Iwas named after Superman. The story goes like this. Just before I was born, my parents saw Superman II. After the movie, my dad suggested they name me, Clark Kent Smith.

My mom did not like that idea. Long before Superman, she liked Christopher. So she countered, Clark Christopher Smith. But she was smart. Christopher, she said, like Christopher Reeve-who played Superman/Clark Kent in those movies.

But Dad wanted my initials to be C. K. S., so he suggested changing the "Ch" to a "K." Mom spelled it out and didn't like it. So she made her final offer, Clark Kristofor Smith.

People have been misspelling my name ever since.

What we call the Old Testament started out as stories told and learned by heart. It lived like this within God's people for generations, in an ancient form of Hebrew.

In Hebrew and the Old Testament, names are stories. Take Israel. Israel is two words put together-isra (meaning "to struggle") and el (meaning "God"). Israel means "one who struggles with God."

A bigger story is held in the name. Jacob cheated his older brother Esau out of his birthright. Decades later, the rival brothers were about to reunite, and Jacob feared Esau would kill him in revenge.

The night before their reunion, Jacob did not sleep but wrestled with God (or an angel) all night long. As the sun rose, God/the angel struck Jacob on the hip, giving him a limp and a new name, Israel.

In the morning, Esau took hold of his wounded and vulnerable brother, but he wasn't wrestling. It wasn't a throw or takedown. Esau gave Israel (formerly Jacob) a forgiving embrace.

The message: Israel struggles with God, and God fights back with lifesaving grace.

Sara and I named our daughter, Susannah Jane Olson-Smith. Susanna is named in Luke 8, as one of several women who "provided for" Jesus. She was a major funder, a big donor. With other women, she bankrolled Jesus' ministry. Ancient tradition puts Susanna with "the other women" who found Jesus' tomb empty and became the first evangelists.

Jane is for the main character of the book Jane Eyre. Jane suffered willingly for her sense of integrity and justice. She also saw through
the false, hypocritical religion of those who abused her.
Amos, our son, is Amos Mark Olson-Smith. Amos was a biblical prophet. With the rest of the prophets, Amos was among the sharpest critics of any society. His vision of judgment and hope echoed in Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., who quoted Amos 5 in a famous speech.

Because they "trampled the poor," God hated the peoples' worship and refused to listen to their sacred music. God said, "But let justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever-flowing stream."

Mark is for Mark Olson-a Lutheran pastor, an author and visionary, and Sara's dad, who died as we started seminary.

Your name is a story, with or without a naming story. Your name includes the story of who you are and why you are here-the story of your identity and purpose.

In baptism, God affirms all our names and adds to them. We receive birth names and rebirth names. Beloved child of God. Reborn. Cleansed. Forgiven. Raised to life. Sealed by the Holy Spirit. Marked with the cross of Christ forever. Together, we share this identity even as we retain our individuality.

Our stories become our story, made one in Christ. Now our identity and purpose are not only our own. Our story is also Israel's story, Esau's story, the story of Israel's prophets, and the Easter story.

We the church are Israel-prophets and evangelists of the God of life, who on the cross, named, claimed, and sent us in God's name.

We in particular are God's people named St. Paul. With that name, we have received grace upon grace and a great deal to live up to.

## LWR SCHOOL KITS
