Fourth Sunday of Lent

#### THINGS ABOVE FROM FR. BILOT

Today, the fourth Sunday of Lent of the Roman Catholic Church celebrates Laetare Sunday. Traditionally, today has been a day of celebration within the austere period of Lent. By today's standards I don't believe our Lenten resolves are really that austere. Perhaps, I shouldn't make a blanketed generalization and just confess that my Lenten resolve keeps me mindful of this penitential season, but it certainly is not austere.

Austere is defined as "severe or strict in manner, attitude or appearance ... of having no comforts or luxuries; harsh or ascetic" (Webster.) Laetare, on the other hand, means to rejoice. So why am I referring to austerity when we are to rejoice? Well, I believe it helps create a context. If we are embracing the imperatives of Jesus from Matthew's Gospel to pray, fast and give alms we should be led into an austerity of realizing how we live in comfort, security and complacency. Honestly, I was contemplating if I have a spiritual right to rejoice today? I don't believe so. My Lenten resolve, though inconvenient and keeping me mindful of the lent we embraced, I don't believe I have entered the austerity of the dessert that Jesus embraced for us.

I rejoice today, despite my human inadequacies and struggle to enter into the austerity of a true Lenten desert experience, because Jesus understands me. And, despite myself, Jesus has placed other challenges and burdens upon me to make up for my lack of enthusiasm to go into the desert on my own. I believe I should be thanking Jesus for this! Jesus knows what is best for me. My trust in Him moves me to enter into a different experience of austerity that I would not have entered into on my own.

I hope you too, despite how well (or not so well) you are doing on your Lenten resolve, that if you pray each day asking the Holy Spirit to guide you, he will take you into the austerity of the desert to help you become the person you are truly called to be. May we all rejoice because Jesus' love for us goes beyond our human limitations. Jesus understands us and will continually guide us, through the Holy Spirit, to the Garden of Eden despite ourselves!

The Introit for today's Mass speaks to our hearts when the Prophet Isaiah proclaims, "Rejoice, Jerusalem, and all who love her. Be joyful, all who were in mourning; exult and be satisfied at her consoling breast."

St. Paul parish has another humble and awesome event to rejoice in. A group of parishioners inquired about purchasing a "new" monstrance for St. Paul Church. I was more than happy to explore this opportunity. The monstrance we use, that holds the Holy Eucharist, is small for our church and difficult to gaze upon while praying. After much deliberation and search we have acquired this beautiful and holy antique vessel. When I saw the monstrance, (which was purchased through the generous donations of those who inquired) I was excited to learn its origin is French (which keeps a tradition with our parish and the church architecture.) Also, this particular monstrance has an angel holding up the sacred host for us to adore. Please read the article and pictures on pages 4-5.

Another reason for rejoicing during our austerity of lent is the Solemnity of St. Joseph, March 19<sup>th</sup>. For all of us who are participating in the 33 Day Consecration to St. Joseph, we will pray the prayer of Consecration (see page 11) on St. Joseph Feast Day at the 6:30 and 8:15 a.m. Mass. Also, because St. Joseph is a Solemnity if you gave up something for lent you are given permission to indulge on this day because a Solemnity supersedes a lent weekday.

Just a reminder that the marble floors in the church will be cleaned and restored next week so there will be times when the church will be closed or the main aisle blocked off.

I spoke with Fr. Tom. His therapy after this shoulder reversal surgery is coming along. He says it is painful and difficult but he is persevering and progress is being made!

Know of my prayers as we forge through the remaining weeks of Lent! Rejoice!


God, thank you for sending Jesus to wash away my sins.

As God never forgets us, we must never forget God. Now is the time to take stock of our infidelity and return to the light, even though it is difficult to look at.

# An introduction to inspirational information

Title: Diary of St. Maria Faustina

Kowalska

Category: mystical experience

Timeframe: early 1900s

Density: light, but profound

**Pages:** 707

St. Maria Faustina Kowlaska records her life experience – the journey of her soul – in her published diary. It is an exceptional window into her spirituality and union with God Himself. Jesus talks directly to St. Faustina in words that are bolded in the book. I usually read a couple journal entries at a time and find the depth of love and truth to be evident. Here is an excerpt: Entry 1184

In the evening I saw the Lord Jesus upon the cross. From His hands, feet, and side the Most Sacred Blood was flowing. After some time, Jesus said to me. All this is for the salvation of souls. Consider well, my daughter, what you are doing for their salvation. I answered, 'Jesus when I look at your suffering, I see that I am doing next to nothing for the salvation of souls.' And the Lord said to me, Know, My daughter, that your silent day-to-day martyrdom in complete submission to My will ushers many souls into heaven. And when it seems to you that your suffering exceeds your strength, contemplate My wounds, and you will rise above human scorn and judgement.

Meditation on My Passion will help you rise above all things. I understood many things I had been unable to comprehend before.



