It has become difficult to advance in the field of public health without significant experience or a master's level degree. With a bachelor's degree, look for entry-level positions, often working in a support role. Bachelor graduates may also qualify to work as health education teachers after the additional completion of a state-approved educator program. Organizations in smaller or rural communities, or communities abroad, may be more flexible about hiring public health professionals with undergraduate degrees.

IMPORTANT TRANSFERABLE QUALITIES TO INCLUDE ON YOUR RESUME (WHETHER YOU'RE PURSUING A JOB IN THE VARIETY OF PUBLIC HEALTH FIELDS OR NOT)

Analytical skills. Many public health professionals analyze data and other information to evaluate programs and to determine the needs of the people they serve. Many others must be able to understand and follow current regulations and be able to adapt to new laws.

Instructional skills. There are some fields of public health (such as education) where professionals should be good at teaching and public speaking so that they can lead programs and teach classes.

People skills. Public health professionals interact with many people. They must be good listeners and be culturally sensitive to respond to the needs of the people they serve. Many need to be able to discuss staffing problems and patient information with other professionals, such as physicians and health insurance representatives. They must be able to motivate and lead staff.

Problem-solving skills. Public health professionals need to think creatively about how to improve the health of their audience through health education programs. In addition, they need to solve problems

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that arise in planning programs as they are often responsible for finding creative solutions to staffing or other administrative problems.

Writing skills. Public health professionals develop written materials to convey health-related information. They also write proposals to develop programs and apply for funding.

Communication skills. Professionals in the public health field must be able to communicate effectively with other health professionals

Detail oriented. Public health professionals such as occupational health and safety specialists must pay attention to details. They need to recognize and adhere to specific safety standards and government regulations. Others must pay attention to detail. They might be required to organize and maintain scheduling and billing information for very large facilities, such as hospitals.

Technical skills. Some professionals in the field must be able to use advanced technology. They often work with complex testing equipment. Many must be able to follow advances in health care technology. For example, some may need to use coding and classification software and electronic health record (EHR) systems as their facility adopts these technologies.

Competency*	Definition
Critical Thinking/Problem Solving	Exercise sound reasoning and analytical thinking; obtain, interpret, and use knowledge, facts, and data to analyze situations, make decisions, and solve workplace problems; and demonstrate originality and inventiveness in work.
Oral/Written Communications	Articulate thoughts, ideas clearly and effectively with persons inside and outside of organization; demonstrate public speaking skills; and communicate new ideas to others; write/edit memos, letters, and complex technical reports clearly and effectively.
Teamwork/Collaboration	Build collaborative relationships with colleagues and customers representing diverse cultures, races, ages, genders, religions, lifestyles, and viewpoints; be able to work within team structure; and be able to negotiate and manage conflicts.
Information Technology Application	Select and use appropriate technology to accomplish a given task and apply computing skills to problem solving.
Leadership	Leverage the strengths of others to achieve common goals; use interpersonal skills to coach and develop others; demonstrate ability to assess and manage one's own emotions and those of others, using empathetic skills to guide and motivate; and prioritize and delegate work.
Professionalism/Work Ethic	Demonstrate personal accountability, effective work habits, e.g. punctuality, working productively with others, and workload management, and understand impact of non-verbal communication on professional work image; demonstrate integrity and ethical behavior; act responsibly with the interests of the larger community in mind; and be able to learn from one's mistakes.
Career Management	Identify and articulate one's skills, strengths, knowledge, and experience relevant to position desired and career goals; identify areas necessary for professional growth; be able to navigate and explore job options and how to take the steps necessary for pursuing opportunities; and understand how to self-advocate for opportunities in the workplace.
