2012: A Look Ahead

Accreditation visits. Anatomy and Physiology lab construction. New course delivery methods. Students can expect 2012 to be a year filled with excitement and activity at Aultman College.

Here's what's on the horizon:

ACCREDITATION VISITS

During 2012, Aultman College will be hosting accreditation teams from the Ohio Board of Nursing (OBN), the Ohio Board of Regents (OBR), the National League for Nursing Accreditation Commission (NLNAC), and the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (HLC). This voluntary process provides assurance to students that they are receiving a high quality education. The Ohio Board of Nursing will be conducting the first visit Jan. 31 - Feb 1. A representative from OBN will talk with the administrative team, faculty, and students, and review faculty and student records. Students should be prepared to answer questions about their educational experience at Aultman College honestly and respectfully. The purpose of this visit is to grant continued full status approval of the Nursing program. Look for information to come about NLNAC, OBR, and HLC visits, which occur in Fall 2012.

ADDITIONAL SCIENCE LAB **CONSTRUCTION**

Work continues on the Science wing. The chemistry lab is complete and now hosting lab courses in chemistry and microbiology. Construction is now beginning on a second laboratory, which is slated for completion in time for the Fall 2012 semester. Fundraising continues for the Door to Discovery Campaign, which supports construction of the science lab project. Final dollars still need to be raised for a third laboratory and third floor restroom facilities.

PREPARATION FOR BACHELOR'S LEVEL PROGRAMMING

The College will be seeking permission to offer an RN-BSN program in the near future, with other bachelor's level health degrees down the road. That will mean not only meeting degree curriculum requirements with new courses, but also changing the way we deliver courses. The college is currently in the process of

investigating online course offerings with a plan of piloting some selected courses in Fall 2012.

SUNSET OF WALSH UNIVERSITY PARTNERSHIP

This year will mark the final classes taken by Aultman College students at Walsh University. When the college was first founded in 2004, Aultman College students took all of their general education courses at Walsh. Since that time, the college has focused on developing the faculty and facilities to offer all courses on the Aultman College campus. In Fall 2012, the goal will become reality. "Aultman College would not be in existence today without our Walsh University partnership," said President Rebecca

Crowl. "We appreciate the guidance they have provided and the way they have welcomed our students onto their campus. This year marks the end of an eight-year era, but also the beginning of an exciting time for Aultman College. There are many opportunities that lie ahead."

News You Can Use!

NEW STUDENTS: Health Care Insurance Waiver/Enrollment Deadline: Jan 17

All degree-seeking full and part-time Aultman College students are required to have health insurance. If you are a NEW degree-seeking student and are currently enrolled in another insurance plan (either individually or through your parents or spouse), you MUST waive the AultCare insurance plan by Jan 17 or you will be billed. The Enroll/Waive link is on the home page of the College website at www.aultmancollege.edu.

Grants, Loans, Payment and Refund Info

Loans are disbursed no sooner than the week prior to class and as paperwork is turned in and complete. Grants, if applicable, will be disbursed after the add/drop period and class schedules and credit hours are verified.

Credit balances and applicable refunds will be processed within 14 days of loans/grants being disbursed to your account. If you have a balance on your account after your financial aid has been applied, it is due in full by January 17th, 2012. If you need to set up a payment plan, please contact Jenn Loretto at 330-363-2834 or jloretto@aultman.com for an appointment. You may view your balance on the *Wise*Line under your Billing Ledger.

Parking Reminders

Aultman Security will be monitoring student parking Lot 11. Tickets will be issued to all vehicles parked inappropriately. The first ticket will be a warning, but with the second ticket, the driver's access to Lot 11 will be revoked, and parking will only be permitted in the deck. Please remember to report to Aultman Security whenever you see a vehicle that is hit, blocked, or inappropriately parked in Lot 11.

Remember also that Aultman College requires students to park in Lot 11 or the deck, not on the streets. Residents have complained to Canton Police about street parking,

and students are advised that vehicles parked on the streets are subject to towing. If Lot 11 is full, use the parking deck, which is free if you show your badge when you exit. For any parking questions, please contact Monica Mendenhall at 330-363-9904.

Parking Waiver for students who are Aultman Employees!

If you are a student at Aultman College but also an employee of Aultman Hospital, you may waive your semester parking fee and parking permit distributed by the College for the Spring 2012 Semester. Please be aware that you will not have access to the student parking area at any time and you will be expected to park in the employee designated lots only. If you are interested in waiving, please complete the Parking Waiver form at the College office front desk. This form must be completed EVERY semester. 

Words To Remember

On Jan. 16, people across the United States celebrated Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., our country's most respected civil rights advocate and the youngest winner of the Nobel Peace Prize. King is described as "a man with a profound faith in the basic goodness of man and the great potential of American democracy." On April 3, 1968, the day before he was assassinated on the balcony of the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tennessee, King uttered these immortal words as he wrapped up his "I've Been to the Mountaintop" speech. "Like anybody, I would like to live a long life. Longevity has its place. But I'm not concerned about that now. I just want to do God's will. And He's allowed me to go up to the mountain. And I've looked over. And I've seen the Promised Land. I may not get there with you. But I want you to know tonight, that we, as a people, will get to the promised land!". Due to the work and messages of Dr. King and those who followed in his footsteps, today many colleges and universities across the country have established diversity programs to attract and support minority students.