### "Won't you keep watch for one hour with me?" (Matthew 26:40)

We have an exciting announcement to make regarding Eucharistic adoration...we have a new monstrance! With social distancing those who are in adoration towards the back of the church have a hard time appreciating the previous monstrance due to its smaller stature. A group of parishioners approached Fr. Bilot with a generous offer to donate a new and larger monstrance, and he gladly accepted.

Our "new" monstrance actually dates back to 19th century France (the year 1870). It is in Romanesque style and is made of gold-plated solid brass. The monstrance is

adorned with beautiful jewels and enamel. The process of adding enamel to beautify precious metals dates back as early as the 13th century, BC. The enamel is laid in shades of blue, symbolizing that we enter into the heavenly realm when we are in the presence of the Eucharist. The jewel stones are predominantly in red, consistent with the martyrdom of so many great saints, including our patron Saint Paul.

The stunning angel in the center calls to mind the Roman Canon (Eucharistic Prayer I) in which the celebrant prays, "In humble prayer we ask you, almighty

God: command that these gifts be borne by the hands of your holy Angel to your altar on high in the sight of your divine majesty, so that all of us who through this participation at the altar receive the most holy Body and Blood of your Son may be filled with every grace and heavenly blessing."

Our eyes are then drawn down to the four medallions of Ss. Joseph, Matthew, Peter, and Paul, below which is the base of the monstrance, adorned with a majestic stag. The stag is known as the king of the forest and protector of all other animals. This together with the surrounding laurel symbolizes the triumph of Christ as Victor. In Christian art the stag has also come to typify piety and religious aspiration and longing, as we read in

Psalm 42: "As a deer longs for running streams, so my souls longs for You O, God. My soul thirsts for the living God."

The monstrance sits on a stand (called a "tabor") made of gold-plated solid brass. The tabor is in Gothic style, similarly adorned with enamel and red stones, and also dates back to 19th century France. The center of the tabor houses a blue "A-V" crest, for "Ave Maria" (Hail Mary). The symbols of the Four Evangelists surround the Marian crest: Matthew the man, Mark the lion, Luke the ox, and John the eagle. All of this is to symbolize that

Mary, Mother of Eucharist, all the angels and saints, and indeed all of creation kneel in worship before Jesus, the Bread of Life, our Savior and King.

Do you find we live in a world that lacks love? Then listen to St. Teresa of Calcultta: "When you look at the crucifix, you understand how much Jesus loved you then. When you look at the Sacred Host, you understand how much Jesus loves you now."

Do you need courage and strength to make a change in your life? Then listen to St. Padre Pio: "We must always have courage, and

if some spiritual languor comes upon us, let us run to the feet of Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, and let us place ourselves in the midst of the heavenly perfumes, and we will undoubtedly regain our strength."

Or do you simply need a good friend? Then listen to St. Alphonsus Liguori: "Good friends find pleasure in one another's company. Let us know pleasure in the company of our best Friend, a Friend who can do everything for us, a Friend who loves us beyond measure. Here in the Blessed Sacrament we can talk to Him straight from the heart."

Eucharistic adoration/exposition takes place at St. Paul on the Lake every Tuesday following 8:15am Mass thru 7:00pm. See you there!

#### How to go to Confession...

PREPARATION: Before going to confession, take some time to prepare. Begin with prayer, and reflect on your life since your last confession. How have you—in your thoughts, words, and actions—neglected to live Christ's commands to "love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind," and to "love your neighbor as yourself" (Mt 22:37, 39)? As a help with this "examination of conscience," you might review the Ten Commandments or the Beatitudes (Ex 20:2-17; Dt 5:6-21; Mt 5:3-10; or Lk 6:20 -26).

GREETING: The priest will welcome you; he may say a short blessing or read a Scripture passage.

THE SIGN OF THE CROSS: Together, you and the priest will make the Sign of the Cross. You may then begin your confession with these or similar words: "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned. It has been [give days, months, or years] since my last confession."

CONFESSION: Confess all your sins to the priest. If you are unsure what to say, ask the priest for help. When you are finished, conclude with these or similar words: "I am sorry for these and all my sins."

PENANCE: The priest will propose an act of penance. The penance might be prayer, a work of mercy, or an act of charity. He might also counsel you on how to better live a Christian life.

ACT OF CONTRITION: After the priest has conferred your penance, pray an Act of Contrition, expressing sorrow for your sins and resolving to sin no more.


#### A suggested Act of Contrition is:

My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy. (Rite of Penance, no. 45)

ABSOLUTION: The priest will extend his hands over your head and pronounce the words of absolution. You respond, "Amen."

PRAISE: The priest will usually praise the mercy of God and will invite you to do the same. For example, the priest may say, "Give thanks to the Lord for he is good." And your response would be, "His mercy endures for ever" (Rite of Penance, no. 47).


DISMISSAL: The priest will conclude the sacrament, often saying, "Go in peace."


























# How we serve God is how we serve those around us!
