Content notice: The 'N' word is used one time in the play, in an actual quote from one of the harassers as verified in the memoir, *Warriors Don't Cry* by Melba Patillo Beals

 Dramatized events will be: the inciting incident of Arkansas Governor Faubus opposing the federal government; nine students facing daily harassment but trained not to react; and the expulsion of Minnijean Brown after her act of defiance.

 Following each performance, student audiences will be "in role" as citizens of a Little Rock "town hall" in 1957, to question the key players (professional actors) and debate whether the remaining eight students should return to Central High or delay returning until all violence has subsided.



- Grade school age characters making decisions with integrity is a hallmark of Andrew Clements' writing (author of Frindle).
- Dramatized will be how a student doing a school report on India comes to try out Gandhi's tenet of silence one day each week.
- The play quickly moves into a 5th grade boys vs. girls challenge: Which team can go three days saying the fewest words?
- How does each teacher deal with this "unauthorized" behavior? Will fair negotiation become a valuable tool between students? Into the middle of the proceedings, Gandhi will make a delightful appearance.
- Standards: Meets K-5 CCR Anchor Standards for KS and MO RL.K-5.2, RL.K-5.3 and RL.K-5.6 (determine central theme, analyze how/why individuals, events, & ideas develop, assess how point of view shapes content)

After-the-Show Forum allows students to reflect on the themes of "Assumptions/Misunderstandings" and "Solving Conflicts" in an active, participatory way. Students will interact with professional actors who stay "in role" after each school performance!


