From Our Pastor, Fr. Fausto ...

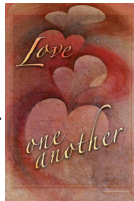
My Dear Friends,

Thank you for your generosity toward the collection for the Texan victims of the hurricane. As I am writing this on Tuesday, September 5, Hurricane Irma, category 5, is proceeding toward the U.S. mainland. Pray that we will all escape without too much damage!

Happy Grandparents Day to all you (some white-haired like me) who are lucky and blessed with the gift of grandchildren! Remember the funny saying, "If I had known how much fun grandchildren were, I would have had them first!"

Today's reading shows us how to deal with the command of Jesus to love everybody, including our enemies, as St. Paul remarked in the second reading: "Anyone who loves his neighbor has fulfilled the law."

"To Love" in accord with Jesus' command doesn't imply just a good **"feeling"** of our emotions, but involves our entire being: emotions, brains and actions! And among one of the most difficult tasks in loving our neighbor is the **loving correction** of our faults. We are so much afraid of rejection that we correct little, letting things go beyond reason and prudence. And, on the receiving side of correction, our pride resists every little correction, as if we were perfect human beings.



So any member of Jesus' people should try to bring back, to the Good Shepherd, any stray sheep. This is done privately, so that the offending sister or brother doesn't get humiliated. Sadly, because of our fear of rejection, we say nothing to the stray sheep, but behind his or her back, we many times gossip endlessly, even if the sin is hidden!

The reason we can share our concern with someone else is, according to Jesus' command, only to have someone to add weight to the reproof, which can be done only by sharing it. Failure to heed this second warning demands that the process be brought to the assembly of Jesus' people (Church), and notice that the whole assembly, and not just the office-holders, has the power to bind and to loose as Peter alone received by Jesus in Matthew 16:19.

To love our neighbors, then, doesn't mean to accept scandalous people, but to correct and pray for the sinners;

and how powerful prayer is can be seen by the last words of today's gospel: **"Where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I in their midst."** **Be Christ - correct, not just politically correct!**

Next Sunday, September 17, the St. Martha Religious Education classes will begin. All families are invited to join us at the 9:00 a.m. Mass in the Fausto Center. Classes begin on the second floor at 10:15 a.m., and end at 11:30 a.m. It is not too late to register your child or children in this important part of their religious formation. And all say a prayer for the staff, catechists and children for a successful and blessed year.

Thursday is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Cross. This feast celebrates a double anniversary. In Jerusalem, Constantine erected a round church, the Anastasis, above the empty grave of Jesus, and a basilica, the "Martyrium"; in the square between the two churches, a shrine, "Calvarium", marking the place of the crucifixion. Dedicated in 335, they were destroyed by the Persians in 614. The two churches were rebuilt by Patriarch Modestus of Jerusalem c. 626, but were later destroyed by the Muslims in 1009. The present church of the Holy Sepulcher, rebuilt by the Crusaders, was dedicated in 1149. Thursday also commemorates the discovery of the Lord's cross by the empress, St. Helena (Aug. 18, year 320).

Friday, September 15, is another feast closely united to the previous Feast of the Exaltation. It is the very popular Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows. Recounting the traditional seven sorrows of Jesus' mother. In the 14th century these sorrows numbered seven:

1. Circumcision of Baby Jesus
2. Frightful flight to Egypt
3. Jesus being lost in Jerusalem
4. Meeting with Jesus carrying the cross
5. Nailing on the cross
6. "La Pieta" Mary embraces dead Jesus
7. Mary buries her son

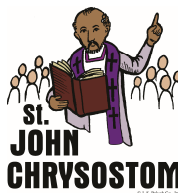

ST. JOHN CHRYSOSTOM SEPTEMBER 13

Born in Antioch and trained as an orator, he was ordained and appointed preacher for the bishop. He became famous for his eloquent sermons and was called Chrysostomos ("the golden mouth"). Later, as archbishop of Constantinople, he began a program of reform. Because he was uncompromising in political and ecclesiastical affairs, his enemies contrived to have him exiled, despite the efforts of the Holy See. To avoid an uprising, John was taken away in secret but died on the journey. May we learn to pray often his dying words, "Glory be to God for all things."

The love Paul describes in the second reading infuses the pro-life movement. Defending the unborn is simply "love your neighbor." Pro-life advocacy, therefore, doesn't have to be seen as ideologically or politically motivated. It is simply love in action, and love that inspires not only the work of pregnancy centers and post-abortion healing ministries, but also prayer vigils, legislative efforts and every other form of pro-life activity.

In four weeks, our Parish will celebrate the 90th Anniversary of its raising from mission status to be a parish. The date was October 1, 1927

This is the first part of a four-part series presenting the story of the growth of the Catholic Church in our part of Southwest Florida in the years leading up to 1927.

(1870-1889) Erection of the Diocese of St. Augustine; First Catholic Churches in Southwest Florida

Southwest Florida in the 19th Century lagged behind the rest of the state in population growth and industrial development because of its isolation and unsuitability of the land and its natural state for agriculture. A few pioneering families arrived before the Civil War. However, settlement in the immediate Sarasota area did not begin in earnest until after the Civil War. This period saw the start of communities of Bee Ridge, Venice, Fruitville, and Old Myakka. The early settlers during this period engaged mainly in agriculture and cattle raising. Among these early settlers were a few Catholics, whose spiritual needs were attended to by missionary priests based in the few Catholic churches in the area. Among the first was Tampa's Sacred Heart (founded as St. Louis Church in 1854), Sacred Heart Church in Bradenton (Fogartyville), founded in 1888, and St. Francis Xavier Church in Fort Myers, founded in 1889. The Florida Peninsula had been under the Diocese of Savannah, GA from the 1821 purchase of Florida from Spain until the establishment of the Diocese of St. Augustine in 1870. In 1888, Sacred Heart Church in Tampa was placed in the care of Jesuit Fathers. The following year, Sacred Heart Church was assigned as a mission the territory comprising present day Hillsborough, Hardee, DeSoto, Manatee, Sarasota, and Charlotte Counties. At the time (up to 1921) most of this territory was part of Manatee County.

WE ARE LOVEABLE

St. Paul echoes Christ in many ways. In the 13th Chapter from his letter to the Romans, he continues with his thoughts on how we should live to please God, and he uses a sentence which Christ often repeated. After listing several of the 10 Commandments, Paul states, “...whatever other commandments there may be, are summed up in this saying, namely, ‘You shall love your neighbor as yourself.’” There is always much that gets debated in that admonition, such as loving yourself, and who exactly is your neighbor? Paul’s point, like that of Jesus, is simply that we are called to treat others as we may like to be treated. We need to show them the respect and caring that we may hope for and wish for. God loves us, and if we realize that, we may ultimately come to the conclusion that we are loveable. Most of us know someone whose love is evident by how they treat others and how they live. Loving neighbor is a visible expression of everything that Jesus taught. It is a way of expressing the depth of our faith and our belief that we are Disciples of Christ. St. Francis de Sales captured all about what this love is and who is your neighbor when he wrote, “Examine your heart often to see if it is such toward your neighbor as you would like his or hers to be toward you in his or her place. This is the touchstone of true reason.” It is relatively basic and simple — our neighbor is everyone with whom we have contact and love is what makes it all work.
