
From the Potentate...

Patient Trailblazer Shredding the Slopes On Her Snowboard

In 2006, Nicole Roundy became the first above the knee amputee – male or female – to compete in adaptive snowboarding, eight years before the sport made its debut at the Sochi 2014 Paralympic Winter Games. This year, Roundy will travel to South Korea to compete in the 2018 Paralympics. She credits Shriners Hospitals for Children with helping to make it possible.

In 1994, when she was just 8 years old, Nicole was diagnosed with osteogenic sarcoma, a form of bone cancer. Later that year, she lost her right leg above the knee and continued aggressive chemotherapy treatment. Shriners Hospitals for Children — Salt Lake City made all of her prosthetics until she was 19 and introduced her to adaptive snowboarding during their Camp Un-LIMB-ited, a week-long adaptive sports program designed for teen amputees. "I was terrified at first, but snowboarding was like a freedom from my disabil-

ity," says Roundy.

She was able to take her athletic aspirations to the next level after Shriners Hospitals created her first prosthetic with a bendable knee joint.

"Shriners Hospitals taught me that I am my own biggest advocate, and that you can't take no for an answer. If you want something, you may have to fight for it."

Roundy is now a motivational speaker and disability advocate. She has returned to Camp Un-LIMB-ited a few times, which she says reminds her of where she came from. "It's a place where suddenly the differences just disappear, and kids get to be kids." It's the same feeling she gets thinking about the Paralympics – a place where athletes can put their disabilities aside, and just compete.

Every day, Shriners Hospitals for Children encourages patients to manage the challenges of their conditions with programs such as physical therapy and music therapy. Our adaptive sports programs and camps go a step further to maximize a patient's mobility, build strength and gain self-confidence.



Dear Fellow Nobles,

Shriners Hospitals for Children® is respected around the world for its unique approach to health care that combines compassion, medical excellence and generosity. We have always wanted to assist as many children as possible, regardless of the families' ability to pay.

Today, our world is more and more like one large community – we can pretty much reach anyone anywhere, at any time. Our "smaller" world, and the possibilities provided by modern communications technology give us a tremendous opportunity to reach many more kids in need of help, in many more places. The Joint Boards of Shriners Hospitals supports the concept of extending the reach of our health care system, and has included these efforts in the strategic plan. We want to expand our efforts to improve the lives of children by providing care far beyond the walls of our hospitals and clinics, and past the borders of our traditional locations.

To do this, we are expanding our outreach and telehealth programs. These efforts make it possible for Shriners Hospitals for Children to serve a significant number of





In April of 2015, the Joint Boards of Shriners Hospitals for Children approved a plan to initiate a telehealth pilot program, in order to invest in and expand telehealth services throughout the health care system. The pilot programs were successful, and we now expect to expand the telehealth program to all our health care locations by 2019. Telehealth is a method of using communication technology and affiliate locations that work in partnership with our established hospitals and medical centers to bring care directly to our patients, closer to their homes. Telehealth eases the burden and cost of traveling long distances to one of our hospitals and reduces time away from home and school for our patients and families.

We are making tremendous progress in this effort. In 2017, 30 providers in 16 states were licensed, and 369 telehealth clinics were held, providing care for 993 children. Thirteen of our Shriners Hospitals locations are currently participating in the telehealth initiative; nine are acting as host sites and five are using telehealth for inter-hospital patient visits and/or consultations. Also, last year 46 physicians provided care via telehealth to patients in 10 countries.

In addition to providing care closer to our patients' home, causing less disruption to families' daily lives and schedules, telehealth reduces the stress and financial burden of traveling longer distances, for both our patient families and our Shriners temples. In 2017, our telehealth capabilities allowed us to avoid an overall 1,973,099 miles of patient travel.

Our dedication to the development, refinement and implementation of a system-wide telehealth care network is just one more example of our commitment to provide excellent, compassionate, innovative care to children in need of our services, wherever they may live.

Another way we can reach more kids in more places is by expanding our international

Chicago Patient Tim, 12, Rides Bike For The First Time

In February while it was still chilly outside in Chicago, Tim was indoors practicing for a rite of spring for Chicago-area kids – the first bike ride of the season. The 12-year-old, who was born without arms, required more than just a neat looking bicycle to take his ride. Thanks to his medical team at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Chicago and Pediatric Orthotic and Prosthetic Services (POPS) — Chicago, Tim received a custom brace that will allow him to ride a typical, not adapted bike, for the first time in his life.

Tim putting on his bike brace "Tim brought a video from another hospital

showing a kid with disabilities riding a bike...As a prosthetist it is exciting and fun to brainstorm with patients' ideas," India Jacobson, CPO, a certified prosthetist with POPS said. "It was also helpful in the process to have his mom Linda, who was also born without arms, there to help Tim learn to use the bicycle brace."

