INSTITUTE OF CHILD HEALTH (Hospital for Sick Children) (University of London)

The Institute of Child Health is associated with the Hospital for Sick Children, Great Ormond Street, and the Post Graduate Medical School at Hammersmith Hospital, and also has an arrangement with the Queen Elizabeth Hospital for Children, Hackney. In its programme, teaching on every aspect of child health is provided including the Department for the new-born and premature infant at the Post Graduate School, Maternity and Child Welfare Clinics, Nursery Homes, etc. The Institute provides tuition throughout the year in three terms of three months' duration each, commencing in January, May and September, and in addition a series of lectures by specialists and experts in various spheres is given each term. The teaching is mainly by means of attendance on the hospital practice, which is continuous. The fees vary from 25 guineas for six months' attendance to 3 guineas for a week.

INSTITUTE OF DERMATOLOGY (St. John's Hospital for Diseases of the Skin) (University of London)

The Institute of Dermatology (Medical School of St. John's Hospital for Diseases of the Skin). Clinical teaching takes place in the out-patient department twice daily, for which the fee varies from 1 guinea for one week to 15 guineas for a year. There are also facilities for study and tuition in the pathological laboratory, but owing to the present restricted accommodation, no ward instruction is possible as yet. A short course of lectures is intended for the summer months and a longer and more systematic course in the winter. The fees for these courses will be approximately 4 guineas and 10 guineas respectively. Clinical Assistantships will be arranged for the more advanced students.

INSTITUTE OF DISEASES OF THE CHEST (Brompton Hospital) (University of London)

The Institute of Diseases of the Chest (Medical School of the Brompton Hospital). The teaching is primarily by means of attendance on hospital practice, students enrolling for three months or more on what is at present approximately a half-time course of instruction consisting of clinical work on the wards and outpatients departments and a certain number of lectures and demonstrations. For this the fee is 4 guineas for one month or 10 guineas for three months. In special cases a whole-time programme can be arranged, but the numbers are restricted for the present by lack of accommodation. There are three terms annually, commencing in January, April and October.

INSTITUTE OF LARYNGOLOGY AND OTOLOGY (Royal National Throat, Nose and Ear and Golden Square Hospitals) (University of London)

A comprehensive course lasting 20 weeks and designed to cover the whole field of the specialty is held twice a year in January and July. This consists of lectures, demonstrations and attendance on the practice of the hospital, with facilities for dissection. A special point is made of the anatomy, physiology and pathology related to the subject. Advanced students may obtain additional experience by appointment as Out-patient Assistants. The composite fee, including enrolment as a clinical assistant, attendance on the hospital practice and at one of the comprehensive courses, but excluding dissection, varies from 35 guineas for three months to 45 guineas for a year. There are lower rates for attendance on the hospital practice only.

OPHTHALMIC INSTITUTE (Royal London Ophthalmic, Royal Westminster Ophthalmic, Central London Ophthalmic Hospitals) (University of London)

A course of lectures and classes extending over a period of five months, to meet the requirements of candidates entering for the examinations for the Diploma in Ophthalmic Medicine and Surgery and other Degrees in Ophthalmology, will be given by members of the Honorary Staff of the hospital and others, commencing in March and October of each year.

D.O.M.S. Part I. Anatomy (including embryology and histology), physiology of the eye, optics (elementary and physiological). Composition fee, £15 15s. od.

D.O.M.S. Part II. Bacteriology, pathology, operative surgery, ophthalmoscopic conditions, medical ophthalmology, lectures on external diseases, retina and optic nerve, motor anomalies, uveal tract, etc. Composition fee, £26 5s. od.

Students can attend the clinical practice of the Hospital and hold the appointments of Junior Clinical Assistants

and Clinical Assistants concurrently with the above course.

INSTITUTE OF NEUROLOGY (National Hospital Medical School, Queen Square; British Post Graduate Medical Federation)

Post Graduate training is provided in the various departments of neurology. The Out-patient practice is open at 10 a.m. every day, except Saturday. A fee of £2 2s. od. per month is charged for attending the Outpatient Department only. The In-patient practice is open at 10 a.m. and a limited number of Clinical Clerks are appointed. Fees, three months, £15 15s. od, six months, £29 8s. od.

