inspiration to everyone. It is an honor to welcome Ramsay Grant as a member of Trinity's working group with responsibility for Project: Hope Community.

Hope Community has indeed become a church-wide outreach program. Through July, more than 40 of Trinity's faithful have contributed of themselves, in time and financial resources, to a church-wide effort to improve living conditions for our less fortunate neighbors. Hope Community is a refuge of respite for homeless persons and their children, with temporary living quarters, while they seek to reorganize their lives to return to the community as self sufficient citizens. All 15 of the family residence rooms have been completely repainted and furnished with new custom-made cabinetry, area rugs, blinds, bedside tables, pillows, bed spreads, etc. Additionally, Trinity's youth group

> painted over 150 feet of hallways. Trinity's UMW group organized a special treat for the children of Hope Communityto give gifts to their moms on Mothers Day.

Work continues apace. Through August and on into the fall Trinity's working group will turn its attention to refurbishing nine

bathrooms shared by a daily average of 40-50 residents. Each bathroom is sorely in need of painting. The showers need repair from constant moisture seeping from cinder block walls, causing mildew accumulation under the paint. Many of the toilet seats need replacing. Additionally, the goal is to replace very old and obsolete washing machines and dryers which are in need of constant repair. Currently, only two washers and three dryers

are in working order.

Help Alleviate Hunger - CROP Walk

Each fall, Trinity joins other local churches in participating in the CROP Walk, a national annual event coordinated by Church World Service to raise awareness

and funds to help alleviate hunger locally and in undeveloped countries. This year, under the leadership of Phyllis McCranie, Trinity is coordinating Tallahassee's 23rd CROP Walk, and we



will want to have strong participation and support for the walk. In a change from past years, the 2012 CROP Walk will be held at Lake Ella on Sunday, November 11, rather than in the downtown area.

Twenty-five per cent of the monetary contributions raised through the walk are given to local non-profit food distribution agencies. Remaining contributions are for state, national, and international emergencies, as well as for long-term food and clean water development in 80 developing nations. All food donated during the event goes to local food distribution agencies, including ECHO, Catholic Charities, and the lunch program at the Shelter.

There are several ways in which you can be involved:

• Each church or organization recruits members to walk. The walk distances

are only 1 and 3 miles and walkers of all ages are encouraged to be part of the Trinity contingent. It's a great way to get some exercise and enjoy fellowship with other Trinity members.

• Walkers are asked to obtain donations from sponsors before the walk. If you're not able to walk, consider making a donation or sponsoring some of Trinity's walkers. Checks can be made out to CROP Walk or CROP/CWS and given to Trinity's CROP Walk liaison Gloria Colvin or to other Trinity walkers.

• Donations of non-perishable food are needed for use by local area charities.

This year's goals are to recruit at least 300 walkers, to raise \$20,000, and to collect 4,000 pounds of food. Let's support our leadership role this year by providing a large percentage of the walkers and donations!

UMW President Kitty Ball will explain action of this spring's General Conference of UMC that created an independent organization of United Methodist Women no longer under the church's Board of Global Ministries. Local church UMW groups are free to organize their mission teams based on the needs and desires of their members as long as they provide missional support to women, children and youth.

Leaders of four breakout groups at the planning session will give the resulting recommendations for new small groups, for education, Bible study and leadership training, for local mission projects, and for the makeup of the organization's administration. Women attending the luncheon will be asked to give their opinions for future frequency and time of meetings.

Guatemala Mission Needs Your Help

What do you do when you get a headache? If you're like me, you take some Tylenol. What about when your back hurts or you

pull a muscle? I pop some ibuprofen (Advil) or Aleve. When you get a cold, and you are so congested that you can't breathe, don't you just hop in the car and visit your local drugstore for some cold medicine? I do this without giving it much conscious thought. It's almost a knee-jerk reaction, because I know these medications help, and I don't want to be slowed down by these symptoms.

In Guatemala, the indigenous people do not have access to even these basic medications. If they have a headache, they keep working because they have to in order to survive. If their back hurts (and whose wouldn't, carrying 100 lbs. of firewood on it?) they keep going, because they have to in order to survive. They cook over an open fire inside, because that is all they have. Can you just imagine how dry and irritated your eyes, nose, and throat would

be from the smoke exposure? Think about how soothing some artificial tears would be.

All people in Guatemala have "free

health care". That means, if they go to see a doctor, it won't cost them anything. Unfortunately, doctors don't exist except in major cities. The indigenous people would have to leave their homes/ families/children and WALK to the nearest city to see a doctor. While they are away, they aren't working, which means their family isn't eating. Just

think about what it would be like to have to walk from your house into the center of Tallahassee to see a doctor. That would be bad enough if you lived in Killearn. What if you lived in Havana, or Quincy, or Monticello? The problem isn't just cost, it's access.

When we go to Guatemala on our mission trip, we will be seeing approximately 100 people a day in the clinics we set up in each village. These people have the same health issues we have: kids with ear infections and colds, adults

with headaches and back pain. Add to that the dysentery, parasites, malnutrition, and vitamin deficiencies that they all suffer. Not to mention the insomnia, depression,

and anxiety from lying awake at night listening to the rain, and wondering if your hut is going to be washed down the mountain before sunrise. Or from worrying about what you will be able to feed your children tomorrow.

We are so blessed to be able to provide some of the basic medications these people need. We really need your help in order to provide them. We are collecting items to take with us on our mission trip. You can drop them off in the welcome center any time between now and October 1st. This is your opportunity to be a part of this mission. Not everyone can go...but everyone can be a part of the team.

Here's what we need (these are all available over-the-counter, without a prescription, and generics are fine): Aspirin, Tylenol(acetaminophen) for adults and kids, Advil/Motrin(ibuprofen) for adults and kids, Aleve(naproxen sodium), multivitamins for adults and children (chewables are great, but no gummies please, they melt), pre-natal vitamins, cold/sinus medications, artificial tears, anti-fungal creams, hydrocortisone cream, vaginal cream for yeast infections, cough medicine, Neosporin ointment, and anything else you can think of.


