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MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT


Welcome to the 15th issue of the 4th year of the President's News Digest. In this issue of the News Digest, I will address the subject of "learning styles in universities".



The idea of learning styles began in the 1970s.

People process new information in a number of different ways indicating different learning styles. Students have preferences for certain learning styles, which can help them maximize their academic success. Learning style preferences refer to the characteristic strengths and preferences in the ways we take in and process information.

David Kolb published his learning styles model in 1984 from which he developed his learning style inventory.



The University of Waterloo (web link provided), provides good information about learning styles, a snapshot is included below. The Soloman-Felder model of learning styles, which incorporates, self-test learning preferences for university students is widely used. Each of the four scales of the Soloman-Felder index of learning styles has two opposite preferences. Everyone uses all preferences at different times, but not usually with equal levels of confidence.

The active/reflective scale: How do you prefer to process information?

The sensing/intuitive scale: How do you prefer to take in information?

The sequential/global scale: How do you prefer to organize information?

Universities' students have different abilities and varying learning style preferences. Understanding such learning styles by academic staff will help our students perform better. Students' preferred learning styles have significant influence on their behavior and achievements and should be taken into account in devising learning strategies.
