Self-addressed, stamped envelopes should be enclosed with tickets."



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



The past scourge of the North Shore of Chicago. This worm, also called a spring cankerworm, measuring worm, or spanworm, may feed on most of the foliage of various trees and can often cause serious defoliation in the next few weeks. There are some 1,200 known different species in the U.S. and Canada.

They acquire their name by the way they inch along when moving. Movement is accomplished by placing the posterior end of the body up near the anterior end, thus moving along in a looping fashion. Many inchworms when disturbed stand nearly erect on their posterior and prolegs and remain motionless, resembling small

The adult moths are usually small, delicate and slender bodied, The wings are usually broad and often marked with five wavy lines. The two sexes are often different in color and in a few species the females are wingless. This group of moths is chiefly nocturnal and are attracted to lights.

CONTROL: Can be accomplished by spraying your trees and shrubs with carbaryl (sevin) when the worms are first seen or feeding. Follow label directions for correct amounts of insecticide to use. This chemical can be purchased at most garden centers, hardware stores, farm supply or similar type stores. SYCAMORE ANTHRACNOSE

In most years, sycamore trees in Illinois are attacked by a leaf and twig disease called anthracnose. In some years the amount of injury produced is not conspicuous, but in other years the injury is so great and widespread that trees throughout the state are almost defoliated.

This leaf and twig disease, caused by the fungus Gnomonia veneta, is also known as twig blight. It affects both sycamore and oak. On sycamore, anthracnose may produce two types of leaf injury. One type, called early leaf blight, develops as complete killing of very young leaves during April or May. This type of injury may result in partial to complete defoliation and is occasionally confused with frost injury. The second type of leaf injury develops as small to large, irregular brown areas adjacent to and centering around diseased spots on the midribs and lateral yeins of mature leaves. This type of leaf injury rarely causes veins of mature leaves. This type of leaf injury rarely causes defoliation. Dark brown fruiting bodies or pustules of the fungus appear on the diseased tissues, especially on the midribs and veins. These raised pustules can be seen with a hand lens and sometimes with naked eye. The fungus may spread from diseased leaves through twigs into young branches and produce cankers, or cause twig and branch dieback. Most leaf injury and defoliation occurs

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

Junior College Vote

Constitutionality of last Saturday's election to name 7 trustees

of Junior College District 535 may be challenged in the near future, according to Genter Dahl, chairman of the Maine-Niles Junior College Citizens Committee, which saw only one of its seven endorsed candidates elected.

Dahl says his group will meet in the near future to explore the possibility of disannexation of the Maine area from the junior college district as well as the possibility of court action on the constitutionalty of the election—claiming the one-man, one-vote rule was not followed in the election of one man from Lincolnwood, four from Skokie and two from Park Ridge. Niles, Morton Grove Des Plaines and the unincorporated East Maine area have none of their residents on the board of trustees.

The question of the 7th elected trustee arose when the vote tally of Pct. 13 (Oakview school, Skokie) showed Hartstein had only received 25 votes. Poll watchers claimed that figure should be 255 votes. The 230-vote margin made the difference between Hartstein or William Sterling, Niles, being named the 7th elected trustee.

Falkoff was the only person elected not endorsed by the Dist. 535 Community College Committee. He had received the endorsement of the Maine-Niles Junior College Citizens Committee, a group chaired by Des Plainesite Genter Dahl. The #535 group was co-chaired by Bert Gelder, Niles Twsp. and Dick Cronin, Maine Tswp, Both groups had given their endorsements to MacDonald and Kamin.

Kamin, a former Roosevelt university trustee and former president of the Niles Township High school board, was the top vote-getter. He polled 2,138 votes. Second was MacDonald ---1,816; third, Falkoff --- 1,311; fourth, Sopkin - 1,256; fifth. Wauck - 1,242; sixth, Gilson -1,192 and seventh, Hartstein

The trustees will be sworn in within the next few days and . in the junior college district." will immediately draw lots to

determine who serves a 3-year term; 2-year term and oneyear term. That will mean almost every year will see an election for at least one of the trustee seats. They will also elect a chairman, secretary and treasurer. First big task for the trustees will be the selection of a junior college president and the selection of a site for the campus—generally envisioned to be somewhere in northwest Maine Township due to availability of sufficient


