

As we enter Phase 2 of resuming "public" Masses, please keep the following in mind:

Archbishop Robert Carlson has extended the dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass indefinitely. Those who are sick should remain at home.

- 2) Mass attendance is limited to 50% of our regular capacity for us that's about 175 people.
- 3) Ushers will open the outside doors for you when you arrive and the inside church doors will be left standing open.
- 4) You are asked to keep a 'social distance' from each other, except those of the same household.
- 5) Except for little children, a mask is recommended except when sitting down or receiving Holy Communion.
- 6) There will be no holy water in the fonts.
- 7) We will not be using the missalettes.
- 8) The ushers will resume taking up the collection and they will bring up the bread and wine for Mass.
- 9) There will be no sign of peace.
- 10) There will be no Holy Communion distributed from the cup.
- 11) There will be no Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion.
- 12) People should line up for Holy Communion single file, maintaining your social distance (except those in the same household) one side of the church at a time.
- 13) In an abundance of caution, we will continue to sanitize the church after each Mass even though Phiase 2 allows of the church being sanitized just once a day.



[In our continued instruction on the topic of the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist, please consider this:]
Unintended consequences may be unintended, but the consequences are real. For example, in the mid-'70's the insecticide DDT was banned in the United States when its unintended environmental damage became obvious. The DDT dusted corn and grain was eaten by field mice which, in turn, were eaten by various birds. Because of the DDT in their system, when the birds laid eggs, the egg shells would crumble and the baby birds would die. The American bald eagle and the peregrine falcon were both on the verge of extinction

As I've mentioned before, the unintended (I'll give them the benefit of the doubt!) consequences of the changes that came to the Church after the II Vatican Council have been devastating. Most of these can be traced back to the changes to the Mass. As I mentioned last week, the unintended message to Catholics has been - "If Father-so-and-so can do whatever he wants at Mass, I should be able to do whatever I want too."

And if the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is all about the priest and what he wants to do, why should I make an effort to be there? I'll go to some other church or no church or just say some prayers, or maybe not even do that.

The many options available at Mass (and those imposed upon the Mass) have pretty much given the message that Mass itself is pretty much optional. That's why I think the belief in or lack of belief in the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist has become pretty much optional, too. And if Holy Communion is not really the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ, I don't have to be in the state of grace to receive Holy Communion. So even though I'm living in sin, and/or even though I only attend Mass on Christmas and Easter (which is living in sin), and/or even though I'm not Catholic or a Catholic who doesn't believe - I can receive Holy Communion, too, since it's not really Holy Communion.

See what we've done to ourselves? If it was a matter of spraying a deadly insecticide on plants we would stop doing that. But what do we do if it's a matter of faith and morals? What do we do when (supposedly) 70% of Catholics don't beleive in the Real Presence of Christ in the Holy Eucharist? What do we do when Mass attendance plummets - and not just because of the coronavirus? What do we do when there seems to be no difference anymore between what Catholics beleive and what Protestants believe?

THIS WEEK'S Pro Life

Planned Parenthood exposed for selling aborted baby body parts: 5 years later

More than five years ago - on July 14, 2015 - David Daleiden released the first of many incriminating videos that showed the world the gruesome underbelly of illegal practices by the abortion industry. As researchers and reporters, Daleiden and his investigative partner, Sandra Merritt, posed as human tissue buyers. What they uncovered shocked the country as the videos they recorded revealed Planned Parenthood's involvement in aborted baby body parts trafficking. The videos, 13 in all, caused a national outcry to defund Planned Parenthood and triggered a congressional investigation of the abortion industry. Within days of the first video release, David and Sandra were hauled into court by the National Abortion Federation. The battle of David versus the "Goliath" abortion industry eventually evolved into seven separate court cases both criminal and civil in four different states.

