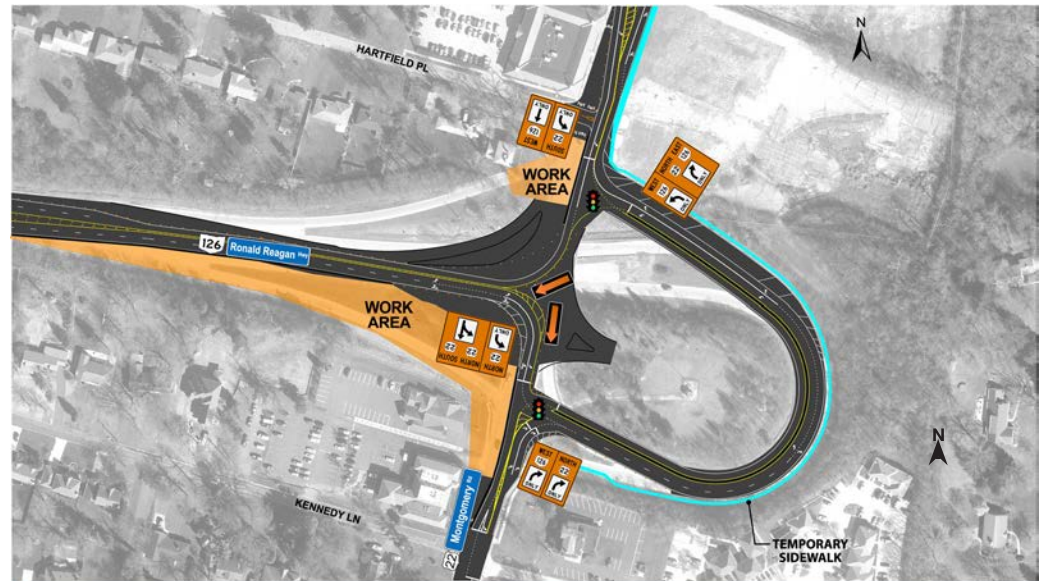




ROUNDBOUT CONSTRUCTION PHASE 3 TO BEGIN THIS SPRING

John R. Jurgensen will begin “Phase 3” construction of the roundabout project at the intersection of Montgomery Road and Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway starting in March or April. This third phase is anticipated to last one month. Phase 3 traffic modifications will consist of:

- Northbound and southbound Montgomery Road traffic will continue to be carried on the existing by-pass just as it does today.
- The existing temporary traffic signals will remain in operation for Montgomery Road and Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway. The northerly signal will continue to be for traffic accessing westbound cross county highway, and the southerly signal will continue to be for traffic exiting the highway. The difference between Phase 2 and Phase 3 is the Ronald Reagan Cross County Highway entrance and exit ramps will be shifted towards the center of the construction area (see image).
- The sidewalk on the east side of the by-pass for pedestrians will be maintained.
- Modifications will be made to the number of lanes and lane configuration on Montgomery Road. New traffic signage and pavement striping on Montgomery Road will be installed to achieve this new traffic pattern. Please stay alert when driving through this location so you can get into the proper lane based on your destination.



The Phase 3 traffic pattern will allow the contractor to perform construction activities in the work areas, as shown.

LOOKING AHEAD IN 2021

Recent Stepping-Stones:

The Montgomery Fire Department was fortunate to be a recipient of the first round of the Moderna vaccine. The vaccine was given voluntarily to 30 of our first responders. They will receive their second dose 30 days after the first dose and should have about a 95% protection rate. The vaccine required a fair amount of work as the vials were temperature sensitive and stored in a dedicated and secured refrigerator. The temperature had to be kept between 36 and 46 degrees F, monitored, and recorded twice a day. Chief Wright had to test to become certified in vaccine storage. Once the vial was removed from the refrigerator and punctured to draw the first dose, it was

good for only 6 hours. Each vial held 10 doses, so 10 employees were scheduled at a time to receive the vaccine as not to waste any. Assistant Chief Shapiro administered the vaccines at 7:00 a.m. as the employees were getting off work to allow time to recover should they have any side effects. Not only did our first responders receive the vaccine, but residents living in our various retirement communities were offered the vaccine last month as well.