Financial Aid News

Aultman College is working hard to develop and identify scholarship opportunities for students. Links to scholarships can be found on the College website, WiseLine, Aultman College Students Facebook page and the Pulse Online. Please pay close attention to scholarship criteria, application requirements and deadlines. Remember, you can't get a scholarship if you don't apply.



If you haven't already done so, now is the time to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Some schools and state aid programs have priority deadlines, so it is best to apply as soon as possible after January 1.

Here are the steps to apply:





Get a PIN

Before beginning the FAFSA process, you should apply for a Personal Identification Number (PIN) at www.pin.ed.gov. The PIN will allow you to sign your FAFSA electronically and to correct your processed FAFSA information online.

Complete Your Application

You can complete your FAFSA online at www.fafsa.ed.gov. There is detailed information regarding the required documents and information you will need to complete this form. You will need to make sure you have your tax information with you.

Find Your School Code

When completing the FAFSA form, you will be asked to supply the school code(s) of the school(s) that you want to receive your results of the FAFSA form. At www.fafsa.ed.gov, there is either an option on the initial page to "Find my school codes" or you will be given the opportunity to search for your school code(s) during the application process.

Make sure to click the "Submit" button

Your FAFSA form is not complete until you click the "Submit" button. At this point, you will receive a confirmation page. Print this for your records.

Follow up on your FAFSA

- Check the status of your submitted FAFSA
- Make corrections to a processed FAFSA
- Add or delete a school code

Town Hall Input Results in Change

In the Spring 2011 semester, Student Senate hosted several Town Hall meetings and invited students to share their concerns and suggestions for improvement at Aultman College. College officials attended the meetings along with Student Senate representatives. Listed below are the top five issues students raised and the resulting changes or responses from administration. "We appreciate the time students took to attend these meetings and provide their input," said Corey Meeks, Student Senate president. "We felt the process went well and we had some great dialogue that resulted in positive changes. We hope everyone will continue to participate in the Town Hall process."

Issue: Faculty Accessibility- Faculty are difficult to get in touch with; they are perceived to be too busy to help students outside of class or to advise on coursework.

Resolution: Faculty has posted office hours on their office doors. A new advising plan was implemented in the Fall 2011 semester that included all faculty in student advising.

Issue: *Registration-* Registration is very frustrating to students as they feel it is poorly organized. Students feel that class availability is poor. Limited section offerings cause students to be shut out of preferred class days and times. They would like the College to have better online technology for registration. Students also felt that the notification that summer 2011 classes would not be available was last minute and inconsiderate.

Resolution: The College will continue to keep registration consistent semester to semester with scheduled/controlled appointments until ready to implement the online registration. Each time, the process goes smoother as students are adjusting to the procedures. The registrar is working diligently on course scheduling to prevent students from getting shut out of classes. The most up-to-date schedule of classes is always available on the College website and WiseLine. The schedule clearly states that classes are "subject to change." The College will continue to stress to students the importance of checking the latest version of the schedule on a regular basis due to changes that arise. dule on a regular basis due to changes that arise.

Issue: *Re-aligned Curriculum-* With the realigned curriculum, the students who will be short one or two credits are very frustrated, not just by the shortage, but by the fact they cannot get answers from advisors about how the credit shortage can be resolved.

Resolution: Students were given the option to attend scheduled academic forums in the Spring 2011 semester to learn how they would be able to make up the credit hour

shortage. Those who attended learned that they could participate in independent study to make up for the missing credit hours. To ensure that students are informed of credit hour shortages, Dr. Smith and the Registrar will check degree audits two times per semester.

Issue: *Facilities-* Students have stressed the College needs more study and gathering space such as; as a student union, social space, and quiet study areas. Students have requested supplies in the student lounge such as a hole punch, stapler, pencil sharpener, etc. The LRC space is too small and students would like to have another lounge area/computer lab available. Also, students would like to know how to find out when classrooms are available for open study.

Resolution: A five-year campus facilities plan is being implemented by the strategic Goal I team. It includes more space and resources for students. Supplies were placed in the student lounge as were white boards, more tables, and three additional computers. Students are free to contact the campus coordinator or Student Life coordinator or view the hallway monitors for room availability for open study. More computers were added to the campus in Spring 2012, including several placed in Classroom 8, which is now designated as a quiet study room for students. There are plans to reconfigure the current LRC space to help the College gain additional study space and computers.

Issue: Services- Students have voiced that the LRC needs to provide more tutoring hours as well as tutors for nursing. Students are upset that they cannot print in the library and feel that it is difficult to get assistance in the library. They also feel that billing takes too long for checks to clear and new student orientation is too long.

Resolution: The LRC is continually working on its pool of tutors. Ten tutors in seven subject areas, including nursing, are available during the Spring 2012 semester. In Fall 2012, a new student printing program will be implemented to allow students to print in the library, LRC, and computer lab. Until then, printing is free in the library and LRC. The college hired an academic librarian who has an open door policy and is continuously offering her time and support to assist students. Billing has implemented a check scanner within the College to allow billing and campus coordinators to process/ cash all checks within the department. Check processing was changed so that checks are now cashed weekly within the college. In addition, in Fall 2011, Aultman College began accepting online payments through PayPal via the WiseLine. New student orientation is now more streamlined and shorter with the elimination of ATI testing.
