
## Little Red Riding Hood

sight. The wolf ran ahead




A voice from inside asked, "Who is there?"



The wolf answered in a sweet grandmotherly voice, "All the better to see you, my dear."


Then Little Red Riding Hood saw the wolf's big ears. She said, "Oh, Grandmother, what big ears you have!"