These new services offer individual taxpayers a convenient and secure way to file and pay taxes online using Authority TaxConnect. TaxConnect allows users to create a secure login, review tax balances for each year, file returns, and remit payments. A 3.75% fee will be charged for credit card payments. WEEKLY YARD WASTE COLLECTION RESUMES MARCH 1

Beginning March 1, weekly yard waste collection will resume at no charge for all one and two-family residential homes.

The program limits collection to three bags, cans, or bundles at each residence (or one 90-gallon yard waste toter). Additional bags, cans or bundles require one \$3.00 Rumpke yard waste sticker per item. Additional 90-gallon toter's will require three stickers each after the first toter. Stickers are available at Montgomery Kroger or Montgomery City Hall during regular business hours.

Loosely place yard waste in trash cans or in paper yard waste bags which are commonly available at grocery or hardware stores. Do not place bags in the curb lane on the street. If the material is being placed in a garbage can or toter, please label it as "yard waste" so it is not inadvertently collected as trash. Do not dispose of plants in plastic planter tubs, separate plants for yard waste and plastic for recycling.

Place yard waste on the opposite side of the driveway from regular trash. Leave the lids off cans containing yard waste. Freezing conditions seal the lids which does not allow for easy removal of yard waste. No plastic bags will be accepted.

Brush should be bundled in sizes up to 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter. The material should be fastened with cotton twine (No wire or plastic ties, please).

Limbs need to be cut into 4 foot lengths and no larger than 6 inches in diameter.

CITY TO CONDUCT LIMITED SPRING CURBSIDE BRUSH PICK-UP

The Montgomery Public Works Department will provide a spring curbside bulk brush collection of brush and limbs and is scheduled to begin on April 5. This collection period will be conducted over a five-week period. Each pick-up week is determined by the regular trash collection schedule. **Please have brush out at the curb by Sunday evening of your collection week.**

Trash Day	Brush Pick-Up Week
Monday	Week of April 5
Tuesday	Week of April 12
Wednesday	Week of April 19
Thursday	Week of April 26
Friday	Week of May 3

GUIDELINES

- Piles must be placed curbside prior to the start of each week's collection. Residents are urged to place brush curbside on the Sunday immediately prior to the scheduled collection week as material placed curbside after the chipper crew has passed will not be picked up.
- Brush containing nails, metal, stones or excessive dirt will not be picked up.
- Vines and branches with thorns will not be picked up.
- Limbs may be of any length and between 1/2 inch and 8 inches in diameter. Shorter branches, twigs and clippings should be placed in yard waste bags and/or cans to be picked up by Rumpke on your regular waste collection day.
- Brush and limbs must be placed at the edge of the road or along the curb with the "cut" ends of brush toward the street in small piles. Please do not create large stacks or interwoven piles with "cut" ends placed in different directions as this makes the material difficult for crews to separate for collection.
- Brush piles that are tied into bundles or are tangled will not be picked up.
- Stumps, root balls and logs are not to be placed curbside for brush collection, but may be placed out for Rumpke waste collection on the regularly scheduled day. Each item must not weigh more than 60 pounds.

Park shelter reservations are only available to Montgomery residents, businesses, and employees of Montgomery businesses. Nonresidents may use the shelters on a first-come, first-serve basis as long as there is no reservation. A reservation list is posted at each park shelter.

YARD WASTE DISPOSAL TIPS

RECOMMENDED BY ENVIRONMENTAL ADVISORY COMMISSION

- **Weekly Curbside Collection** - Each week, from March to October, Rumpke will pick up three paper leaf bags or one 90-gallon rolling tote, clearly marked "Yard Waste," or three bundles of yard waste for free if placed at the curb alongside your weekly trash. **No plastic bags are allowed.** More than three bags require a \$3 sticker placed on each extra item. The stickers can be purchased at City Hall or the Montgomery Kroger.

Beginning November 1 every year, Rumpke conducts an unlimited yard waste pick-up. The unlimited collection is contracted for 5-weeks; however, City Council annually reviews the program's extension for an additional 3 weeks. If approved, eight weeks of unlimited yard waste collection is provided to residents with no stickers required.

