working with John Rutter before both performances, at 7:00 p.m. Friday and 3:00 p.m. Sunday.

The program will focus on Rutter's own choral pieces, including *Birthday Madrigals*, A Dedication and an Amen, All Creatures of Our God and King and Requiem. Mr. Rutter will appear in a pre-taped video welcome and in three composition introductions during each performance. A longtime choral composer and conductor, Rutter is vice president of the Association of British Choral Directors, as well as the founder and conductor of the Cambridge Singers.

On Saturday, March 22, at 10:00 a.m. Philip Brunelle will conduct a *Community Sing* at the Hennepin Avenue United Methodist Church, featuring John Rutter's music. Choral fans as well as vocalists, amateur and experienced alike, are invited to attend – sheet music will be provided!

Tickets for the *John Rutter Jubilee* concerts are available for \$20 and up (youth ages 6-18 and college students with a valid college ID are eligible for half-price tickets.) Laulupidu in Tallinn, Estonia

June 27 - July 7

Here's an opportunity to attend the Estonian song festival (*laulupidu*) and other Baltic capitals this summer.

Mark Sedio, Cantor at Central Lutheran Church together with his spouse Jeff Sartain, Executive Minister at Plymouth Congregational Church have put together a tour to the Baltic States this summer, the primary focus of which is to attend the All-Estonia Song Festival (*Laulupidu*) in Tallinn, Estonia.

The *laulupidu* - one of the world's largest choral events - takes place only every five years. Imagine 20,000 people singing in the stage/shell of the Song Festival Grounds (*Lauluväljak*) - 100,000 people seated on the hill joining them occasionally in song. If you've seen the excellent documentary *The Singing Revolution* (http://www.singingrevolution.com) you're most likely familiar with the event.

The tour will take place from June 27 through July 7 (the *Laulupidu* takes place on July 6).

Other places included on the itinerary are Vilnius, Lithuania (for centuries a crossroads of cultures and a center of Jewish learning with many architectural gems), Riga, Latvia (a jewel of a city with tons of Hanseatic red brick architecture and its own particular brand of *Art Nouveau* plus one of Europe's largest organs (!) in the Riga *Dom*), Tallinn (with its amazing Medieval center), the Estonian island of Saaremaa (a stone Teutonic fortress, windmills and strange small

crater lakes) and Cesis (an incredibly well preserved off-the-beaten-path Latvian town).

News from the National AGO ...and elsewhere

Organ blower rooms

This was an article in the Westchester AGO newsletter. In early May 2013, an organist was invited to play the 25th anniversary recital on an organ for which he served as consultant in 1987 (Möller IV/58) at St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church in Bronxville, New York.

A week or so before the recital, when the parish's director of music, John Peter Strybos, went to the organ loft to practice and turned the organ on, he heard a horrific noise emanating from the blower room (which is adjacent to the choir loft). Upon further investigation, it seems the parish sexton unwittingly stored some loose black plastic bags on the floor of the blower room near the blower intake. When the blower started up, it drew the bags in, shredded them and blew scraps and plastic dust throughout the instrument, rendering the organ unplayable. What didn't get shredded melted inside the blower. Early estimates predict that perhaps \$5 of plastic bags may have caused up to \$100,000 in damage.

A favorable settlement has been reached with the insurance company, and a contract for the costly restoration has been awarded, with work scheduled to begin in January of 2014.



NEA Grant for Boston National Convention

The American Guild of Organists (AGO) has been awarded a grant by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support the 2014 AGO National Convention in Boston, Mass., June 23–27, 2014. The \$15,000 NEA "Art Works" grant is directed to support performances, educational workshops, publication of the *Boston Organ Book*, and new music premieres. The grant carries a mandate that it be matched dollar for dollar from other funding sources. The 2014 AGO National Convention is the fifth consecutive AGO National Convention that has garnered funding from the arts endowment.

The 2014 AGO National Convention will augment and enrich cultural life in New England and beyond through performances by outstanding solo artists and choral and instrumental ensembles in the city's concert halls and houses of worship, educational workshops, and presentations of scholarly papers. In addition, the Guild has commissioned fourteen composers renowned for artistic excellence, totaling more than 100 minutes of new music.

Premier performances will be presented of commissioned works from: Carol Barnett, Lisa Bielawa, Carson Cooman, Pamela Decker, Libby Larsen, David Lasky, Matthew Martin, Nico Muhly, Betty Olivero, Scott Perkins, Robert Sirota, Hilary Tann, Edward Thompson, and James Woodman. Serving to highlight Boston's heritage of American musical composition, six historic compositions by Boston composers will be grouped with six new music commissions to form the Boston Organ Book, a publication to be distributed to all convention registrants to encourage performances for the benefit of the public.

Silent Auction in Boston

The AGO National Council will sponsor a Silent Auction at the AGO National Convention in Boston in June 2014. The proceeds will benefit the Annual Fund, which covers the expenses of educational programs, Pipe Organ Encounters, professional certification programs, competitions, conventions, January Jubilees, and other costs of running the organization. The auction will be run online so that all AGO members and friends may participate, and not just those attending the national convention.

A number of members of the Council have already given items and services for the Silent Auction. These include two round-trip coach airfares to Europe, two expensive bottles of wine, workshops, and CD recordings. We would like to invite Chapters to promote the auction, including donation of items that might be interest to the AGO membership. This might include time share vacations, new scores and books, complimentary registration to a regional convention, a recital or workshop.

Donors will need to establish a reasonable value for each item and a recommended starting bid. For tangible items (books, CDs, artwork, rental equivalency of a time share week, concert tickets), the value should be tax deductible, but check with your tax professional. Unfortunately, services (lessons, a recital or workshop) are not tax deductible. The AGO will set a minimum starting bid where none is advised by the donor.

What to do with the donated items? Wait until you hear who the winning bidder was, and then mail/ship the item to the winning bidder. Shipping expense is to be covered by the donor. Items for which there is no bid will be kept by the donors.

We would like to have a complete list of auction items, and a photograph of each item, by 1 May 2014

in order to prepare the auction. The online auction will begin 1 June 2014 and end on 30 June 2014.


