


ROYAL MILITARY POLICE OLD COMRADES LINK UP NEWSLETTER #135 SEPTEMBER 2018



NEW CONTACTS



Only one contact this month but I found it interesting. It began with a brief e-mail followed by a long telephone conversation and further e-mails. The person I am talking about is one Bruce Dalton who was commissioned into the Corps on the 26th October 1957. Prior to this date Bruce had a previous life in the Royal Marines and completed training at Lympstone on 21st March 1957. He then went to Eaton Hall, Officer Cadet School but as a result of the Royal Marines being over strength with



officers he elected to serve in the Corps reporting to Inkerman Barracks on the 26th October 1957. As no course was readily available Bruce managed to squeeze in parachute training, completing his eight jumps on the 17th December 1957 and a motor cycle course at Inkerman. His exciting life ended when he had to get down to some serious study on Provost Officers Course No.102. (See photograph later in the newsletter)

In March 1958 he was attached to 16 Independent Parachute Brigade Provost Company, Aldershot. A month later his posting to Cyprus was cancelled and he was sent on a Dog Training Course, Royal Army Veterinary Corps, Melton Mowbray. Having successfully avoided being savaged by some canine beast he was sent to No 1 War Dog [Training] Unit, Sennelager, Germany in May 1958 and by June he was Acting Captain, 2IC and Training Officer, No 1 War Dog Unit. In December of the same year he

reverted to 2nd Lieutenant prior to his discharge having competed a somewhat eventful two years in the Corps without actually serving a Provost Company for any length of time. He was transferred to RMP Army Emergency National Service List, in January 1959. He later discovered, when he applied for his records, that he had been promoted to Lieutenant, posted to 245 GHQ Provost Company posted to Pool and transferred to the Regular Army Reserve of Officers (RARO) in June 1962. Since 2007 he has been a member of the London Branch of the RMP Association.

I was posted the first time in Jan 69 till late 71 when it was Coy HQ with an OC, 2IC, CSM and a full



DEATHS

CHATHAM

Lieutenant-Colonel Gerald Ian ("Ian") Chatham passed away peacefully in hospital on the 24th August, shortly after his 94th birthday. His health had been failing for a few years and his mobility was poor, but he always spoke fondly of his time with the RMP. Educated at Pocklington and having seen over two-year's service in the ranks during the Second World War, Ian gained an Emergency Commission in August 1945 and was gazetted to the Royal Welch Fusiliers (RWF). He transferred to the Royal Military Police in 1961. Initially he commanded 158 Provost Company and then served variously as a Deputy-Assistant-Provost Marshal with Headquarters Far East Land Forces; as Chief Instructor at the Royal Military Police Training Centre, Chichester and on the staff of the Provost Marshal (Army); and he was the last Assistant-Provost Marshal appointed to Northern Command, then headquartered in York. He completed his service as Assistant-Provost Marshal (Rhine Area) in Düsseldorf, retiring from the Active List in 1976. He is survived by three daughters and no fewer than 8 grandchildren and 8 great-grandchildren. His wife Joyce predeceased him in 2016.

GILES-TOWNSEND

Former 22492183 Lance-Corporal John Giles-Townsend died peacefully aged 85, on the 25th August,



at Bridport Hospital in Dorset, after a period of illness. John enlisted in 1951, originally badged to REME in Dorchester, after which he transferred to RMP. Following training at Inkerman Barracks, Woking in Squad 235, he served with Middle-east Land Forces in 203 Provost Company in Port Said and Telel-Kebir Garrison in Egypt and then Headquarters Tripoli District Provost Company in Tripolitania (modern-day Libya). Following the completion of his National Service in 1953, John returned to his native Bridport where he served as an elected Councillor on a number of local bodies. John was a loyal member of both Taunton and Dorset Branches. His funeral service was held on the 11th September at Bridport Crematorium. Dennis leaves a widow, Jeanne.

HAND

Former 19141716 Lance Corporal William Frederick Hand passed away on the 29th August 2018. As far as it can be ascertained he served with 241 GHQ Provost Company in 1940 and later went to Berlin in 1945. 241 GHQ Provost Company became 248 Provost Company. *Ed: I have received further information on William Hand and will feature it in the next edition.*

HART

Captain Robin ("Bob") E J Hart passed away on the 21st September 2018, after a long illness. Bob saw service with the RMP, particularly in the SIB, and then went on to serve with distinction with the Police Advisory Branch of the Joint-Services Liaison Organisation based in Germany, completing an aggregate of 46 years of service to the Crown. Bob enlisted in June 1958, and trained with 691 Squad at Inkerman Barracks, before going on to serve with 2 Divisional Provost Company in Lübbecke and then overseas in Aden. On his subsequent successful transfer to the SIB, Bob served in Malta, Benghazi, Rheindahlen, Osnabruck, Northern Ireland, with the United Nations in Cyprus, at HQ SIB in London and in Dortmund/Werl. Gaining a Commission in 1976, Bob went on to serve with the SIB in Osnabruck, Münster and Bielefeld before a further posting to Northern Ireland in 1980. In April 1982, Bob retired from the Active List in order to take up a position as a Police Advisor based in Düsseldorf. In 1993, Bob was promoted to the position of Chief Police Advisor and in 1998, with the drawdown of BAOR, moved the Advisory Branch to Rheindahlen.

HOLLAND

In-Pensioner Number 396 Dennis Holland died on the 27th August, aged 91. Dennis was born in 1927 and served in the Corps of Military Police (CMP) during the Second World War and afterwards in the Royal Military Police (RMP) until 1952. Dennis became an In-Pensioner in the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, in 2003. Dennis initially saw service in the General Service Corps* and subsequently in the Corps of Royal Engineers before transferring to the CMP.

HOLLINGSBEE

Major Terence Paul ("Terry") Hollingsbee passed on the 17th September 2018 at the age of 76 years. Terry enlisted in the Corps of Royal Military Police in 1961, and having reached the rank of Warrant Officer Class 1 and being appointed Regimental Sergeant-Major at 115 Provost Company in Osnabrück, gained a Commission in the Corps in 1982. Most notably, Terry commanded 246 Provost Company, 2 Regiment, at Helmstedt from late 1988 and thereafter during the tumultuous time of the collapse of the Berlin Wall and the fall of the Inner-German Border (IBG) when Berlin and 'Allied Checkpoint Alpha' at Helmstedt-Marienborn were both the focus of the world's attention in the autumn and winter of 1989. ROWE

Former 22233567 Warrant Officer Class 2 Richard 'Dick' Rowe passed away on the 11th September 2018. Dick, or "Pop" as he was sometime known, served in Trieste, Singapore, BAOR, Barnard Castle, Ipswich and finally with 243 Provost Company RMP(V) in Edinburgh. His funeral was held in Patna, Ayrshire on the 20th September and former members of 6 Infantry Brigade Provost Unit carried the coffin to the grave.
