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## **Bible Study Methods**

This packet is designed to help us learn methods that will aid in our study of the Bible. These methods fit under three fundamental skills: observe, interpret, and apply. Hopefully as you practice these methods, your time studying the Bible will become more worshipful and meaningful. Listed below are the methods and purpose of each box to guide you in your weekly study.

**Pray (How will I understand?):** Before each Bible study our process should always start in prayer. We are utterly dependent upon God to reveal His will to us. Without God working in our hearts and minds as we study, the Bible becomes mere knowledge. The Holy Spirit is needed in order to turn knowledge into wisdom.

Observe (What does it say?): Before we can interpret the meaning of a passage, it's important that we first make observations in the verses we're reading. Take note of the grammatical, literary, and cultural elements of the passage. This involves considering key words, verbs, and connecting words, as well as the who, what, when, why, and how's of the passage. Ask yourself guestions such as:

- Who...Who is Paul talking about? Who is accomplishing the task? Who is benefiting from the action?
- <u>Why</u>...Why did Paul choose this word? Why did James include this phrase, statement? Why did Peter connect these ideas? Why did Paul not say \_\_\_\_\_?
- <u>What</u>... What is the meaning of this word? What is the significance of this phrase? What is the implication of this statement? What is the relationship between these phrases?
- How... How was this action accomplished? How will this situation occur?

**Interpret (What does it mean?)** After careful observation, we can start trying to interpret what a certain verse or passage means. Our goal should be to determine what the author was saying to the original audience. In order to do this, we must understand the *context*. This entails reading the whole section, chapter, or book of whatever you're studying in order to understand the overall idea and the author's flow of thought.


## **Bible Study Methods**

Interpret (continued): We can also define key words, study cross-references, and compare multiple translations. Commentaries such as *The New Illustrated Bible Commentary* or many others can be helpful. Websites like biblestudytools.com or <a href="blueletterbible.org">blueletterbible.org</a> are helpful in studying key words in the original languages for a deeper understanding. Ask yourself questions such as:

- What happened right before or right after the verses I am studying?
- What is the main idea of the chapter?
- What seems to be the author's flow of thought?
- What cross references help clarify?
- What key words need to be defined?
- What do other translations say?
- How does it relate to the main idea of the chapter?

**Apply (How does it apply to me?):** Application is the last and most important step in Bible study. After we've established what the author was trying to communicate to the original audience, we can apply these truths to our own lives. Through prayer and reflection, think through key principles learned in the passage you've studied. Ask yourself questions such as:

- Is there something to worship or thank God for?
- Is there a promise for me to claim or a truth for me to believe?
- Is there something I am convicted about that I need to change or begin doing?
- Is there something I need to pray for specifically this week? Is there any relationship I need to work on?
- What exactly will I do differently this week to apply this principle to my life? Whom, other than the Lord, will I ask to help me follow through with this application?



## **SURVEY: WHAT IS THE BIG IDEA?**

Surveying a book like Philippians allows us to understand the "big picture" before diving into details. This exercise will help us understand the context as we journey through the book together in the coming weeks. Begin by spending 15-20 minutes reading through the whole book in its entirety. Then, answer the questions below.

1) Who is the author of this letter? What do we know about him? What do we learn about him from this book?
2) Consider Paul's audience? Based on what we read in the letter, what can we learn about them? What circumstances / struggles were they enduring?
3) What is the argument of the letter? In other words, why do you think Paul wrote it? What did he hope his listeners would do in response to his challenges, encouragements, and rebukes?
4) What questions do you have about this letter? Are there any difficult or challenging passages? Is there anything in the letter you're hoping to understand as a result of this study?

#### **BACKGROUND**

Now that you've completed the survey of Philippians, read the material below. For further study, consult sources listed below.\*

#### **AUTHORSHIP**

Paul, previously known as Saul, self-identifies as the author of the letter in verse one. Before his radical conversion to Christianity after meeting Jesus on the road to Damascus, Paul had been a violent persecutor of the early church. After meeting the risen Christ, he became the most influential missionary and church-planter in the early Christian movement. He corresponded with many churches throughout the Mediterranean throughout his ministry. These letters make up much of the New Testament and famously stress the effects of the faith on the way believers live and act. Paul is known as the "Apostle to the Gentiles" since he stressed the universality of the Gospel as good news to all peoples. He most likely was executed during Nero's persecution of Christians around AD 67.