Jacobson created the custom bicycle brace using the rear section of a thoracolumbosacral orthosis (TLSO) back brace. She connected it with straps to PVC material that slide onto the bicycle handlebars. With some practice Tim was riding in no time.



and domestic outreach clinics.

In 2017, international outreach clinics were held in several countries, including Cyprus, the Dominican Republic, Honduras, Panama, and some of the Caribbean islands. Our physicians also worked with other relief organizations and cared for patients in additional international locations, such as Guatemala and Ecuador.

In addition, our primary locations also hold outreach clinics within their catchment areas. For example, Shriners Hospitals for Children — Honolulu, which has the largest catchment area for outreach in our health care system and serves a geographical area at least as large as the continental United States, holds outreach clinics on its neighboring Hawaiian islands and serves the South Pacific, including Guam – their largest outreach clinic with the most patients – Tinian, Saipan, Fiji, Tonga, American Samoa, Western Samoa, the Federated States of Micronesia and the Republic of the Marshall Islands.


Most of our other primary locations also hold outreach clinics in their catchment areas, as well.

Overall, in 2017, our health care system held more than 400 outreach clinics that served more than 8,000 children.

We are proud of our continuing efforts to fulfill our promise to care for children wherever they may live, and bring medical excellence, hope and healing to communities around the globe.



Two New Temples in South America Under Dispensation

Shriners International continues to attract and inspire men throughout the world to become part of our great fraternity, and share in our efforts to make the world a better place. Our values have been widely accepted around the globe, which has led to phenomenal international interest and growth. During the 2017 Imperial Session of Shriners International in July, petitions for dispensations to open new temples in Santa Cruz, Bolivia – as Bolivia Shriners, and São Paulo, Brazil – as Amal Shriners, were granted, further expanding our global reach. In September, representatives of both groups traveled to Shriners International Headquarters in Tampa, Florida, to participate in on-site training. We look forward to watching the growth and development of these two new temples.

Amal Shriners, U.D. - Brazil

The first temple in Brazil, Hikmat Shriners in Cuiabá, Mato Grasso, was chartered in 2015, and was our first temple in South America. Now, the Shriners of São Paulo, Brazil, are ready for a second temple to be established. "All good Masons should become Shriners," said Noble Newton Duarte of Amal Shriners, who became a Shriner in March and attended the on-site training as the temple's representative.

Bolivia Shriners, U.D. - Bolivia


The members of Bolivia Shriners were drawn to the fraternity because of "the Masonic spirit reflected in the love of the neighbor, in fraternal environments and in family," they said. Their journey began in 2008, during the World Conference of Masonic Grand Lodges held in Washington D.C., when they visited Almas Shriners and were invited to become Shriners. The group operated as the Bolivian Shrine Club, under the jurisdiction of Almas Shriners, before their application for temple dispensation was presented and approved at the 2017 Imperial Session. Bolivia Shriners has many goals, including "continuing to provide opportunities for children to receive medical treatment at Shriners Hospitals, in order to improve their quality of life."

From the Recorder...

On any given weekday I receive around ten phone calls that are Shrine related and directed to me personally. The same is true of emails which number about the same per day. They can be a question about the temple, dues, a rule, and even the occasional complaint. I try to handle them all with the same demeanor regardless of the Noble's disposition. I've always felt one of my responsibilities as Recorder, often being one of the first people a Noble reaches out to, is to listen and do my best to resolve the question or situation. Sometimes that can take one minute on the phone and sometimes it takes thirty. I've never begrudged the time I spend dealing with a Noble's question or their demeanor on the phone. It all goes to why I took this job in the first place.

I became Recorder because I wanted to use what skills I had to make a difference in the future of the temple. That future can be as near as the phone calls and emails I will receive and respond to tomorrow or as far as where the Temple will find itself in 25 years. I always have to think in short and long term ways because that is what we need to do to succeed as an organization - solve immediate issues and always keep the long game in mind.

As an individual Noble do you think the same way about your fraternal commitments? Are you looking at the short term issues and also thinking about what the future holds? Both for you as an individual Shrine Mason and for the Craft at large? How do you value your commitment to one versus the other? Are they ever in conflict

with one another? I'm thinking about these issues everyday as I address the needs of the Temple. I don't have the luxury or the desire to focus on just one of them. In doing so I think I would be doing them both a disservice. I visit a club or unit or answer a phone call or email from a Noble because I care about them and I think what the Shrine needs more than anything right now are Shriners who care about each other and future of our organization. I start each day thinking that I have the opportunity to make a difference for Saladin. Some may criticize and some may encourage and I try to take them all in stride and remember that I became a Shriner and the Recorder because I wanted to make a difference and so do you.
