






GREAT AMERICANS

RIDING TO WASHINGTON

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


Discuss the following questions with the class before reading the book *Riding to Washington*.

- 5. What would you do if restaurants didn't allow children to eat in them?
- 6. What do you think the term "civil rights" means?
- 7. What did Abraham Lincoln do that caused a lot of controversy?
- 8. Where is Washington, D.C.? Why is it special?
- 9. Should girls be allowed to play on all boys' sports teams?
- 10. Discuss the importance of Washington, D.C. to the story.