#### **AUDIENCE**

The letter is addressed to the church in the city of Philippi, located in modern-day Turkey. The Philippian church held special significance to Paul as it was the first church he planted in Europe on his second missionary journey (Acts 16:11-40). The letter was most likely written by Paul when he was imprisoned in Rome. As the letter indicates, he is writing in part to thank the Philippian church for their latest gift delivered to him by Epaphroditus (a member of the Philippian congregation). The letter is more than just a thank you letter. He also wanted to encourage them in their faith, and to let them know that he was remaining hopeful in Christ, even though he may soon be executed.

#### **THEME**

The primary theme of the letter to the Philippians is encouragement. Paul is exhorting the members of the church in Philippi to live their lives in a manner consistent with their belief in Christ. He praises them for their faithfulness and kindness in the past and spurs them on toward greater faithfulness. Paul portrays Christ's humility and sacrifice as the chief example of a worthy life.

#### MY OUTLINE THE BOOK

Having read this background information for Philippians, create an outline with titles for each of the major sections. Resist the temptation to just copy the ones out of your Bible! There are many different approaches to outlining any Biblical book, so don't get hung up on being "right." Spend some time creating an outline that will be helpful to *you* as you study. [Tip: Consider where/when the author completes a thought and transitions to a new one. This will help you as you separate the book into sections.]



Spend time reviewing each of those methods below.







#### PHILIPPIANS 1:12-26 (NASB)

<sup>12</sup> Now I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that my circumstances have turned out for the greater progress of the gospel, <sup>13</sup> so that my imprisonment in the cause of Christ has become well known throughout the praetorian guard and to everyone else, <sup>14</sup> and that most of the brothers and sisters, trusting in the Lord because of my imprisonment, have far more courage to speak the word of God without fear. <sup>15</sup> Some, to be sure, are preaching Christ even from envy and strife, but some also from goodwill; 16 the latter do it out of love, knowing that I am appointed for the defense of the gospel; <sup>17</sup> the former proclaim Christ out of selfish ambition rather than from pure motives, thinking that they are causing me distress in my imprisonment. 18 What then? Only that in every way, whether in pretense or in truth, Christ is proclaimed, and in this I rejoice.

But *not only that*, I also will rejoice, <sup>19</sup> for I know that this will turn out for my deliverance through your prayers and the provision of the Spirit of Jesus Christ, <sup>20</sup> according to my eager expectation and hope, that I will not be put to shame in anything, but *that* with all boldness, Christ will even now, as always, be exalted in my body, whether by life or by death.

<sup>21</sup> For to me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain. <sup>22</sup> But if *I* am to live on in the flesh, this will mean fruitful labor for me; and I do not know which to choose. <sup>23</sup> But I am hard-pressed from both directions, having the desire to depart and be with Christ, for that is very much better; <sup>24</sup> yet to remain on in the flesh is more necessary for your sakes. <sup>25</sup> Convinced of this, I know that I will remain and continue with you all for your progress and joy in the faith, <sup>26</sup> so that your pride in Christ Jesus may be abundant because of me by my coming to you again.

MY OUTREACH GOALS
Vision: Write out Matthew 28:19-20 & 1 Peter 3:15-16
Continue practicing and rehearsing sharing the gospel and sharing your testimony. Continue name-storming and prayerfully considering who God wants you to share with.
Respond to the following questions and consider having someone hold you accountable to them.  How is it going with sharing with the names you circled?
If you shared with someone, how did they respond? What is something you can do with them to follow up?
Look at your name list, who are 3-4 more people you can reach out to? Are there any new names you can add to the list?
As you continue seeking out opportunities to share, consider ways to transition conversation to the gospel. Here are some steps from <i>Crosswalk</i> to help guide your conversations:
1. <u>Surface Talk</u> - Is the person alive? Talk about the weather, sports, and so on.
2. Personal Talk - Will the person open up? Talk about family, jobs, or interests.
3. Religious Talk - Is there interest in spiritual things? Talk about religion, churches, or church activities.
If the friend is not interested in religious talk at this time, retreat to step two!
4. <u>Spiritual Talk</u> - Is the person seeking God? Talk about what Christ has done for you; ask his or her view of Christianity. Then invite him or her to a Bible study or share the gospel.

