YOUTH LEADERSHIP CAMP



Just last month I took this picture at the concluding event of the Rotary Youth Leadership Camp that the Greensboro Rotary Club operates for the district. During the week, students were divided into teams, and now it was time for each team to summarize for their parents what they learned at the camp. It was obvious that the impact that your camp had on the

It came from the feeling of camaraderie and electricity that filled the room, and from several of the parents, who sought me out after the event. "I want to share with you what my son told me a few minutes ago." one parent

said. "He told me that this was the most awesome thing he has ever done in his whole life!" "Thank you for giving my daughter this opportunity." said another parent. "This is the first time she has spent a week away from home. She is a different person now."

One of the most satisfying experiences I have had was working with young adults. From my experience as a member of the faculty of a small liberal arts college, I realize that one of the most wonderful experiences is watching our children mature into thoughtful adults who are as enthusiastic about taking their place in society, as we were when we were their age.

Rotary offers us all sorts of opportunities to have that experience. Those Rotary clubs whose members are actively

engaged with their Interact clubs or their Rotaract clubs have discovered the miracle of youth's enthusiasm.

If you want a testimonial of how import our involvement with youth can be, talk with Randy Carda (Furnitureland), or almost any Reynolda Rotarian who has received a hug from a Cook Elementary School student. You might want to ask about Furnitureland Rotary Club's Shirlee Carda Memorial Scholarship for Fairview Elementary School students who will be attending middle school in the fall. These "scholarships" consist of a backpack filled with school supplies and a supervised trip to the department store for school clothes for the fall. Or ask any Reynolda Rotarian, who provides tutoring and support services for Cook Elementary School children. There are dozens more projects like these. I'm glad you care enough to help our youth develop into solid members of our society, and yes, into future Rotarians.

Rob Nunnaley (Carthage) will tell you that involvement with youth is important. He is listening to Meghan Osborne, Secretary of the Rota-Runners group: "So far, being in the Rota-Runner Club has really made a difference in my life. It has shown me many things like friendship, kindness, leadership, and other lessons that I will need to know all throughout my life. I had no idea how many friends I could make by just having one thing in common!"

The young adults who belong to our Rotaract clubs are wild with enthusiasm, and their hearts and actions describe a world that we all would like to live in, if we could only keep up with them. I have rarely been in as warm and inviting a home as that of Rotaractor Jonathan Lucas and Olga Kahajou. When they heard that a member of the GSE team from the Philippines that was visiting our district was a Rotaractor, they called on all their Rotaractor associates to provide a covered dish dinner to welcome their new friend. The "Fifth Avenue" of Service......YOUTH

A year ago last May Donna and I were privileged to attend the RI convention in Australia. There we saw significant Rotary activity directed toward the youth of that country, and the adoption by some clubs of Youth as the Fifth Avenue of Service.

RIGHT NOW is the time to be getting youth activities going in your club. All our youth are returning to school, and so should the youth coordinator in your club. Why? Because that's where the INTERACT clubs of the Rotary world are. Many clubs already sponsor an INTERACT club, but of course in many respects you need to start again with the new school year. Other clubs have yet to embrace this opportunity, but the opportunity is there, and a call to your high school principal now is what it will take to get the ball rolling. Perhaps that principal is a member of your club. If not, there is another opportunity!! Go to www.Rotary.org for all the information you need to know about INTERACT. The Download Center has some particularly useful stuff, including the manual for organizing and operating a club.

Need a club program? Invite the young person you sponsored at last July's Youth Leadership Program to your club to tell you about his or her experiences.

NOW is also the time to tell rising juniors and seniors about Rotary YOUTH EXCHANGE. Applications for Youth Exchange for the summer of 2006 or the academic year beginning next fall need to be submitted between now and the end of December. This is an especially attractive opportunity for rising seniors, who can apply for Youth Exchange, and then defer college enrollment until the fall of 2007 in order to make room for a year long exchange after high school graduation but before starting college. What a great way to make the transition, take electives, learn a new language and culture, and prepare for higher education and beyond. Again, lots of information at www.Rotary.org. Don't miss this opportunity for service; bringing the Youth Exchange program to the attention of the youth in your community.

Later in the fall and early next year, additional opportunities will arise. Participation in the Drug Abuse Prevention speech contest comes to mind, as does the opportunity to apply for participation in the Rotary Youth Leadership program next summer, or the World Affairs Seminar next June at the University of Wisconsin. Look for more information on these opportunities in later issues of The Piedmont Rotarian. District Simplified Grant Moratorium

At the recent Foundation Seminars PDG Stuart Fountain, District Chairman of the Rotary Foundation, announced a moratorium on new District Simplified Grant applications for several months. This is due to the difficulty in getting final reports on existing DSG projects from clubs in the District and the need for an Independent Financial Review of the entire grant to the District which is a standard reporting requirement of the Rotary Foundation for District Simplified Grants. Until all existing projects are completed and included in the Independent Financial Review, the Rotary Foundation will not forward our District Simplified Grant allocation to the District for this year. Therefore the District does not have the funds to award to new projects until these requirements are met.

The Grants Commmittee will take advantage of the lull in activity to restructure the application schedule and method for awarding future District Simplified Grants to more closely coincide with the reporting requirements of the Rotary Foundation.

In the meantime the Grants Committee encourages all clubs to apply for Matching Grants which have not been affected by the moratorium on District Simplified Grants.

Congratulations to Two More 100% PHF Clubs

The Rotary Club of High Point became a 100% PHF Club on July 1 and is #635 in the world. The Rotary Club of Alamance was certified on August 11 and is #644 in the world. Rotary District 7690 now has 27 100% PHF clubs. The district is second in the world in number of 100% PHF clubs. District 3750 in Korea leads the world.
