From The Left Hand

In baseball parlance you might say Des Plaines, Niles and Morton Grove were shut-out in Saturday's Junior College election, Skokie candidates won 4 of the seats, Park Ridge 2 and Lincolnwood 1.

The two top vote-getters, Meyer Kamin and Griff MacDonald were the only 2 candidates to be endorsed by both the 535 group and the Maine-Niles committee, 2 separate caucus-like groups, which screened and endorsed candidates.

The Maine-Niles committee was interested in selecting candidates who were from all segments of the communities while the 535 group preferred to choose those who they believed to be the best qualified, without regard as to their home address.

Interestingly, of the 5 newspapers serving the communities 3 of them which are partisan Republican papers, endorsed candidates. Only The Life and The Bugle refrained from supporting candidates. As we had mentioned last week, our unfamiliarity with ALL the candidates made us an unworthy choice to pass judgment on the election.

While the "blind-voting" which took place Saturday questions the caucus-like endorsement system, we still believe it is a better means of electing better candidates, than for voters to blindly choose 7 names which they're unfamiliar with.

The next important election will take place in September when residents will vote for delegates to the Constitution Convention, electees who will rewrite and revise our present State constitution, Saturday, the Democrats screened a very limited group of people but did not endorse anyone.

While the politicians can't be faulted for their efforts, nevertheless it is sad independent people who desire to serve can't possibly win without being endorsed by one of the two parties. While the 2 parties here in the suburbs are certainly much more enlightened than the hokey one-party machine in Chicago, and the caliber of candidates here are likely to prove representative, in Chicago, as well as downstate, a great many political hacks will become Con Con delegates.

It would seem a worthy project if residents would form a non-partisan caucus group, comprised of organizations throughout the senatorial district, which would screen all candidates and similarly endorse, as was done in Saturday's election. Such support might result in the precinct captains staying out of the

Theatre Lights Dimmed

Last Sunday was rather a sad day for the theatre, in more ways than one.

We heard of the death of Judy Garland and many of us felt a kind of personal loss — as though we had been told of the death of a close friend, someone we had grown up with and knew. First reaction of many was the "bluebird of happiness" had indeed eluded her throughout her lifetime — perhaps now she would find peace. Our reaction hit a little closer to home — one of our generation had died, someone wonderfully magic whom our children would never be able to enjoy as we had. That, too, is a loss.

We were sad, too, because Mill Run Theatre closed its doors Sunday night, following the final performance of "The King and I." We don't really know what caused that demise — apathy, lack of super-stars, lack of ticket money. Take your choice.

The letter sent out by Producer Carl Stohn, Jr. provides some insight: "We have tried several formats. We are particularly proud of the quality of the recent musicals which we have presented. However, ticket sales have been disappointing. Despite advertising, promotions, discounts, our grosses remain too low to continue operation. It seems it takes a Zsa Zsa Gabor to stir the local residents out of their apathy. Unfortunately, there are too few super-stars available. Refunds will be made at the box-office through Saturday, June 28 from 2 to 6 p.m. Refunds may also be obtained by mail. Self-addressed, stamped envelopes should be enclosed with tickets."

While Niles, Morton Grove and the Golf-Mill-East Maine area will not lack for theatre — Candlelight Theatre will soon be built on Milwaukee near Oakton — it is a bit sad that residents did not support Stohn's efforts to bring a bit of Broadway and Hollywood into their lives. It was a good effort and I, for one, hope he will try again.