- **Special Bulk Brush Collection** is performed by the Public Works Department. This free chipping service is conducted in April and September each year. Please visit montgomeryohio.org to determine your week of pick-up and to get more detailed instructions. Yard waste is sent to a separate "green area," not the landfill.
- **Composting** - Adding leaves to a backyard composter can be the perfect solution to balance the Carbon / Nitrogen ratio. In Spring, when the compost gets warm, dried leaves are scarce. Consider saving bags of fall leaves in the garage or basement. The Greater Cincinnati Leaf Exchange (found on Facebook) is a way to contact people who have leaves to share or who are looking for leaves. Using fall leaves in compost helps create the perfect soil for your garden, flower beds, or treed areas.
- **Mulching** - Leaves won't hurt your lawn if chopped with a mulching mower. Leaves form a natural mulch that helps suppress weeds and fertilizes the soil as it breaks down. It's important to keep the sewer drainage areas clear of debris.

Thank you for keeping yard waste out of the landfill!

The Environmental Advisory Commission will hold a free **Spring Shredding Event on Saturday, April 17** at the monthly cardboard recycling event. This event is held from 10:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Public Works Facility located at 7315 Cornell Road (across of Sycamore High School).

*Please remove paper from notebooks and binders. Paper clips and staples DO NOT have to be removed. No binder clips please. CDs or DVDs cannot be shredded.

To serve everybody efficiently, there will be a maximum of 3 boxes (copy paper size or similar) per person in line, and you must be present. Volunteers will be available to assist.

Materials will be shredded onsite.



UNDERSTANDING YOUR DRAINAGE SYSTEM MAY HELP PREVENT FLOODING

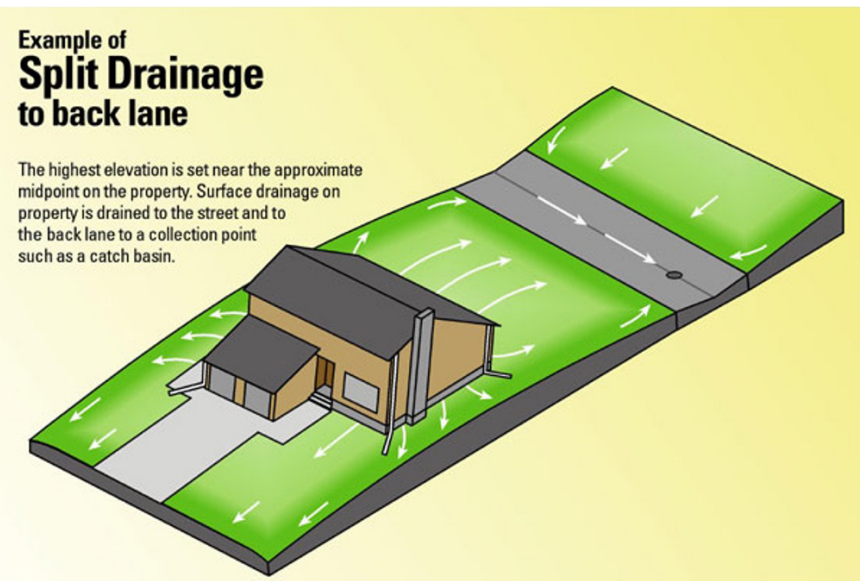
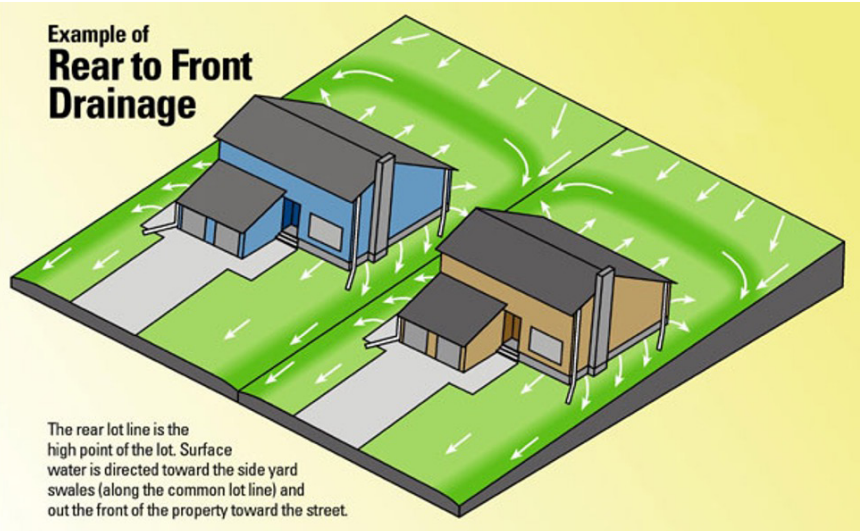
Stormwater management plays an important role in reducing the chance of flooding inside your home. Homeowners should be aware of the drainage system on their property to ensure that it is properly functioning. Most residential lots utilize a swale system to move water away from and around the home. Below are some key factors to understanding your drainage system.

