Editor's Note: some nonviolence practitioners do not view shaming as nonviolence. This is the word used by the Tlingit carver to describe the carving, so I chose to keep that wording. The carving calls attention to the inhumanity of the governor and president's policies, and appears to shame their actions, not them, which is in keeping with Dr. King's maxim to "oppose injustice, not people".

from Northern Alaka Environmental Center: "Stand up for the Brooks Range. Comment on the Ambler road draft EIS. Last Friday, the Bureau of Land Management released the Draft Environmental Impact Statement on the proposed Ambler road, which would cross about 220 miles of the southern Brooks Range, two major watersheds and hundreds of anadromous streams, and the migration routes of three caribou herds. In the Brooks Range Council film about the proposed Ambler road, "The Land We Live In," Doug Bergman of Allakaket says, 'If that road is built, everything will change around here.' And that's not the only one... On Friday, the BLM also released the Willow Master Development Plan (MDP) Draft Environmental Impact Statement. The review period officially begins tomorrow, when BLM is scheduled to publish a notice of availability in the Federal Register. The review period – the opportunity for public comment—is a paltry 45 days, ending on October 15, 2019. ... just west of the Village of Nuiqsut, [this] demonstrates [Conoco-Phillips]'s intended expansion into the Western Arctic and the Teshekpuk Lake Special Area... The public hearing in Fairbanks is on Monday, September 9, 2019, 6-8pm, at the Westmark Hotel. A full list of hearing dates and locations can be found here.
