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Barber West Africa celebrates five years in U.S. Gulf

Barber West Africa Line (BWAL) is celebrating its fifth year of uninterrupted service between the U.S. Gulf and West Africa. BWAL officials say they are optimistic about this market's future despite a high U.S. dollar and economic problems in some African countries.

"After nearly 60 years in the trade, we are aware of the boom and bust nature of it," said Kevin Corbett, BWAL general manager in New York. "Although we always enjoy a boom period, we base ourselves on being able to survive long periods when the market is depressed."

BWAL has offered uninterrupted direct service between the U.S. Atlantic Coast and West Africa since 1928, longer than any other line serving this route.

The U.S.-flag line is the only carrier offering roll-on/roll-off (RO/RO) cargo service to West Africa. The motor vessels *TANA* and *TAKORADI*, built in 1984, were designed especially for the West African trade.

The ships' stern-quarter ramps permit the loading of odd-size RO/RO cargo that is common to the African market. Each ship also has two 40-ton capacity cranes on deck, so containers can be unloaded while RO/RO cargo is being removed. While this practice is common at many U.S. ports, many West African ports lack modern container facilities. BWAL was the first carrier to use such selfsustaining vessels for the West Africa container service.

The line's average port stay is eight hours, and the regular monthly service is punctual.

Ports of call in the West Africa trade route include Houston and other ports along the U.S. Gulf and Atlantic coasts and the West African ports of Dakar, Freetown, Monrovia, Abidjan, Tema, Lome, Lagos and Douala.

Oceans International is the U.S. general agent for Mexican Line, which operates several multipurpose vessels on a regular basis between the U.S. Gulf and Europe.

PHA reports rise in coffee imports

Imported coffee shipped through the Port of Houston Authority's coffee department during the first seven months of this year was up almost 1.200 tons from the same period in 1985. The figures reflect a continuing use in coffee imports to Houston.

Import coffee bandled by the department through July totaled 15,784 tons, compared to 19,505 tons for the list seven months of 1985, said Tommy Barnes, manager of PHA's commercial watchouse. The figures do not include coffee that was shipped through Poet Authority wharves but dut not move through the coffee department, Harses said.

The seven-month figures indicate a trend of increasing coffee imports to Houston. In 1985, a total of 92,549 tons of coffee were imported to Houston, up more than 19 percent from 1984 imports of 77,594 toos.

Top countries sending coffee to Houston are Brazil, Cutombia, Uganda and Ivory Coast. Other coffee producers doing business with Houston include Costa Rica, Ecoador, Guatemala, India and the Philippines.

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
PNSC offers weekly service to Karachi

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FMC official predicts tougher enforcement

The U.S. Federal Maritime Commission, spurred by the Shipping Act of 1984, will be keeping closer tabs on customs brokers, treight forward ers and the agency's other licensees, an FMC official says.

"The FMC is in the process of markedly accelerating ns policing role under the '84 zet," said FMC Commissioner Edward J Philbin "You can expect increased surveillance through us and more investigations of prohibited acts." Philbin discussed FMC activities and the 1984 act at a recent meeting of the Houston Custombouse Brokers and Freight Forwarders Association. He said the commission's top prioritics now include seeing that all licensees undergo FMC compliance investigations within a year of being licensed and costiring the accuracy of all information used in determining whether a particular business should be licensed. The commission also will be working to collect.



more "trade industry and intelligence, data," Phillpin said.

Currently about 1,000 businesses are licensed by the EMC and that number is down somewhat from previcos years, Phillin said. OF 290 licensees the EMC recently investigated during a 12 month period, 195 received warning letters, he said

"That's a surprisingly high warning rate of 67 percent." he said. "Our surveillance investigations have in creased 150 percent over last year and are probably going to accelerate."

FMC and U.S. Customs officials signed an agreement Aug. I that calls for the two agencies to exchange more of the information each agency collects. This, said Philbin, means more "aggressive detection of fraud, exports which endanger national security and other shipping violations."

However, the matstime commis sion's most important job during the rest of this decade will be collecting and analyzing information on the effeet of the Shipping Act of 1984 on all segments of the shipping industry, Phillin said. Section 18 of the act calls for the commission to gather information on the act's impact through a five year period that ends in March 1989 An advisory commission will be established in September 1989 to prepare a report to Congress on the effectiveness of conferences and other issues facing the shipping industry.