The Thomas More Society's Tom Brejcha, President and Chief Counsel, and Peter Breen, Vice President and Senior Counsel, shared their perspectives on the challenges and victories of the last five

"There are many disturbing revelations that have occurred during the abortion industry's aggressive pursuit of David Daleiden," stated Brejcha. "Even if you take the heinous butchering of born-alive babies out of the equation, you still have broader implications for a free socie-

Peter Breen noted that many abortion proponents claim to be "prowoman." "Yet," Breen observed, "David Daleiden is being attacked by the abortion industry for exposing their disregard for human life, the disrespect they have demonstrated for women, and the deliberate risk to women's health they incur in order to reap huge profits. Not only is that a betrayal of women's rights, but the legal actions against David Daleiden pose an even deeper threat to the freedoms of every Ameri-

Some of the shocking revelations that came out during Planned Parenthood's pursuit of Daleiden and Merritt included:

- a retired late-term abortionist testified that she routinely killed babies in utero with digoxin to prevent what she called the "biggest disaster" a live birth;
- a self-proclaimed "celebrity" abortionist boasted in court that bornalive babies are "one of the worst nightmares" for an abortion provider
- a former Planned Parenthood medical director was caught in blatant contradictions during her testimony
- an abortion worker confessed to knowing that her tissue procurement business partner was involved in profiting from the trade of aborted baby body parts
- an abortionist tried to deny everything she was recorded saying on undercover video
- a fetal tissue broker admitted selling baby hearts and intact baby heads and even fully intact fetuses

Stated Brejcha with confidence and resolve. "The United States Constitution, its Amendments and the Bill of Rights are precious," he remarked, "and worth much more than the millions of dollars that the abortion industry has spent over the last five years in the effort to silence truth and leave the American citizenry ignorant of these horrific crimes they want to keep hidden at all costs." 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

SAINT OF THE WEEK



St. Alphonsus Ligouri, whose feast day is August 1, is a Bishop, Doctor of the Church, and the founder of the Redemptorist Congregation. He was born on September 27,1696 near Naples. Italy. Raised in a pious home, he was the oldest of seven children. He was very intelligent and received his doctorate at the age of sixteen. By age nineteen he was practicing law, but he saw the transitory nature of the secular world, and after a brief time, retreated from the law courts and his fame. Visiting the local Hospital for Incurables on August 28, 1723, he had a vision and was told to consecrate his life solely to God.

As a result, Alphonsus dedicated himself to the religious life, even while suffering persecution from his family. He finally agreed to become a priest but to live at home as a member of a group of secular missionaries. He was ordained on December 21, 1726, and he spent six years giving missions throughout Naples. In 1732 Alphonsus founded the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer - who we refer to as the Redemptorists. The foundation faced immediate problems, and after just one year, Alphonsus found himself with only one lay brother, his other companions having left to form their own religious group. He started again, recruited new members, and in 1743 became the prior of two new congregations, one for men and one for women.

Alphonsus was preaching missions in the rural areas of Italy and writing. He refused to become the bishop of Palermo but in 1762 had to accept the papal command to accept the see of St. Agatha of the Goths near Naples. Here he discovered more than thirty thousand uninstructed men and women and four hundred indifferent priests. For thirteen years Alphonsus fed the poor, instructed families, reorganized the seminary and religious houses, taught theology, and wrote.

His austerities were rigorous, and he suffered daily the pain from rheumatism that was beginning to deform his body. He spent several years having to drink from tubes because his head was so bent forward. An attack of rheumatic fever, from May 1768 to June 1769, left him paralyzed. In 1780, Alphonsus was deposed and excluded from his own congregation. Alphonsus suffered great anguish. But he overcame his depression, and he experienced visions, performed miracles, and gave prophecies

He died peacefully on August 1,1787 near Naples as the Angelus was ringing. His writings on moral, theological, and ascetic matters had great impact and have survived through the years. He is the patron of confessors, moral theologians, and the lay apostolate. In liturgical art he is depicted as bent over with rheumatism or as a young priest.