Special courses of instruction are given during the autumn and winter terms and clinical demonstrations are given on Saturday mornings and Wednesday afternoons during term. Fee, fi is. od.

INSTITUTE OF ORTHOPAEDICS (University of London)

The Institute is concerned with post graduate education in orthopaedics and with research. The practice of the hospital, both at the Central Hospital in Great Portland Street, and at the country branch at Stanmore, is open to post graduates, who may attend for various periods. In addition to hospital practice, formal courses of various lengths are held during academic terms. Selected students have opportunities of taking an active part in the work of the Institute and Hospital and of spending in the Institute up to two years of their training; a high standard is demanded and they should have previous surgical training, experience or qualification, or previous anatomical, physiological or pathological experience.

A short course in Advanced Clinical Orthopaedics will be given from April 5th to 10th, and repeated from April 19th to 24th, 1948. The fee for the course is £6 6s. od., and early application should be made to the Dean, stating the date preferred.

INSTITUTE OF UROLOGY (Combined School of St. Peter's and St. Paul's Hospitals) (University of London)

Three courses are held annually, January to April, April to July, September to December. Instruction includes systematic lectures, out-patient sessions, ward visits, operation sessions and tutorial demonstrations. All post graduates attending a course are expected to attend lectures, and may attend all the tutorial demonstrations. They will be allotted individually to certain out-patient sessions, ward visits and operation sessions. Fee, £15 15s. od.

POST GRADUATE MEDICAL SCHOOL OF LONDON (University of London)

The Post Graduate Medical School of London (formerly the British Post Graduate Medical School) is associated with the Hammersmith Hospital, Ducane Road, W.12. It has University Departments in Medicine, Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, and Pathology. The teaching in the clinical departments, which is of an advanced nature and based on ward work, is continuous and is supplemented by lectures during three 14-week sessions starting in January, April and September. Suitable students are encouraged to undertake research work. A course for the University Diploma in Clinical Pathology, lasting one year, is available for a limited number of selected students. This commences in October. Refresher courses lasting a fortnight in practical anaesthetics are held, to which two students at a time ate admitted. The Department of Radiology of the Hospital provides courses for the Diplomas in Medical Radiology of the University and Conjoint Board. The fees vary from 3 guineas for one week to 50 guineas for a year.

HAMPSTEAD GENERAL HOSPITAL POST GRADUATE SOCIETY

An extended refresher course in general medical and surgical subjects will be held at the Hampstead General Hospital on Thursday afternoons from April 1st to June 17th, 1948. The fee for the course is £5 5s. od.

LONDON SCHOOL OF HYGIENE AND TROPICAL MEDICINE (University of London)

Course of study for the University of London Certificate and Diploma in Public Health. The course is designed for qualified medical practitioners and is intended primarily to prepare them for the Academic Post Graduate Certificate and Diploma in Public Health of the University of London. The preliminary part is intended to meet the needs of registered medical practitioners who intend to devote themselves to any branch of Public Health work, and the full course is intended to provide more advanced instruction for those practitioners who wish to qualify themselves for appointments in which they are required by law to hold registered Diplomas or Degrees in Public Health (or State Medicine). The preliminary course lasts three months, and the complete course covers one academic year of nine months, and tuition begins at the end of September in each year. The tuition fee for the course for the Certificate in Public Health is £21, and for the full course is £56 14s. od. (both payable at the time of enrolment). These fees include payments in respect of work in a public health department, instruction in infectious diseases and hospital administration, and certain visits. They do not include University Registration and examination fees. The registration fee, payable to the University by students who have not previously matriculated in the University of London, is £3 3s. od. Application for admission to the course should be made to the Registrar of the School. Applicants will be selected early in 1948 for the course beginning in

September, 1948. Applications from nationals from Pakistan and India should be made through the offices of their respective High Commissioners in London. Part-time students are not at present admitted to the course. The detailed regulations, governed by the Rules of the General Medical Council, are issued by the University of London.