Drainage swales:

- Are shallow-sided, sloped ditches designed to carry surface run-off from a property, towards the nearest street, catch basin or storm water retention basin.
- Are typically located along common property lines and sometimes at the back of a lot.
- Should be graded and maintained in accordance with the approved lot grading plan.
- Swales must be unobstructed and free draining. Residents are encouraged not to place sheds, landscaping or any other object in a drainage swale.
- Do not plant trees in a swale, as over time, a large tree can impact drainage.
- Keep fences at least six inches above the bottom of a swale to allow water and small debris to pass under it.

There are generally two types of lot drainage:

1. Rear-to-front drainage
 - a. The rear lot line is the high point on the lot.
 - b. Surface water on the property is drained to side yard swales along the common lot line and out the front of the property toward the street.
2. Split drainage to a rear yard swale
 - a. The highest elevation is set near the midpoint on the property.
 - b. Surface drainage then flows to the street and to the rear lot line onto a rear yard swale.



IT'S TORNADO SEASON: DO YOU KNOW WHAT TO DO?



Tornadoes are one of nature's most violent storms and can cause death, injury, and destruction within seconds. As a WeTHRIVE community, the City is committed to ensuring residents are informed on what to look for and how to prepare for a tornado.

Montgomery will never forget April 9, 1999. On that date, an F-3 to F-4 tornado touched down in the Lakewater area of Montgomery in the pre-dawn hours, around 5:17 a.m. Four lives were lost, and many homes and businesses were destroyed or damaged.

The City of Montgomery captured the recollections of City employees, residents, and former WCPO meteorologist Pete Delkus to commemorate the 20th anniversary of this devastating event. WATCH/WARNING/ADVISORY: WHAT DO THEY MEAN?

No matter what the actual weather is, here is the basic rule of thumb:

- **WATCH** essentially means a chance this condition will happen and usually covers a large geographical area for a lengthy period.
- **WARNING** means the said weather is already occurring or is likely to occur and take proper protective measures. Warnings are usually issued for much smaller geographical areas and usually for shorter, more definite periods.
- **ADVISORY** is sort of in between a WATCH and WARNING. The expected weather condition has a pretty good chance of occurring, even a likely chance of happening, but typically an advisory is used for less severe types of weather conditions.

ADDICTION

ADDICTION, WE CAN HELP

As police officers, one of the biggest family issues we see is addiction. It may manifest itself in domestic fights, criminal activity such as thefts, or overall poor decisions followed by medical needs. Addiction has touched many lives and has the potential to devastate families and loved ones. Whether a spouse, parent, or child, addiction will present a long line of challenges for all involved. Addiction does not discriminate by income, race, sex, or age. Some believe addiction is a choice, while others believe it is a disease. Either way, the addict and their loved ones will need to take steps to cope and work toward recovery.

Deception, stealing, hiding, and manipulation are all telling traits of someone suffering from addiction. Whether it's heroin, cocaine, methamphetamine, alcohol, or any others, their drug of choice will burden the addict's life, and they will do whatever is necessary to get their drug of choice. Parents and spouses who are not used to checking up on their loved ones are often the last to find out there is a problem.

While there has been a longtime stigma attached to drug addicts or alcoholics, attitudes are changing, and treatment is improving. The "over" prescribing of pain medications/opiates generated an entirely new population of addicts. People that had a genetic addictive predisposition, when given an extended supply of pain medications, found out that when they stopped taking their prescription, they suffered withdrawal symptoms. Since then, drastic restrictions have been placed on many medicines to try to stop the drug epidemic. However, addiction is still a significant problem in our society for both the suffering addict and their loved ones.

There are several organizations that have been established to help. Hamilton County now has a Heroin task force that was created to initiate an immediate and focused investigation, target the dealer of the heroin, which led to an overdose or death, and ultimately prosecute the source dealer on applicable State and Federal charges. All Montgomery Officers now carry "Narcan" with them, which can rapidly reverse the effects of an overdose in the field.