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#### 1. Surface Talk

"This level of conversation is the perfect starting place for an evangelistic conversation. Your only goal at this point is to mention something more personal about yourself than the weather: family, school, work, neighbors, pets or anything that opens your life up just a little to this acquaintance. Just mention it, don't give your life story! Then, casually ask the acquaintance about that same area of his or her life.

Telling a person something about yourself gives you the unspoken right to ask that person the same thing. There are infinite possibilities for moving from surface talk to personal talk, as long as you remember your goal. You want people to open up about themselves. You are not interested in talking about yourself!

As they open up a little bit, tell them a little more about yourself, and then ask them more about themselves. Most people love to talk about themselves. If you practice listening to people, you will make enormous progress in your evangelistic efforts."

#### 2. Personal Talk

"This level of conversation is easy. You will never run out of things to talk about. You can ask questions about a person's birthplace, hometown, family, education, work, vacations, retirement, interests and hobbies, music, artistic abilities, politics, cooking, history, and sports of all kinds.

Just remember, you don't have to be an expert in a field to ask someone's opinion about that subject. You just have to a good listener. For the next week, spend thirty minutes a day starting conversations with strangers or acquaintances about surface topics and moving on to personal items. Then ask questions about their interests and do not talk about yourself. Try it! You will eventually see common interests develop."

## 3. Religious Talk


"The first levels of conversation are pre-evangelism. They're all about building rapport. Although most people may not respond positively toward the gospel, they do appreciate having someone ask them about themselves and listening to their ideas or their problems in life. A listening ear may be the very thing that causes a person to seek God."

"When you transition from surface talk to personal talk, you make a statement about yourself and then you ask the other person a question about that same area of his or her life. The transition process is the same between personal talk and religious talk. For example, when talking about how you spend your weekends, says, "Well, on weekends we usually [it doesn't matter what you do] on Saturday, and then we [eat in a restaurant, have friends over for lunch, whatever] after church." Wait a few seconds for body language, then continue with, "Do you attend church?" Continue asking questions and learning more about their view of God, the Bible, and Christianity.

#### 4. Spiritual Talk

"If you have been constantly building bridges from one subject to another, you will start to notice if the person wants to proceed with the conversation. You want to ask yourself, "Does this person's actions and attitudes indicate that he or she wants to talk about spiritual things?" If you sense and openness after the religious talk, you can move to spiritual talk by going in a number of directions. You can ask them the age old: "If you were to die today, could you say for certain that you will go to heaven?"... "Why should God let you into His heaven?"

Possibly, invite them to study the Bible with you, or invite them to church. But at this point is the time to present the gospel through how the Spirit leads you, or possibly how you've been trained with the Romans Road, 3 Circles, or Your Personal Testimony.







<sup>19</sup> But I hope, in the Lord Jesus, to send Timothy to you shortly, so that I also may be encouraged when I learn of your condition. 20 For I have no one else of kindred spirit who will genuinely be concerned for your welfare. <sup>21</sup> For they all seek after their own interests, not those of Christ Jesus. <sup>22</sup> But you know of his proven character, that he served with me in the furtherance of the gospel like a child serving his father. 23 Therefore I hope to send him immediately, as soon as I see how things go with me; <sup>24</sup> and I trust in the Lord that I myself will also be coming shortly. 25 But I thought it necessary to send to you Epaphroditus, my brother and fellow worker and fellow soldier, who is also your messenger and minister to my need, <sup>26</sup> because he was longing for you all and was distressed because you had heard that he was sick. <sup>27</sup> For indeed he was sick to the point of death, but God had mercy on him, and not only on him but also on me, so that I would not have sorrow upon sorrow. <sup>28</sup> Therefore I have sent him all the more eagerly, so that when you see him again you may rejoice and I may be less concerned about you. <sup>29</sup> Receive him then in the Lord with all joy, and hold people like him in high regard, <sup>30</sup> because he came close to death for the work of Christ, risking his life to compensate for your absence in your service to me.



### PHILIPPIANS 3:1-11 (NASB)

<sup>1</sup> Finally, my brothers *and sisters*, rejoice in the Lord. To write the same things *again* is no trouble for me, and it is a safeguard for you.

<sup>2</sup> Beware of the dogs, beware of the evil workers, beware of the false circumcision; <sup>3</sup> for we are the *true* circumcision, who worship in the Spirit of God and take pride in Christ Jesus, and put no confidence in the flesh, <sup>4</sup> although I myself *could boast as* having confidence even in the flesh. 




