THIRD GRADE WATERSHED MODELS

The third graders have been investigating the question "Why aren't salmon returning to Yost Park? One of their claims is that the water isn't clean enough for the salmon. In order to find evidence to either support or refute their claim they learned about watersheds and how water flows through them. They made watershed models using construction paper, plastic bags, and a water spray bottle to help them see water movement through a watershed. Then they discussed how this information will help their own investigation. This week, they will travel to Yost Park to get a first-hand look at Shell Creek and the possible factors influencing salmon migration.



ART NEWS

In art we have been studying the work of Wayne Thiebaud, a living, contemporary artist. He is famous for creating delicious works of food often in a series, cityscapes, and portraits. He features strongly lit and shadowed work with his shadows full of color. Even with all this color in his shadows, his paintings use a lot of white which is often applied thickly as if he is frosting his cakes instead of merely painting them. The students all painted food masterpieces. The Kindergarten and First Graders painted candy series

creations. The Second and Third Graders painted groups of cupcakes. The Fourth and Fifth Graders painted tall tiered cakes. The Middle School Art Elective class painted complete meals on canvas. The students then sculpted tiny meals out of candy, for art of course, not to eat. Look for our masterpieces to appear around campus soon.