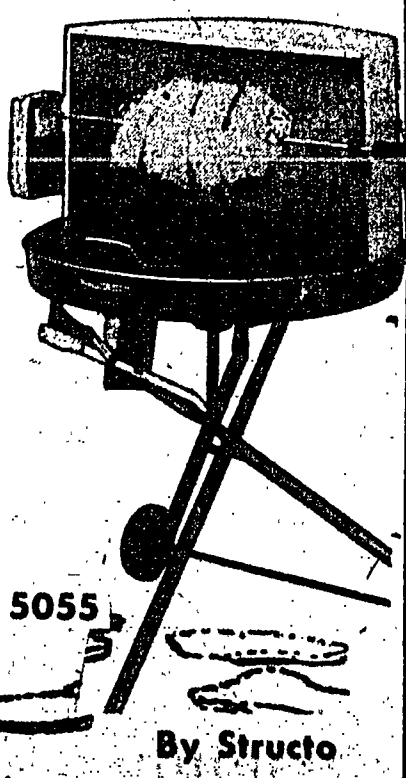

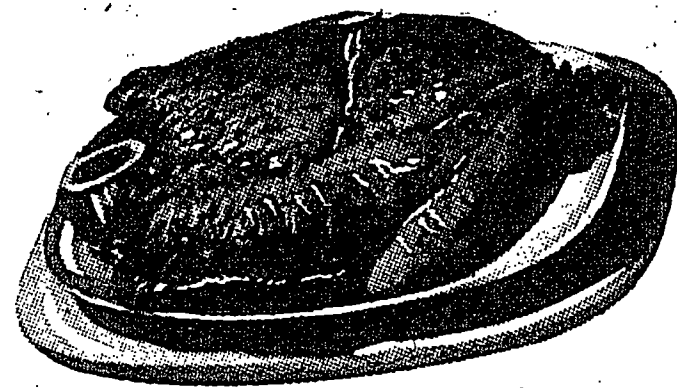

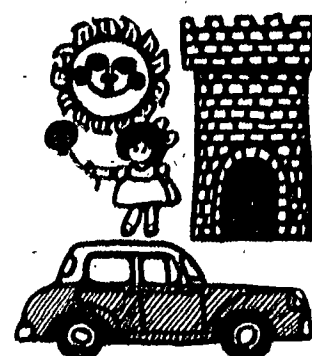

For Treatment Of Blight

Tony Fragassi, Supt. of Public Works in Morton Grove offers the following suggestions for the treatment of trees suffering from certain types of blight:

INCHWORMS

The past scourge of the North Shore of Chicago, this worm, also called a spring cankerworm, measuring worm, or spanworm, may feed on most of the foliage of various trees and can often cause serious defoliation in the next few weeks. There are some 1,200 known different species in the U. S. and Canada.

They acquire their name by the way they inch along when moving. Movement is accomplished by placing the posterior end of the body up near the anterior end, thus moving along in a looping fashion. Many inchworms when disturbed stand nearly erect on their posterior and prolegs and remain motionless, resembling small twigs.

The adult moths are usually small, delicate and slender bodied. The wings are usually broad and often marked with five wavy lines. The two sexes are often different in color and in a few species the females are wingless. This group of moths is chiefly nocturnal and are attracted to lights.

CONTROL: Can be accomplished by spraying your trees and shrubs with carbaryl (sevin) when the worms are first seen or feeding. Follow label directions for correct amounts of insecticide to use. This chemical can be purchased at most garden centers, hardware stores, farm supply or similar type stores. If needed, contact a professional pest control operator (exterminator).

SYCAMORE ANTHRACNOSE

In most years, sycamore trees in Illinois are attacked by a leaf and twig disease called anthracnose. In some years the amount of injury produced is not conspicuous, but in other years the injury is so great and widespread that trees throughout the state are almost defoliated.

This leaf and twig disease, caused by the fungus Gnomonia veneta, is also known as twig blight. It affects both sycamore and oak. On sycamore, anthracnose may produce two types of leaf injury. One type, called early leaf blight, develops as complete killing of very young leaves during April or May. This type of injury may result in partial to complete defoliation and is occasionally confused with frost injury. The second type of leaf injury develops as small to large, irregular brown areas adjacent to and centering around diseased spots on the midribs and lateral veins of mature leaves. This type of leaf injury rarely causes defoliation. Dark brown fruiting bodies or pustules of the fungus appear on the diseased tissues, especially on the midribs and veins. These raised pustules can be seen with a hand lens and sometimes with naked eye. The fungus may spread from diseased leaves through twigs into young branches and produce cankers, or cause twig and branch dieback. Most leaf injury and defoliation occurs in wet seasons.

Affected trees should be given plant food. Two applications of an organic mercury spray will control this disease. First spray should be applied when buds are swelling and before leaves unfold.

Junior College Vote

Constitutionality of last Saturday's election to name 7 trustees of Junior College District 535 may be challenged in the near future, according to Genter Dahl, chairman of the Maine-Niles Junior College Citizens Committee, which saw only one of its seven endorsed candidates elected.

Dahl says his group will meet in the near future to explore the possibility of disannexation of the Maine area from the junior college district as well as the possibility of court action on the constitutionality of the election—claiming the one-man, one-vote rule was not followed in the election of one man from Lincolnwood, four from Skokie and two from Park Ridge, Niles, Morton Grove, Des Plaines and the unincorporated East Maine area have none of their residents on the board of trustees.

The question of the 7th elected trustee arose when the vote tally of Pct. 13 (Oakview school, Skokie) showed Hartstein had only received 25 votes. Poll watchers claimed that figure should be 255 votes. The 230-vote margin made the difference between Hartstein or William Sterling, Niles, being named the 7th elected trustee.

