1st Battalion News

CAN DO!! Thanks to all those who participated in the CAN DO RENDEVOUS 2000. It was a great event, and our soldiers truly enjoyed the opportunity to spend time with the veterans of the Regiment. As I write this article we are about eight hours out from deploying our Immediate Ready Company to Fort Bragg North Carolina. Charlie Company is currently our Immediate Ready Company. They will deploy by Airforce C-17 aircraft into a field landing strip on Fort Bragg. We are flying in Bradley Fighting Vehicles and M1 Abrams tanks along with additional support equipment, and approximately 100 personnel. This will be a tremendous operation for our soldiers, and a great opportunity for the 82d Airborne Division to see the capabilities of the CAN DO Soldier.

We recently also conducted squad live fire certification for all our infantry squads, quickly followed by platoon live fire certification for all our infantry platoons. As expected our soldiers executed this training with the normal CAN DO attitude and excelled at all assigned tasks.

Shortly we will place portions of the Battalion on block leave, to begin to set the conditions for an extremely busy upcoming training year for our soldiers. We will execute expert infantry training in October, followed by another gunnery density where we will qualify our Bradley crews. In January we are back out live firing platoons, and conducting company standard training lanes. We are then of to fort Stewart in March and April, followed by a deployment to the Mojave Desert at Fort Irwin California in May.

On the 14th of July at 0900 hours I will relinquish command of this great Battalion to LTC Dennis Smith. I cannot believe how quickly two years have passed.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to every soldier, family member, Veteran of the Regiment and friends of our great Battalion, for their support throughout the last two years. The opportunity to command the 1st Battalion 15th Infantry Regiment with it's rich and proud history has been truly an honor.



Edd is survived by his wife Deanna; son Ralph E Adam; daughters Terri C. McCray, April L. Hamsley, and Cheri A. Atchley; one brother, five sisters and six grandchildren.



My stepfather, Private David C. Collinsworth, Serial No. 38525325, was a rifleman in Company E in January 1945. He was in combat from about January 14, 1945 until he was wounded on January 30. He spoke very little about his experience. The few times he did talk he told about crossing a river under fire. He did not know how to swim and said that he never knew how he got from one side to the other. He only remembers that he did. He also spoke of wading in snow knee to waist deep. He said that on one occasion they came upon some Americans the Germans had taken prisoner, tied to trees, and killed. Does anyone remember him or know of the actions or incidents of which he spoke? I never pressed him to talk of his memories, but wish I had. Now that he is gone I have no more opportunity to learn. Can anyone help me?

Looking for information on my father William H. Baker, he was 36 at the time of his death. He went to Korea from Otis AFB in Hyannis, MA. His mailing address was ARC, Office of Field Director, 15th Infantry Reg't, 3rd Division, APO 468, C/O PM San Francisco, CA. I have a letter from PFC Mitchell V. Bell who I believe was his driver and worked closely with him. He went to the field to see a soldier and went into the trenches. They were both hit by a shell. I don't think the soldier died.
