A Quick Guide to APA Referencing for Nursing: Reference Examples

When you quote, paraphrase or summarise other people's information, ideas or opinions, cite your sources in the text of your assignment. In addition, provide a reference list containing full information for each source that is cited.

If the book has a DOI, include the DOI link in the reference after the publisher name, using this format: https://doi.org/10xxxxxx
Book with two authors Jarvis, C., & Forbes, H. (2021). Jarvis's physical examination and health assessment (3rd Australian & New Zealand ed.). Elsevier Australia.	(Jarvis & Forbes, 2021).	Reference entry: Publisher names that include a place, such as Elsevier Australia in this example, are written in full, including the place name. In-text citation: Cite both author names every time.
Book with three or more authors, up to and including 20 authors Perry, A. G., Potter, P. A., & Desmarais, P. L. (2019). Mosby's pocket guide to nursing skills & procedures (9th ed.). Elsevier.	(Perry et al., 2019).	Reference entry: Give surnames and initials for up to and including 20 authors, using an ampersand (&) before the last name. In-text citation: Use 'et al.' in the first and all following citations.
Book with organisation as author (e.g., a government agency or professional association) World Health Organization. (2020). Coronavirus disease: Infection prevention and control of epidemic and pandemic. United States Department of Health.	(World Health Organization [WHO], 2020). Subsequent citations: (WHO, 2020).	In-text citation: If you are citing the organisational author more than twice in your paper, you can abbreviate it. Provide the full name of the organisation the first time you mention it in the text, followed by the abbreviation. If the organisation name first appears in a citation in brackets, include the abbreviation in square brackets, followed by a comma and the year.
Chapter in an edited book (each chapter by different authors) Gordon, C. J. (2021). Fostering sleep. In J. Crisp, C. Douglas, G. Rebeiro, & D. Waters (Eds.), Potter and Perry's fundamentals of nursing (6th Australian & New Zealand ed., pp. 1132-1156). Elsevier Australia.	(Gordon, 2021).	Reference entry: Publisher names that include a place, like Elsevier Australia in this example, are written in full, including the place name. In-text citation: Cite only the author(s) of the chapter.

If the online work you are citing does not have a DOI, and you have retrieved it from a library research database or other library-provided service, you do not need to name that database or provide its URL. Refer to the Yeung and Rodgers example.

Reference entry: Format articles from systematic review databases like journal articles. If an article has an article number include it right after the issue number. Refer to the Amissah example. Note about Cochrane Database of Systematic Reviews and JBI databases: Articles from these databases are available only in those databases. Therefore, unlike most other references, you need to name the database in the reference entry.

Reference entry: If there is no author, begin the reference with the title of the article. In-text citation: Use the first or first few words of the title, with key words in capitals, in quotation marks. The first word of the citation must match the first word of the reference entry.

In-text citation: If you are citing the organisational author more than twice in your paper, you can abbreviate it. Provide the full name of the organisation the first time you mention it in the text, followed by the abbreviation. If the organisation name first appears in a citation in brackets, include the abbreviation in square brackets, followed by a comma and the year.

Reference entry: If the type of resource is not clear from the title, describe it in square brackets after the title to help your reader find the document you have used. e.g. [Fact sheet]. If necessary, refer to an Act's section number(s) in your assignment text, NOT in your citations.

Chapters in DSM-5 are referenced separately as each chapter has a separate DOI. For works published in the same year by the same author(s), add the suffixes a, b, c etc. to the date in both the in-text citation and the

Use the alphabetical order of the titles in the reference list to assign the suffixes.

Information in Joanna Briggs Institute databases is available only in those databases. Therefore, name the database in the reference entry, using italics and capital letters (e.g., Name of Database). Information retrieved from Joanna Briggs Institute databases requires a login or is session specific, meaning readers cannot access the material via the URL you have used. Therefore, provide the URL of the Joanna Briggs Institute login page instead.

Therefore, unlike most other references, you need to name the specific database in the reference entry. Use italics and capital letters (e.g., Name of Database). Also, include a retrieval date, as these databases change their content regularly, and do not archive previous versions of the articles.

If the URL requires a login or is session specific, meaning readers cannot access the information you have used, provide the URL of the database or login page instead of the URL of the work (as in the Morey example). Begin a reference with its title if there is no author.

If you are writing for an audience with access to this resource, provide the name of the site and its URL. For sites requiring login, use the homepage or login page URL. However, if the audience for which are you writing does not have access to the slides, cite them as a personal communication (see below).
Visual Works (e.g., infographic, graphs, diagrams, charts, maps and photographs) Statistics New Zealand. (2019, September 23). Use this format to cite (but not reproduce) infographics. If you are reproducing (reprinting or adapting) these images see "Tables and Figures" section in APA Referencing: A Guide for Ara Institute of Canterbury Ltd. 2022 for referencing and copyright attribution requirements.

Add suffixes a, b, c etc. to the date e.g., 2019a, 2019b, n.da, n.db. Use the alphabetical order of the <i>titles</i> in the reference list to assign the suffixes.

Provide a reference list entry only for the source you have read.
Personal communication (e.g., lecture, email, interview) Cite personal communication in your assignment text. Do not include personal communication in your reference list, as that information is not recoverable.	Registered Nurse B. Thompson (personal communication, May 11, 2021) reported that	Capitalise a job title if it comes immediately before a name.
