It was an incredible opportunity not to ignore, and soon I pondered the options with my parents on how to make it happen. Glass Slipper Project 2016 Collection Underway

EIGHT ZENGELER LOCATIONS SERVES AS DROP-OFF POINTS FOR CHARITY DRESS DRIVE