Falkoff was the only person elected not endorsed by the Dist. 535 Community College Committee. He had received the endorsement of the Maine-Niles Junior College Citizens Committee, a group chaired by Des Plainesite Genter Dahl. The #535 group was co-chaired by Bert Gelder, Niles Twp, and Dick Cronin, Maine Twp. Both groups had given their endorsements to MacDonald and Kamin.

Kamin, a former Roosevelt university trustee and former president of the Niles Township High school board, was the top vote-getter. He polled 2,193 votes. Second was MacDonald —1,816; third, Falkoff —1,311; fourth, Sopkin —1,256; fifth, Wauck —1,242; sixth, Gilson —1,192 and seventh, Hartstein —1,181.

The trustees will be sworn in within the next few days and will immediately draw lots to

determine who serves a 3-year term, 2-year term and one-year term. That will mean almost every year will see an election for at least one of the trustee seats. They will also elect a chairman, secretary and treasurer. First big task for the trustees will be the selection of a junior college president and the selection of a site for the campus—generally envisioned to be somewhere in northwest Maine Township due to availability of sufficient space.

While no definite timetable has been established as to when classes or construction will begin, it has been estimated that classes could start within a few years (rent rooms in schools) and construction within 4 to 5 years with a full completion of all construction taking about 8 to 10 years.

According to Cronin, the results of last Saturday's election "certainly showed people didn't feel area representation was as important as the other group (Dahl's) thought it was. I believe the most qualified people available were elected for the first board," Cronin told The Bugle "and they will represent all the people in the junior college district."

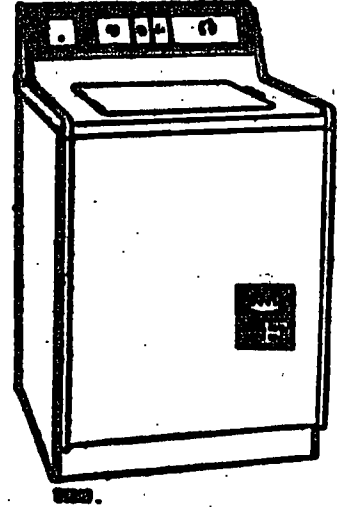

only the possibility a storm sewer will be put on Greenwood, going up to Dempster, to relieve the storm flooding.

Village Manager Ken Scheel and Village Engineer George Anderson as well as Mayor Nicholas Blase, while sympathizing with DiNapoli (Blase resides in that area) could not offer any immediate cure. "We've spent more than \$15,000 over the past few years," said Blase, "in an effort to help solve the problem piecemeal. The problem still is not solved."

Scheel informed the board work is progressing to clean out sections of the area, remove construction debris, etc. and it is hoped an additional sewer system can be put into operation in the near future. But it looks like nothing will drastically change the problem now.

In other business Tuesday night the Niles Village board named Richard Troy to replace James Snider as Village Attorney (both are from the same law office) and heard a request for board approval of plans to build a convalescent and nursing home at 6633 N. Milwaukee, on property now holding the Sill-can greenhouse.

The home would be about 5 stories and contain 284 beds. After a comment by Mayor Blase "Niles used to be the youth capitol of the world - we are now fast becoming the geriatric capital," the request was postponed until the owner, architect, planners and village officials can meet and settle village requirements.

The board also approved the establishment of the rank of desk sergeant for a Niles Police Dept. officer and heard a report by Tr. Ann Marchesini on the public hearing held Monday night regarding the parking of boats and trailers on residential property in the village. No decision has been made as to village requirements in this matter.

College Survival Course

Dale Johnson, Program Administrator, has announced the How to Survive in College summer program is scheduled in Skokie for July 28, 29 and 30, at Niles Township High school North. Registrations can now be made by calling Dale Johnson at 729-4398.

According to a study published in the January, 1969 issue of Fortune magazine, over 50% of the freshmen that enter college never graduate. The How to Survive in College lecture-seminar series, which is based on a study course developed at Purdue university, is offered to help stem this tragic waste of our nation's talent. Dr. Edwin F. Casebeer, Associate Professor of English at Purdue and author of the course, states that most students do not fall because of lack of talent or intelligence; they fail because they do not know how to apply themselves or how to study.

The course is being sponsored locally by the Morton Grove Jaycees. Johnson, state vice-president, points out How to Survive in College is not a remedial course. It is a university-level lecture series, designed to illuminate and guide the responsible student.