Gourse of study for the Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene (England). The course is intended primarily to prepare qualified medical practitioners for the examination of the Conjoint Board for the Diploma in Tropical Medicine and Hygiene. The course is open to any qualified medical practitioner, but those not holding a medical qualification registrable in England should consult the Secretary of the Conjoint Board, 8, Queen Square, London, W.C.1, regarding their admissibility to the examination for the Diploma. The course is a continuous one of five months duration, preparing for a single examination by the Conjoint Board. A course will start on March 1st, 1948, in preparation for the examination in July, 1948. The tuition fee for the whole course is £40, but it does not include the examination fee payable to the Conjoint Board.

Application for admission to the course should be made to the Registrar of the School. Students from overseas are advised to make application as early as possible in order that they may be assured before sailing that there is a place available. Applications from nationals from Pakistan and India should be made through the offices of their respective High Commissioners in London.

Course of study for the Academic Diploma in Bacteriology. This course is designed to prepare candidates for the Academic Post Graduate Diploma in Bacteriology of the University of London. The course is open to graduates in medicine, science and pharmacy of the London or another approved University, whose previous training has, in the opinion of the London University fitted them to profit by the course; registered medical practitioners and other students who, though not graduates, have obtained a qualification and undergone a previous training which, in the opinion of the London University, has fitted them to profit by the course. The course begins about the first week in October in each year and lasts one academic year of nine months. The examination for the Diploma is held once in each year beginning on the Thursday following the third Monday in June. The composite fee for the course is £56 148. od.; this includes tuition, hire of microscope, and the provision of a clean gown and towel each week. The examination fee is £,5 5s. od. The registration fee, payable to the University by students who have not previously matriculated in the University of London, is £3 3s. od.

Applications for admission to the course should be submitted to the Registrar of the School, and should be accompanied by a statement of the candidate's past experience, and of the particular branch of bacteriology that he intends to take up in the future. A list of publications, if any, should also be included. It is important to know whether the candidate is going to take up bacteriology as a whole-time career. The number of places is strictly limited. Applications for admission should be received by the end of March; candidates will be informed by the end of April whether or not they can be admitted.

Applicants who are interested in hospital pathology as opposed to public health bacteriology are reminded that a course for the Diploma in Clinical Pathology is available at the Post Graduate Medical School of London.

Short courses in the principles of Medical

Statistics and Statistical Methods. to the general course of instruction in medical statistics and elementary statistical ideas and methods which forms part of the curriculum of students working for academic diplomas, the Department of Medical Statistics offers a short and rather more advanced three months' course in these subjects. In this short course particular attention is given to the analysis of medical statistical material and students are taught, in lectures and by practical work, the more important methods of treating and interpreting numerical data. Special lectures are given on the general principles of statistical inference and the elements of the theory of probability. The nature and source of medical-statistical data are discussed and lectures given on statistical-epidemiological aspects of diseases and on such subjects as occupational and social aspects of mortality and morbidity, population sampling methods and tests of inoculation procedures. The programme consists of 4-5 lectures and 6-7 hours of practical work each week, usually arranged to occupy two whole days. The days and hours of attendance are not fixed but are arranged from term to term to fit in with other courses in the School and to meet, when possible, the needs of students who wish to take this part-time course and to carry on with other work at the same time. Those with more time at their disposal are able to do additional practical work and are assisted in analysing statistical material of their own outside the fixed hours of classes. The course lasts three months and is held twice a year, beginning in the first week of January and about mid-April, if sufficient applications are received. The fee for the course is £12 12s. od. Application should be made to the Registrar of the School not less than one month before the course is due to begin.

Course in Applied Helminthology. A short course is held from time to time, and is designed for members of staffs of agricultural colleges, officers or intending officers of the Colonial Agricultural and Veterinary Services, and officers engaged under local authorities. 
