Raining Poetry in Adelaide

Raining Poetry in Adelaide is an annual festival that runs under the auspices of the JM Coetzee Centre for Creative Practice and is funded by the Adelaide City Council. It is entirely run by post-graduate volunteers at the University of Adelaide and inspired by similar projects around the world. Each year, a small shortlist of poems are blind-selected by a panel of judges. This selection is then cut into stencils, and then spray-painted onto the streets of Adelaide using hydrophobic paint, so that they only appear when it rains. The poems last 1-3 months. Raining Poetry in Adelaide is a beautifully ephemeral art project that aims to bring a bit of joy to the rainy streets of Adelaide in winter.