Support groups such as Alcoholics Anonymous or Narcotics Anonymous offer a judgment-free zone where those struggling with addiction can speak freely with others that are going through the same thing. Al-anon (for alcohol) and Nar-anon (for narcotics) are similar programs for loved ones of addicts.

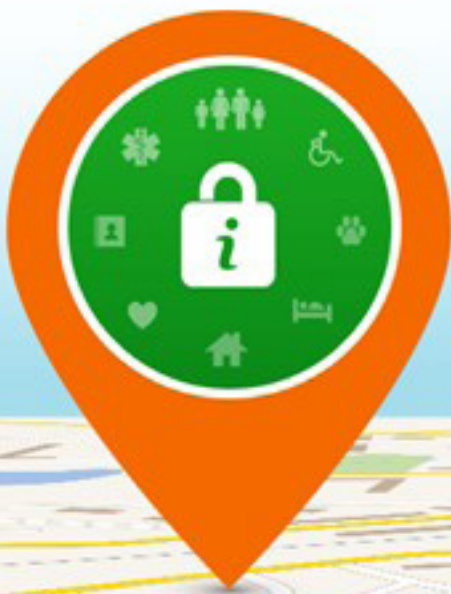

Provide 9-1-1 Key Info in an Emergency

Download the Smart911® App Today.



SMART911

The City of Montgomery, in coordination with Hamilton County Emergency Management Agency, is offering to their residents a system to advise paramedics of their medical history, allergies, medications, doctor's contact information, etc., through a program called Smart911. This web-based profile program is available at no cost to all residents of Hamilton County.

What is Smart911?

- Smart911 allows you to provide important information to 9-1-1 dispatchers and first responders before an emergency happens.
- You can create a Safety Profile that includes information such as family member information, emergency contact information, medical information, pet information, as well as pictures and access codes into your residence.
- Information provided is completely private & secure.
- Smart911 is a nation-wide system, so if you are traveling in an area that subscribes to Smart911, your Safety Profile will be available to the 9-1-1 dispatcher in that area.
- Smart911 is paired with Alert Hamilton County, which is an additional service that will advise you through your phone of any local or regional emergency notification to which you would like to be alerted.



How do I sign up for Smart911?

- In your computer web browser, type in www.AlertHC.org and follow the directions.
- OR – you can download the Smart911 app in the App Store or Google Play.
- You can sign up for Alert HC at the same time to receive notifications for weather emergencies in your area.
- You pick what information you want to share and how you would like to be contacted.
- There is no charge for this service as it is free to all Hamilton County residents.

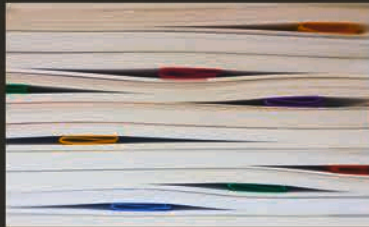

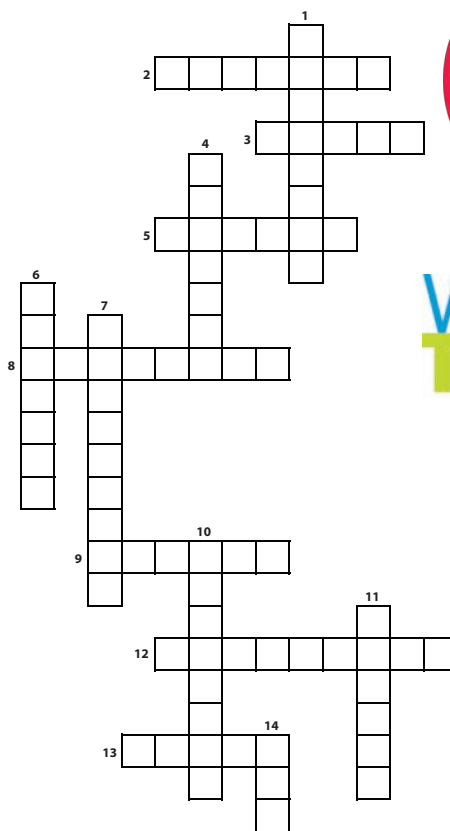
